Adopt an ordinance amending Section 16 of Pajaro County Sanitation District (PCSD) Ordinance No. 05054 to provide for the collection of sewer charges through the County of Monterey Property Tax Roll.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

It is recommended that the Board of Supervisors, acting as the Board of Directors of the Pajaro County Sanitation District (PCSD), adopt an ordinance to amend Section 16 of PCSD Ordinance No. 05054 to provide for the collection of sewer service charges through the Property Tax Roll of the County of Monterey.

#### SUMMARY/DISCUSSION:

On May 7, 2024, the Board of Supervisors acting as the Board of Directors of the PCSD introduced, waived reading, and set a hearing for adoption of the ordinance on May 21, 2024, at 10:30 a.m.

The PCSD currently contracts with Monterey One Water (M1W) to provide sewer billing and collection services for PCSD customers. On November 16, 2023, M1W notified the County of Monterey Department of Public Works, Facilities and Parks (PWFP0 that beginning with Fiscal Year 2024-25, M1W will cease providing this service to the PCSD. Therefore, PWFP staff recommends that the Board adopt an ordinance to amend Section 16 of PCSD Ordinance No 05054 to allow for the collection of sewer service charges through the Property Tax Roll of the County of Monterey pursuant to California Health and Safety Code Section 5470 *et. seq.* in order to collect service charges to cover the costs of providing wastewater collection services to PCSD customers.

The PCSD provides services to the communities of Bay Farms, Las Lomas, Pajaro Sunny Mesa, and Pajaro. PWFP currently manages the PCSD and does not currently have the capability to provide in-house billing services. It has been determined that the least costly and most efficient method of collecting the sewer service charges is by placing these property related fees and charges on the Property Tax Roll beginning with the FY 2024-25 tax year. The County/PCSD has been utilizing this method to collect on delinquent PCSD accounts since on or about 2010.

In addition, the County of Monterey and the Treasurer-Tax Collector have authorized Easy Smart Pay, a third-party vendor, to provide a monthly payment option for the payment of property taxes which will include the PCSD sewer service charges.

If PCSD does not provide for billing through the Property Tax Roll, PWFP will need to bill customers directly. To undertake this responsibility in-house would require an additional Accounting Technician

position at a cost of \$124,500 annually, one-time software costs estimated between \$10,000-\$20,000 and ongoing software maintenance costs. These costs could be shared between the three sanitation districts (Pajaro County Sanitation District, Boronda County Sanitation District and County Service Area 75-Chualar). Alternatively, PWFP could outsource the monthly billing, at a cost of \$12,200-18,400 annually, plus an initial implementation fee. Such a service will take time to procure and contract and will cost more than providing for the collection of sewer service charges through the Property Tax Roll, as provided in the proposed ordinance.

#### OTHER AGENCY INVOLVEMENT

The Office of the County Counsel has approved the ordinance as to form and the County Administrative Office supports the recommendation.

#### FINANCING:

M1W water currently charges the PCSD \$14,804 annually for sewer services billing and collection services which will cease when their billing and collection services stop on June 30, 2024. Internal expenses resulting from the billing modification will be minimal, including staff time to prepare the necessary annual Board of Directors report to allow the County to collect annual sewer service charges. This incremental cost will be offset by a savings in staff time as delinquent sewer account processing will no longer be necessary. Additionally, the Auditor Controller's office charges ¼ of 1 percent of revenue collected on the County Property Tax Roll. The estimated 2024-25 revenue from PCSD billing is \$1,324,000, resulting in an estimated annual charge by the Auditor-Controller's Office of \$3,310.

#### ORDINANCE NO.

#### AN ORDINANCE OF THE PAJARO COUNTY SANITATION DISTRICT AMENDING SECTION 16 OF ORDINANCE NUMBER 05054 TO PROVIDE FOR THE COLLECTION OF SEWER SERVICE CHARGES THROUGH THE COUNTY OF MONTEREY PROPERTY TAX ROLL

County Counsel Summary

This ordinance amends Section 16 of Ordinance No. 05054 of the Pajaro County Sanitation District to allow for the collection of sewer service charges through the property tax roll of the County of Monterey pursuant to California Health and Safety Codes section 5470 et seq. in order to collect service charges to cover the costs of providing wastewater collection services to Pajaro County Sanitation District customers.

The Board of Supervisors of the County of Monterey, acting as the Board of Directors of the Pajaro County Sanitation District ordains as follows:

#### SECTION 1. FINDINGS AND DECLARATIONS.

A. The Board of Supervisors of the County of Monterey, acting as the Board of Directors of the Pajaro County Sanitation District ("PCSD") has determined that adding sewer charges to the property tax roll is the least costly and most efficient method of collecting the sewer service charge.

