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I. Overview of Full Service Partnership Programs

Monterey County Health Department's Behavioral Health Bureau (MCBH) conducts Full Service Partnership (FSP) programs to provide consumers with a broad spectrum of services that aid in their movement towards recovery, using a "whatever it takes, for as long as it takes" approach. This approach includes mental health services and supports such as medication management, crisis intervention, case management and peer support. It also provides non-mental health services such as food, housing, job training, and respite care and treatment for co-occurring disorders. A key difference between FSP programs and those offering a usual standard of care is that **FSP provides a more intensive level of care and a broader range of services.** The FSP approach is designed and responsive to four age groups: Children ages 0-15, Transitional Age Youth ages 16 to 25, Adults ages 18-64, and Older Adults ages 65 and older.

Consumer and program-level data are captured in MCBH's Avatar electronic health record system clinician input screens that track mental, social, functional, and physical/environmental stability domains. These domains are contained in three FSP Consumer Outcomes Assessment Forms that are used to capture data for seven key Quality of Life domains over time: housing; therapeutic and rehabilitative services; case management or coordination; employment or education; peer support; outreach or community education; and co-occurring disorders or substance abuse treatment.

The three types of Consumer Outcomes Assessment Forms in use are tailored to the four age groups described above. The Partnership Assessment Form (PAF) is conducted at the initiation of FSP services to collect Consumer history and Quality of Life. The Key Event Tracking Form (KET) is completed each time a change occurs for the FSP Consumer in the key areas of housing/custody, education, employment, justice system involvement, or physical health. The Quarterly Assessment (3M) is used to regularly update Consumer data at 3 month intervals.

II. Profiles of 13 Full Service Partnership Programs

Monterey County Behavioral Health operates or contracts with community partners to provide 13 FSP programs serving four age groups:

Table 1. FSP Programs, 2009-2012

Program Profiles

Children, Youth, Family

Secure Families: Counseling services for children in childcare and Head Start programs; mental health consultation and training to teachers, home visitation staff and other outreach programs.

Family Reunification: Intensive therapy and case management services for children in the foster care system.

Community Action Linking Adolescents: Mental health services and case management for youth in the juvenile justice system.

Kinship Adoption Preservation: Parent training, mental health treatment and case management for adoptive families.

Integrated Co-occurring Disorder: Integrated treatment for youth with co-occurring mental health and substance abuse disorders.

Transition Age Youth Ages 15-24 Years

Transition to Independence: Comprehensive case management using an evidence-based model of treatment.

Peacock Acres: Supportive housing and case management services for youth exiting the Youth Center.

Adults Ages 18-64 Years

MCHOME: Outreach to homeless adults with mental illness and supportive housing with intensive, integrated services.

Creating New Choices: Intensive case management of mentally ill offenders provided by a multi-disciplinary team.

Lupine Garden: Outreach, case management and supportive housing for the homeless mentally ill.

Sunflower Garden: Affordable supportive housing for adults with mental illness who are homeless or at risk of homelessness.

Older Adults Ages 65 and older

Drake House: 24-hour residential care for older adults with serious mental illness.

Older Adult FSP: Intensive case management for older adults plus a multi-disciplinary team with Adult Protective Services.

III. Consumer Demographics

The number of unduplicated consumers per Fiscal Year (FY) increased annually over the three-year period of analysis. The number of annual consumers served increased **28%** from FY 2009-2010 (n=358) to FY 2011-2012 (n=461). Consumers served for three fiscal years, stratified by age group and program, are presented below:

By age group, the greatest Consumer increase (1,100%, n= 143) occurred in Transition Age Youth (15-24 years old). The Children, Youth, Family and Adult age groups increased by 1% and 52%, respectively. A decrease was seen in the number of Older Adults consumers, which decreased from 143 to 43 consumers (-70%). Duplicated consumers (due to carryover from year to year) by age group are presented below:

By race/ethnicity, the greatest change during the three-year period of analysis occurred in the **19% decrease** in White, non-Hispanic consumers. By ethnicity, the greatest change during the three-year period of analysis occurred in the **17% increase** in Hispanic consumers.

IV. Data Set for Adults and Older Adults

An important assessment tool for FSP clients is the Partnership Assessment Form (PAF), which is completed for each client at the time the partnership is established. The PAF captures client history and baseline data pertaining to residential status, education, employment, sources of financial support, legal issues, emergency interventions, health care status, and substance abuse. For older adults only, activities of daily living are assessed.

PAFs were completed for adults and older adults only in 2010-2011, and therefore the data set for this analysis is limited to the age group 18 to 65+ years. PAFs were not available for every adult and older adult consumer, and none were available for consumers of the Sunflower Garden adult services program. PAFs were completed for 98 adults and 79 older adults, for a total of 147 records in the data set. Tables 6 and 7 below provide demographics and attributes of the 2010-2011 Adult and Older FSP consumers with PAFs.

V. Full Service Partnership Service Utilization by Type

While the number of FSP consumers increased from FY 2009-2010 to 2011-2012, the total number of FSP services provided to these consumers decreased by 3%, from 25,861 to 24,975. The greatest increase (7%) was seen in group counseling services; the greatest decrease (-6%) was seen in Mental Health Rehabilitation services. The average number of services received per Consumer annually decreased by 18%, from 64 in 2009-2010 to 53 in 2011-2012.
