<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>:

It is recommended that the Monterey County Fish and Game Advisory Commission, with regards to the Fiscal Year 2022-23 Propagation Grant Fund Awards Recommendation: a. Discuss subcommittee applicant ratings; Consider applicant presentations and staff instructions;

b. Approve the projects to be recommended by MCFGAC for a funding award, the recommended funding amount, and project funding ranking order for Board of Supervisors consideration of approval to receive a Fiscal Year 2022-23 Monterey County Propagation Grant Fund Award; and

c. Request Staff to take all necessary actions to prepare the required reports and schedule the recommendation for the Budget Committee and Board of Supervisors consideration for approval in January/February 2023.

SUMMARY/DISCUSSION:

Each year, pursuant to the California State Fish and Game Code, the Monterey County Fish and Game Advisory Commission makes a recommendation to the Board of Supervisors regarding the award of Propagation Grant Funds for projects that enhance or improve wildlife within Monterey County. Wildlife as defined by California State Fish and Game Code, includes all wild animals, birds, plants, fish, amphibians, reptiles, and related ecological communities, including the habitat upon which the wildlife depends for its continued viability. The Monterey County Propagation Grant Fund is funded by fines and settlements collected for violations of California Fish and Game laws within Monterey County.

The Board of Supervisors has charged the Monterey County Fish and Game Advisory Commission with reviewing all propagation fund grant applications and making a funding award recommendation to the Board. Thirteen applications were received for Fiscal Year 2022-23, with a grant funding total request of \$72,913. Various applications need additional information and/or clarification before they can be recommended for a Propagation Grant Fund award.

OTHER AGENCY INVOLVEMENT:

This matter is scheduled to be brought before the Budget Committee and Board of Supervisors for consideration and approval to award FY 2022-23 grant funds in January-February 2023.

FINANCING:

The annual budgeted amount for the Monterey County Propagation Grant Fund is \$40,000. Due to a returned FY 2020-21 award of \$5,000 and unused FY 2021-22 award monies in the amount of \$465, the total amount available for the FY 2022-23 Propagation Grant Fund Awards is \$45,465.