B. PCSD is authorized by California Health and Safety Code section 5470 *et. seq.* to impose and collect service charges to cover the costs of providing wastewater collection and treatment services.

C. PCSD hereby desires, pursuant to Health and Safety Code section 5473, commencing with Fiscal Year 2024-25, to have sewer service charges for services rendered collected on the property tax roll of the County of Monterey in the same general manner, by the same persons, and at the same time as the collection of general property taxes, in the manner provided pursuant to by Health and Safety Code section 5470 *et. seq.* 

D. This Ordinance is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") because it can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that the enactment of this Ordinance would have a significant effect on the environment (Public Resources Code section 21065; CEQA Guidelines sections 15378(b)(4) and 15061(b)(3)), and because the Ordinance involves the approval of government revenues to fund existing services (Public Resources Code section 21080(b)(8); CEQA Guidelines section 15273(a)(4)).

#### **SECTION 2. AMENDMENT TO SECTION 16.**

A. Subsection (c) of Section 16 of Ordinance No. 05054 is hereby amended to read:

The PCSD shall collect monthly sewer service charges on the property tax roll of the County

of Monterey in the same general manner, by the same persons, and at the same time as the collection of general property taxes, in the manner provided pursuant to by California Health and Safety Code section 5470 *et. seq.* 

B. Subsection (d) of Section 16 of Ordinance No. 05054 is hereby amended to read:

All sewer service charges shall be collected in advance on a bi-monthly basis on the property tax roll of the County of Monterey in the same general manner, by the same persons, and at the same time as the collection of general property taxes, in the manner provided pursuant to by California Health and Safety Code section 5470 *et seq*. All charges for sewer services shall be in the name of the owner of the property being served as reflected on the last equalized assessment roll for the County of Monterey or as reflected in any deed or other satisfactory evidence of change of ownership recorded with the County Recorder since the last equalized assessment roll, upon presentation of such evidence to the County of Monterey, Department of Public Works and Facilities Director for such purposes. The property owner of record shall be the party ultimately responsible for the payment of sewer service charges.

**SECTION 3. SEVERABILITY**. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The Board of Supervisors hereby declares that it would have passed this Ordinance and each section, subsection, sentence, clause, and phrase thereof, irrespective of whether any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, or phrases is declared invalid.

**SECTION 4. EFFECTIVE DATE**. This Ordinance shall become effective on the thirty-first day after its adoption.



#### SUMMARY:

The proposed actions will set a Public Hearing to consider placing past due sanitation service charges for the Pajaro County Sanitation District (PCSD) on the Property Tax Roll to facilitate collections. This assessment will be in the form of a lien placed on the property owner's real property until such time that the delinquent balance is paid in full.

#### DISCUSSION:

PCSD provides wastewater collection services to 1,047 customers in the Pajaro, Las Lomas, and Bay Farms communities. Monterey One Water (M1W) currently acts as the billing agency for the PCSD. As of July 1, 2024, M1W will no longer provide billing/collection services for the PCSD.

In 1999, the Board of Supervisors adopted ordinances removing sanitation service charges from the Property Tax Roll and provided instead for collection through a monthly billing system. On June 9, 2007, the Board of Supervisors adopted Ordinance No. 05054 establishing procedures for collection of delinquent fees for PCSD through the Property Tax Roll. The procedures include holding a public hearing once a year to hear the Report of Delinquent Sanitation Fees and any protests or objections

by property owners liable to be assessed for delinquent fees.

The Report of 2023 Delinquent Fees (Attachment A) lists property owners within the PCSD that have accrued unpaid balances for calendar year 2023 on accounts for 82 parcels, despite multiple billing notices. The proposed action will schedule the required hearing for the 82 parcels with past due 2023 balances. On April 12, 2024, affected property owners were notified by letter that they have delinquent 2023 sewer accounts. If payments were not made, a second notification letter was sent out on or before May 6, 2024. The letters informed each property owner of the past due amount as of December 31, 2023, and that the delinquent amount is subject to collection through placement of a lien on their property. Notices of the June 11, 2024, public hearing will be mailed not less than 10 days prior to the hearing to property owners listed in the Report. The public hearing notice (Attachment B) will be published in the Monterey County Weekly not less than 10 days prior to said hearing.

#### OTHER AGENCY INVOLVEMENT:

For Fiscal Year Ending June 30, 2024, M1W is the billing agency for the PCSD. M1W notified PWFP that it will no longer act as the billing agency as of July 1, 2024. A proposed ordinance to change the billing method to collect sewer charges through the Property Tax Roll is pending for adoption on May 21, 2024. Placement of the liens on the Property Tax Roll is completed by the Office of the Treasurer-Tax Collector.

