

health and safety, land values, quality of life, environmental contamination, and food safety, We are committed to solving this problem.

The Eradication Subcommittee and Education & Outreach Subcommittee have joined forces!

On September 29, the two subcommittees hosted a cleanup of Gabilan Creek Walking Path in Salinas. Volunteers collected and removed 120+ lbs. of litter, two 5-gal buckets of CRV, and 3 metal shopping carts! The collected material



What We've Done

- Research camera technologies and user experiences
- Applied for grants
 - ✓ \$157K, Illegal Disposal Site Abatement Grant, CalRecycle, Feb 2022
 - ✓ \$120K, Illegally Dumped Mattress Pilot Study, Mattress Recycling Council, Nov 2022, (for CBSM)





What We Continue to Do

- Task Force meets quarterly & subcommittee meets monthly
- Annual Earth Day Clean-Up event at Carr Lake
- Voucher Program
 - ✓ Funded by Salinas Valley Recycles and ReGen Monterey (\$10K annually)
 - Allows free disposal at landfills and transfer stations for community clean-ups and victims of illegal dumping
 - ✓ Application now online: <u>www.mtyhd.org/disposalvoucher</u>
 - ✓ 99,792 lbs collected, 226 vouchers issued since 2018




Illegal Dumping in Monterey County

What Does It Cost?

- \circ \$1.7 Million over five FYs
- Labor, equipment, waste type, disposal costs
- o Covid- FY 2019-2020

Total Cost of Litter Collection for FYs 2017-2022 is \$1,666,368.82





Illegal Dumping in Monterey County

What Does It Cost?

- Three Waste Type
 - General Litter- illegal dumping
 - Request for Service (RFS)
 - Hazardous waste
- General Litter is the largest cost category
- $\circ~$ Disposal costs not included






Illegal Dumping in Monterey County

How Much Was Collected?

- \circ 1,602,580lbs over five years
- 860lbs a day, every day, for five years

- \circ Easier to use
- More jurisdictions using cameras




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Illegal Dumping and Litter Abatement Task Force

Recommendation: \$8,000 for Pilot Surveillance Program

• Reconyx Surveillance Series

- ✓ 6 mobile cameras (\$3959.94)
- ✓ Security enclosure kits (\$839.94)
- ✓ Batteries and SD cards (\$1000)
- ✓ Cellular service plan for two years (\$2160)

- ✓ Mobile game camera
- ✓ General surveillance for LE
- ✓ License plate capture
- ✓ Battery powered, cellular service, cloud storage for images
- Regulatory agencies, LE, municipalities, parks, DA offices

Illegal Dumping and Litter Abatement Task Force

How It Will Work

- Select locations from list of hot spots (photos)
- Public Works can install the cameras
- Environmental Health will oversee the camera program and maintain chain of custody
- Enforcement may include cost recovery, administration fees, or fines or referral to the District Attorney's Office


