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### **HHAP** Overview

HHAP-3 is a \$1 billion block grant program authorized by AB 140 (Health & Safety Code § 50218.6, et seq.), signed into law by Governor Gavin Newsom on July 19, 2021. The general purpose of the Program is to continue to build on the regional coordination developed through previous California Interagency Council on Homelessness (Cal ICH) grant funding to support local jurisdictions in their unified regional response to reduce and end homelessness. Statute requires certain portions of the HHAP-3 application be agendized at a local governing board meeting and available for public comment.



# HHAP-3 Eligible Uses

As stated in Health and Safety Code section 50220.7 (e), HHAP Round 3 funds must be expended on one or more of the following eligible uses:

- 1. Rapid rehousing, including rental subsidies and incentives to landlords, such as <u>security</u> <u>deposits</u> and holding fees.
- Operating subsidies in <u>new and existing</u> <u>affordable or supportive housing units</u>, <u>emergency shelters</u>, and navigation centers.
   Operating subsidies may include operating reserves.
- 3. Street outreach to <u>assist</u> persons experiencing homelessness to <u>access</u> <u>permanent housing</u> and services.
- 4. Services coordination, which may include access to workforce, education, and training programs, or other services needed to promote housing stability in supportive housing.
- 5. Systems support for activities necessary to create regional partnerships and maintain a homeless services and housing delivery

system, particularly for vulnerable populations, including families and homeless youth.

- Delivery of permanent housing and innovative housing solutions, such as <u>hotel</u> and motel conversions.
- 7. Prevention and shelter diversion to permanent housing, including rental subsidies.
- 8. Interim sheltering, limited to newly developed clinically enhanced congregate shelters, new or existing non-congregate shelters, and operations of existing navigation centers and shelters based on demonstrated need.
- 9. Improvements to existing emergency shelters to lower barriers and increase privacy.

The local landscape analysis assesses the current number of people experiencing homelessness and existing programs and funding which address homelessness.

The information provided in Table 1 reflects the most current and accurate way of estimating the number and demographics of people experiencing homelessness.