#### FINANCING:

Collectively, past due amounts for calendar year 2023 for PCSD currently total \$42,099 from 82 parcels. Costs associated with processing the liens for the delinquent accounts, including data processing, accounting, noticing, and control procedures, are calculated at \$60 per parcel for a total of \$4,920. In accordance with Ordinance No. 05054, the processing costs will be added as lien transfer fees to the delinquent amount on a per parcel basis prior to forwarding the accounts to the Treasurer-Tax Collector, for a total lien amount of \$47,019. PCSD's main revenue is generated from sewer fees, with additional revenues allocated from a portion of the general property tax. Additionally, revenue from the prior year's delinquent accounts is collected when property tax payments are made in December and April of the following year. All calendar year 2023 past due account balances and late penalty and lien transfer fees collected will be deposited to Fund 151 for PCSD. The current past due amount is consistent with previous annual past due amounts. The PCSD current revenue budget is \$5,268,926 year-to-date revenue collected totaling \$866,170. The current expenditure budget is \$7,586,167 with year-to-date expenditures totaling \$3,377,011. The budget reflects funding from Federal Aid and State Disaster Relief funds. The estimated ending fund balance for FY24 is \$607,001. The current budget can accommodate this decrease in revenue until the past due accounts can be collected on the FY 2024-25 Property Tax Roll in December 2024 and April 2025. Delinquent payments may be made through the date of the public hearing.

The collection of past due amounts and lien transfer fees for delinquent accounts ensure continued cash flow to fund maintenance and operations. Responsible fiscal management ensures that sewer infrastructure needs are met and improves public health and safety.

Acting as the Board of Directors of the Pajaro County Sanitation District:

a. Set a Public Hearing on June 11, 2024, at 1:30 p.m., to hear the Report of 2023 Delinquent Fees for the Pajaro County Sanitation District, and consider any protests and objections to the Report by property owners liable to be assessed for delinquent fees;

b. Direct the Department of Public Works, Facilities and Parks to prepare a final Report of 2023 Delinquent Fees for the Pajaro County Sanitation District; and

c. Direct the Department of Public Works, Facilities and Parks to publish a Notice of Public Hearing and mail it to the property owners listed in the report not less than 10 days prior to the date of hearing.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

It is recommended that the Board of Supervisors, acting as the Board of Directors of the Pajaro County Sanitation District:

a. Set a Public Hearing on June 11, 2024, at 1:30 p.m., to hear the Report of 2023 Delinquent Fees for the Pajaro County Sanitation District, and consider any protests and objections to the Report by property owners liable to be assessed for delinquent fees;

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c. Direct the Department of Public Works, Facilities and Parks to publish a Notice of Public Hearing and mail it to the property owners listed in the report not less than 10 days prior to the date of hearing.

#### SUMMARY:

The proposed actions will set a Public Hearing to consider placing past due sanitation service charges for the Pajaro County Sanitation District (PCSD) on the Property Tax Roll to facilitate collections. This assessment will be in the form of a lien placed on the property owner's real property until such time that the delinquent balance is paid in full.

#### DISCUSSION:

PCSD provides wastewater collection services to 1,047 customers in the Pajaro, Las Lomas, and Bay Farms communities. Monterey One Water (M1W) currently acts as the billing agency for the PCSD. As of July 1, 2024, M1W will no longer provide billing/collection services for the PCSD.

In 1999, the Board of Supervisors adopted ordinances removing sanitation service charges from the Property Tax Roll and provided instead for collection through a monthly billing system. On June 9, 2007, the Board of Supervisors adopted Ordinance No. 05054 establishing procedures for collection of delinquent fees for PCSD through the Property Tax Roll. The procedures

include holding a public hearing once a year to hear the Report of Delinquent Sanitation Fees and any protests or objections by property owners liable to be assessed for delinquent fees.

The Report of 2023 Delinquent Fees (Attachment A) lists property owners within the PCSD that have accrued unpaid balances for calendar year 2023 on accounts for 82 parcels, despite multiple billing notices. The proposed action will schedule the required hearing for the 82 parcels with past due 2023 balances. On April 12, 2024, affected property owners were notified by letter that they have delinquent 2023 sewer accounts. If payments were not made, a second notification letter was sent out on or before May 6, 2024. The letters informed each property owner of the past due amount as of December 31, 2023, and that the delinquent amount is subject to collection through placement of a lien on their property. Notices of the June 11, 2024, public hearing will be mailed not less than 10 days prior to the hearing to property owners listed in the Report. The public hearing notice (Attachment B) will be published in the Monterey County Weekly not less than 10 days prior to said hearing.

