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Options to fund mobile spay/neuter clinics



Background

The need is there

- Shelter intake is primarily unaltered animals
- Kittens season is real and especially long this year
- Benefits of spay/neuter
 - Medical, behavioral and cheaper
- Responsible pet owners
 - Want to do the right thing but can't afford

Options at this time

- Things considered:
 - Cost to County
 - Cost to pet owner for services provided
 - Rabies reporting
 - Transparent statistics
 - Funds got to MoCo residents



The Big Fix

How it started

- Helping reduce Moss Landing feral cats
- 4 clinics later: 165 animals altered and counting
- Agencies involved
 - The SPCA for Monterey County (SPCA)
 - Animal Friends Rescue Project (AFRP)
 - Salinas Animal Services (SAS)
 - Friends of Community Animal Services (FoCAS)
 - Spay CA Now
 - **Community Cat Allies**
 - Peace of Mind Dog Rescue (POMDR)



Big Fix Clinic

- Animals brought to the clinic locations by their owners/caretakers.
 - They are spayed/neutered, microchipped and vaccinated for \$25
 - Animals are picked up later that same day.
- Location determined by agreement of partners
 Areas to be targeted are those most contributing to

 Rabies certificates provided according to local ordinance

shelter intake

 Using database, ClinicHQ, able to provide statistics for reporting as well as on-line sign up.





2020 Plan for Big Fix

- 2 clinics per month at different locations around MoCo and its cities
 - Potential to reach about 900 + animals!
 - Already scheduling Salinas and South County locations for January and February
- Cost is about \$3000 per clinic

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- Jan-June estimate is \$36,000
 - SPCA has secured funding through June
 - Animal Services to contribute vaccinations and additional surgical supplies.
 - Funding identified within department budget for estimated (\$16,000)
 - No additional funding needed at this time
