




STRYVE Program


- The STRYVE Program began in 2011, at the Monterey County Health Department Public Health Bureau with funding from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) for the purpose of reducing youth violence.
- From 2016 to 2021 the CDC funded the STRYVE Program to engage in primary prevention activities to prevent teen dating violence and youth violence.

What is TNC?


That's Not Cool!

TNC is a social media campaign run by high school students to raise awareness about domestic and sexual violence in Salinas.






Work with TNC on spreading domestic violence awareness

Place stickers on sites where students would be vulnerable to intimate partner violence