#### **OTHER AGENCY INVOLVEMENT:**

For Fiscal Year Ending June 30, 2024, M1W is the billing agency for the PCSD. M1W notified PWFP that it will no longer act as the billing agency as of July 1, 2024. A proposed ordinance to change the billing method to collect sewer charges through the Property Tax Roll is pending for adoption on May 21, 2024. Placement of the liens on the Property Tax Roll is completed by the Office of the Treasurer-Tax Collector.

#### FINANCING:

Collectively, past due amounts for calendar year 2023 for PCSD currently total \$42,099 from 82 parcels. Costs associated with processing the liens for the delinquent accounts, including data processing, accounting, noticing, and control procedures, are calculated at \$60 per parcel for a total of \$4,920. In accordance with Ordinance No. 05054, the processing costs will be added as lien transfer fees to the delinquent amount on a per parcel basis prior to forwarding the accounts to the Treasurer-Tax Collector, for a total lien amount of \$47,019. PCSD's main revenue is generated from sewer fees, with additional revenues allocated from a portion of the general property tax. Additionally, revenue from the prior year's delinquent accounts is collected when property tax payments are made in December and April of the following year. All calendar year 2023 past due account balances and late penalty and lien transfer fees collected will be deposited to Fund 151 for PCSD. The current past due amount is consistent with previous annual past due amounts. The PCSD current revenue budget is \$5,268,926 year-to-date revenue collected totaling \$866,170. The current expenditure budget is \$7,586,167 with year-to-date expenditures totaling \$3,377,011. The budget reflects funding from Federal Aid and State Disaster Relief funds. The estimated ending fund balance for FY24 is \$607,001. The current budget can accommodate this decrease in revenue until the past due accounts can be collected on the FY 2024-25 Property Tax Roll in December 2024 and April 2025. Delinquent payments may be made through the date of the public hearing.



#### SUMMARY/DISCUSSION:

The County-Owned PCSD wastewater collection system (PCSD System) is in northern unincorporated area of the County of Monterey. The PCSD System serves the communities of Bay Farms, Las Lomas, Pajaro Sunny Mesa, and Pajaro. It includes approximately 16.5 miles of gravity sewer pipe, six pump stations, and approximately 2.4 miles of force sewer main. There are approximately 1,047 sewer connections and 1,768 billing units. The PCSD System is a collection system only. Collected sewage is pumped to the City of Watsonville wastewater treatment plant for treatment. A site location map is presented in Attachment A.

Wastewater service rates for the PCSD have not changed since 2007 and costs to operate and maintain the system have increased significantly since then. This has resulted in an inability of PCSD to generate sufficient revenues to offset operational and infrastructure costs. Thus, in Fall 2022, District staff initiated the process to increase sewer service rates for the PCSD System.

During the November 30, 2022, Budget Committee meeting, staff presented alternative customer service rates for the Committee's consideration which would go into effect on July 1, 2023. The Budget Committee recommended the rate study move forward assuming outstanding General Fund loans totaling \$1,941,661 would be forgiven, an additional \$2.1 million in capital improvement funding and up to \$3.5 million to supplement operating costs would be provided over the next 5 years.

During a Budget Committee meeting on March 29, 2023, staff recommended rate increases be postponed until July 1, 2024, to allow time for residents and businesses within the Community of Pajaro to recover from the devastating storms that occurred in March 2023; during an August 29, 2023, meeting, the Board formally approved postponing rate increases.

During a January 19, 2024, Board of Directors meeting, Staff presented three alternative single family residential rate increase scenarios. The first scenario contemplated a first-year single family residential rate increase from approximately \$30 to \$60/month for the first year with annual increases based on the consumer price index (CPI); the second scenario contemplated a rate increase from approximately \$30 to \$60/month for the first year with an annual increase of \$10/month for the next five years; and the third rate scenario was calculated assuming no County subsidy, resulting in a rate increase from approximately \$30 to \$129.46/month. The Board approved pursuing a hybrid of these scenarios: a single-family residential rate of \$60/month for the first year and annual increases thereafter of \$5/month plus an increase based on the CPI.

A Proposition 218-compliant rate study report has been prepared and is presented in Attachment B (the rate study report). A summary of proposed monthly rates detailed in the rate study report, is presented in Attachment C and a Notice of Public Hearing, mailed March 27, 2024, with Spanish translation, is presented in Attachment D. A Certificate of Clerk of the Board Statement of Protests, and a Resolution Establishing New Wastewater Rates are included as Attachments E and F, respectively.

The public hearing is being convened to hear objections to, or protests against, the proposed sewer service rate increases by property owners pursuant to Proposition 218 requirements. It was set by the Board of Directors on March 26, 2024. The Notice of Public Hearing (with proposed wastewater rates and Spanish translation) was mailed to property owners on March 28, 2024, and published in the Monterey County Weekly on April 4, 2024. Additionally, the Notice of Public Hearing was posted on the County of Monterey PWFP webpage. Copies of the Rate Study and Notice of Public Hearing with proposed wastewater rates were made available at the PWFP offices.

Prior to any Board action, four (4) community outreach events were held in the PCSD to inform property owners of the increase. The first community outreach event was held on November 7, 2023,

in Las Lomas, and the second on November 14th in Bay Farms. Subsequent meetings were convened in Pajaro and again in Las Lomas on January 24 and March 19, 2024, respectively. Rate increases, as presented in the rate study were explained and discussed, and information regarding the wastewater system, as well as the need to increase rates, was provided during the community outreach events.

The public hearing is mandated by the Proposition 218 Majority Protest Process. The proposed new rate structure will only be implemented if, upon the conclusion of the public hearing, a majority (50% plus one [1]) of written protests are received. Per Proposition 218, only one (1) written protest will be counted for each property for purposes of determining if there is a majority protest. To be counted, the protest must (1) be in writing; (2) state opposition to the proposed rate increase; (3) identify the parcel by assessor's parcel number or street address; (4) include the original signature(s) of the property owner(s) of record; and (5) be received before the conclusion of the Public Hearing on Tuesday, May 21, 2024.

#### Changes to Customer Billing Procedures

Currently, Monterey One Water (M1W) provides monthly billing services to PCSD customers. Beginning July 1, 2024, M1W will change its billing method from monthly invoicing to annual billing through the County property tax roll. Similarly, PCSD customers will no longer receive an invoice from M1W. As of July 1, 2024, if billing through the property tax roll is approved by the Board through a separate Board action, PCSD sewer charges will appear on the property owner's respective property tax bill. Wastewater service charges for the entire year will be billed in November, and at least half of the amount will be due by December 10th and the remainder will be due by April 10th. For example, for 1 EDU, the new rate will be \$60.00 per month; thus, \$720.00 will be billed in November 2024 and \$360.00 will be due on December 10, 2024, and the remaining \$360.00 will be due on April 10, 2025. Wastewater charges will increase in future years but will be billed similarly. Staff notes that the County of Monterey and the Treasurer-Tax Collector have authorized *Easy Smart Pay*, a third-party vendor, to provide a monthly payment option for the payment of property taxes (<<u>https://easysmartpay.net/monterey-ca></u>). This service is free of charge provided ACH (bank to bank) transfers are utilized.

#### OTHER AGENCY INVOLVEMENT:

This matter was presented to the Budget Committee on November 30, 2022, and on March 29, 2023. During the March 29, 2023, Budget Committee Meeting, the Committee discussed postponing implementation of new customer service rates to provide time for the Pajaro community to recover from the March 10, 2023, flood and to allow staff to conduct community meetings after the community has had time to recover. Staff presented three alternative single family residential rate increase scenarios at the January 19, 2024, Board of Directors meeting. Per Proposition 218 requirements, the public hearing was set by the Board of Directors on March 26, 2024.

#### FINANCING:

The plan to increase wastewater services rates supported by the Board of Directors on March 26th, 2024, includes General Fund loan forgiveness of \$1,941,661 and General Fund subsidies to the District for the foreseeable future to keep rates consistent with surrounding communities. Over the next five years, the General Fund subsidies are estimated to be \$1,409,300 (FY 2024-25),

\$1,357,350 (FY 2025-26), \$1,073,300 (FY 2026-27), \$954,400 (FY 2027-28) and \$1,183,400 (FY 2028-29). The FY 2024-25 Recommended Budget does not include the necessary subsidy of \$1,409,300 and would require the Board of Supervisors to identify a General Fund funding source. Potential funding sources for the Board's consideration include General Fund Unassigned Fund Balance and Contingencies.

#### BOARD OF SUPERVISORS STRATEGIC INITIATIVES:

The recommendations presented above support the following Board of Supervisors Strategic Initiatives by providing the funds necessary to maintain the PCSD infrastructure and thereby enhancing public safety by minimizing sewer overflows.

#### SUMMARY/DISCUSSION:

The County-Owned PCSD wastewater collection system (PCSD System) is in northern unincorporated area of the County of Monterey. The PCSD System serves the communities of Bay Farms, Las Lomas, Pajaro Sunny Mesa, and Pajaro. It includes approximately 16.5 miles of gravity sewer pipe, six pump stations, and approximately 2.4 miles of force sewer main. There are approximately 1,047 sewer connections and 1,768 billing units. The PCSD System is a collection system only. Collected sewage is pumped to the City of Watsonville wastewater treatment plant for treatment. A site location map is presented in Attachment A.

Wastewater service rates for the PCSD have not changed since 2007 and costs to operate and maintain the system have increased significantly since then. This has resulted in an inability of PCSD to generate sufficient revenues to offset operational and infrastructure costs. Thus, in Fall 2022, District staff initiated the process to increase sewer service rates for the PCSD System.

During the November 30, 2022, Budget Committee meeting, staff presented alternative customer service rates for the Committee's consideration which would go into effect on July 1, 2023. The Budget Committee recommended the rate study move forward assuming outstanding General Fund loans totaling \$1,941,661 would be forgiven, an additional \$2.1 million in capital improvement funding and up to \$3.5 million to supplement operating costs would be provided over the next 5 years.

During a Budget Committee meeting on March 29, 2023, staff recommended rate increases be postponed until July 1, 2024, to allow time for residents and businesses within the Community of Pajaro to recover from the devastating storms that occurred in March 2023; during an August 29, 2023, meeting, the Board formally approved postponing rate increases.

During a January 19, 2024, Board of Directors meeting, Staff presented three alternative single family residential rate increase scenarios. The first scenario contemplated a first-year single family residential rate increase from approximately \$30 to \$60/month for the first year with annual increases based on the consumer price index (CPI); the second scenario contemplated a rate increase from approximately \$30 to \$60/month for the first year with an annual increase of \$10/month for the next five years; and the third rate scenario was calculated assuming no County subsidy, resulting in a rate increase from approximately \$30 to \$129.46/month. The Board approved pursuing a hybrid of these scenarios: a single-family residential rate of \$60/month for the first year and annual increases thereafter of \$5/month plus an increase based on the CPI.

A Proposition 218-compliant rate study report has been prepared and is presented in Attachment B (the rate study report). 

**WHEREAS**, the Pajaro County Sanitation District (PCSD) provides wastewater services to properties located in the PCSD pursuant to Ordinance No. 5134, and as such wastewater charges are adjusted from time to time; and

WHEREAS, wastewater service rates have remained unchanged for over 15 years, resulting in an inability of the PCSD to generate sufficient revenues to fund operational and infrastructure costs; and

WHEREAS, a PCSD Rate Study was completed by Tuckfield & Associates in February 2024 (Rate Study). The Rate Study established new residential and commercial sewer rates for the next five (5) years needed to sustain wastewater operations, accomplish capital improvements, and establish reasonable reserves; and

**WHEREAS**, four (4) community outreach events were held in November and March 2024 to inform PCSD property owners of the proposed rate increases and implementation schedule, and answer questions posed by event participants.

**WHEREAS**, on March 26, 2024, the Board of Supervisors set a public hearing for May 21, 2024, at 1:30 p.m. to hear protests against the proposed increase to wastewater rates by property owners pursuant to Proposition 218 requirements; and

**WHEREAS**, PWFP staff was directed to mail a Notice of Public Hearing to property owners in the PCSD and publish the Notice of Public Hearing in the Monterey County Weekly not less than 45 (forty-five) days prior to the date of this public hearing; and

**WHEREAS**, the Notice of Public Hearing with proposed wastewater rates with a Spanish translation was mailed to property owners on March 28, 2024 and published in the Monterey County Weekly on April 4, 2024; and

**WHEREAS**, Notice of Public Hearing with proposed wastewater rates was posted on the County of Monterey Public Works, Facilities and Parks webpage; and

**WHEREAS**, such a Public Hearing was held on May 21, 2024, and the PCSD Board of Directors considered all protests related to the proposed increase in the wastewater service fees;

Section 4. Proposed wastewater service fees will be billed beginning July 1, 2024;

*Section 5.* Based on these facts and circumstances presented and the information received during the public hearing, increases in wastewater rates are necessary and hereby adopted.

The Pajaro County Sanitation District (PCSD) system provides wastewater service to approximately 1,047 residential, commercial, institutional, and industrial wastewater connections within the PCSD. The PCSD is proposing a five (5) year wastewater rate program adjustment for wastewater customers which will be considered at a Public Hearing on May 21, 2024, at 1:30 p.m. to hear protests for and against proposed increase in wastewater service fees pursuant to Proposition 218 requirements. If approved, the rate adjustments will be collected on the property tax roll beginning with the 2024-25 Fiscal Year. You are receiving this notification in compliance with the California Constitution Article XIII D Section 6 (a) (Proposition 218) which requires that impacted property owners are mailed a notice of proposed rate changes at least 45 days prior to a public hearing.

#### Why are Wastewater Rate Increases Needed?

Wastewater service rates for the PCSD have remained unchanged for over 15 years. Rate increases are necessary to pay for the costs of providing wastewater collection and treatment, fund necessary repairs and equipment replacement costs, and provide for capital improvements to the wastewater collection system.

#### **Proposed Wastewater Rate Increases**

The PCSD is proposing to implement service charges at the rates shown below. The basis for the proposed rate increases is set forth in the Pajaro County Sanitation District Wastewater Rate Study, dated February 2024 (Rate Study) and prepared by the Tuckfield & Associates. Proposed rate increases will take effect on July 1, 2024, and will be collected on the property tax roll. The proposed rates are designed to recover the costs of providing service fairly and equitably to PCSD customers.

#### How Can I have Input on the Proposed Wastewater Services Charge?

At the Public Hearing on May 21, 2024, the PCSD Board of Directors will consider adoption of the proposed sewer rate increases and will receive public comments as well as written protests by the property owners supporting or opposing the proposed rate increases. If written protests are submitted by more than 50% of the property owners of record prior to the conclusion of the public hearing, the Board of Directors will not increase the rates at this time as a matter of Law. Only one (1) protest will be counted for each property.

#### How Do I File a Written Protest?

If you oppose the proposed wastewater rate increase, Proposition 218 requires that your protest be submitted in writing to be counted, even if you plan to attend the Public Hearing. To be counted, the protest must (1) be in writing; (2) state opposition to the proposed rate increase; (3) identify the parcel by assessor's parcel number or street address; (4) include the original signature of all the property owners of record; and (5) be received before the conclusion of the Public Hearing that is scheduled for **Tuesday, May 21, 2024**.

# **RECOMMENDATION:**

It is recommended that the Board of Supervisors acting as the Board of Directors of the Pajaro County Sanitation District:

a. Conduct a Public Hearing to hear objections to, or protests against, the proposed wastewater service rate increase by property owners within the service area pursuant to Proposition 218 requirements;

b. Direct the Clerk of the Board to tabulate and certify assessment ballots received before the conclusion of the public hearing;

c. Determine whether or not a majority protest exists;

d. If a majority protest exists, no rate increase may be imposed;

e. If no majority protest exists, adopt a resolution approving the proposed wastewater rate increase; and

f. Recommend a \$1,409,300 funding source for the Fiscal Year 2024-25 General Fund subsidy required based on the proposed wastewater rate structure.

# SUMMARY/DISCUSSION:

The County-Owned PCSD wastewater collection system (PCSD System) is in northern unincorporated area of the County of Monterey. The PCSD System serves the communities of Bay Farms, Las Lomas, Pajaro Sunny Mesa, and Pajaro. It includes approximately 16.5 miles of gravity sewer pipe, six pump stations, and approximately 2.4 miles of force sewer main. There are approximately 1,047 sewer connections and 1,768 billing units. The PCSD System is a collection system only. Collected sewage is pumped to the City of Watsonville wastewater treatment plant for treatment. A site location map is presented in Attachment A.

Wastewater service rates for the PCSD have not changed since 2007 and costs to operate and maintain the system have increased significantly since then. This has resulted in an inability of PCSD to generate sufficient revenues to offset operational and infrastructure costs. Thus, in Fall 2022, District staff initiated the process to increase sewer service rates for the PCSD System.

During the November 30, 2022, Budget Committee meeting, staff presented alternative customer service rates for the Committee's consideration which would go into effect on July 1, 2023. The Budget Committee recommended the rate study move forward assuming outstanding General Fund loans totaling \$1,941,661 would be forgiven, an additional \$2.1 million in capital improvement funding and up to \$3.5 million to supplement operating costs would be provided over the next 5 years.

During a Budget Committee meeting on March 29, 2023, staff recommended rate increases be postponed until July 1, 2024, to allow time for residents and businesses within the Community of Pajaro to recover from the devastating storms that occurred in March 2023; during an August 29, 2023, meeting, the Board formally approved postponing rate increases.

During a January 19, 2024, Board of Directors meeting, Staff presented three alternative single family residential rate increase scenarios. The first scenario contemplated a first-year single family residential rate increase from approximately \$30 to \$60/month for the first year with annual increases based on the consumer price index (CPI); the second scenario contemplated a rate increase from approximately \$30 to \$60/month for the first year with an annual increase of \$10/month for the next five years; and the third rate scenario was calculated assuming no County subsidy, resulting in a rate increase from approximately \$30 to \$129.46/month. The Board approved pursuing a hybrid of these scenarios: a single-family residential rate of \$60/month for the first year and annual increases thereafter of \$5/month plus an increase based on the CPI.

A Proposition 218-compliant rate study report has been prepared and is presented in Attachment B (the rate study report). A summary of proposed monthly rates detailed in the rate study report, is presented in Attachment C and a Notice of Public Hearing, mailed March 27, 2024, with Spanish translation, is presented in Attachment D. A Certificate of Clerk of the Board Statement of Protests, and a Resolution Establishing New Wastewater Rates are included as Attachments E and F, respectively.

The public hearing is being convened to hear objections to, or protests against, the proposed sewer service rate increases by property owners pursuant to Proposition 218 requirements. It was set by the Board of Directors on March 26, 2024. The Notice of Public Hearing (with proposed wastewater rates and Spanish translation) was mailed to property owners on March 28, 2024, and published in the Monterey County Weekly on April 4, 2024. Additionally, the Notice of Public Hearing was posted on the County of Monterey PWFP webpage. Copies of the Rate Study and Notice of Public Hearing with proposed wastewater rates were made available at the PWFP offices.

Prior to any Board action, four (4) community outreach events were held in the PCSD to inform property owners of the increase. The first community outreach event was held on November 7,

2023, in Las Lomas, and the second on November 14th in Bay Farms. Subsequent meetings were convened in Pajaro and again in Las Lomas on January 24 and March 19, 2024, respectively. Rate increases, as presented in the rate study were explained and discussed, and information regarding the wastewater system, as well as the need to increase rates, was provided during the community outreach events.

The public hearing is mandated by the Proposition 218 Majority Protest Process. The proposed new rate structure will only be implemented if, upon the conclusion of the public hearing, a majority (50% plus one [1]) of written protests are received. Per Proposition 218, only one (1) written protest will be counted for each property for purposes of determining if there is a majority protest. To be counted, the protest must (1) be in writing; (2) state opposition to the proposed rate increase; (3) identify the parcel by assessor's parcel number or street address; (4) include the original signature(s) of the property owner(s) of record; and (5) be received before the conclusion of the Public Hearing on Tuesday, May 21, 2024.

# Changes to Customer Billing Procedures

Currently, Monterey One Water (M1W) provides monthly billing services to PCSD customers. Beginning July 1, 2024, M1W will change its billing method from monthly invoicing to annual billing through the County property tax roll. Similarly, PCSD customers will no longer receive an invoice from M1W. As of July 1, 2024, if billing through the property tax roll is approved by the Board through a separate Board action, PCSD sewer charges will appear on the property owner's respective property tax bill. Wastewater service charges for the entire year will be billed in November, and at least half of the amount will be due by December 10th and the remainder will be due by April 10th. For example, for 1 EDU, the new rate will be \$60.00 per month; thus, \$720.00 will be billed in November 2024 and \$360.00 will be due on December 10, 2024, and the remaining \$360.00 will be due on April 10, 2025. Wastewater charges will increase in future years but will be billed similarly. Staff notes that the County of Monterey and the Treasurer-Tax Collector have authorized *Easy Smart Pay*, a third-party vendor, to provide a monthly payment option for the payment of property taxes

(<<u>https://easysmartpay.net/monterey-ca></u>). This service is free of charge provided ACH (bank to bank) transfers are utilized.

# OTHER AGENCY INVOLVEMENT:

This matter was presented to the Budget Committee on November 30, 2022, and on March 29, 2023. During the March 29, 2023, Budget Committee Meeting, the Committee discussed postponing implementation of new customer service rates to provide time for the Pajaro community to recover from the March 10, 2023, flood and to allow staff to conduct community meetings after the community has had time to recover. Staff presented three alternative single family residential rate increase scenarios at the January 19, 2024, Board of Directors meeting. Per Proposition 218 requirements, the public hearing was set by the Board of Directors on March 26, 2024.

# FINANCING:

The plan to increase wastewater services rates supported by the Board of Directors on March 26th, 2024, includes General Fund loan forgiveness of \$1,941,661 and General Fund subsidies to the District for the foreseeable future to keep rates consistent with surrounding communities. Over the next five years, the General Fund subsidies are estimated to be \$1,409,300 (FY

2024-25), \$1,357,350 (FY 2025-26), \$1,073,300 (FY 2026-27), \$954,400 (FY 2027-28) and \$1,183,400 (FY 2028-29). The FY 2024-25 Recommended Budget does not include the necessary subsidy of \$1,409,300 and would require the Board of Supervisors to identify a General Fund funding source. Potential funding sources for the Board's consideration include General Fund Unassigned Fund Balance and Contingencies.

# BOARD OF SUPERVISORS STRATEGIC INITIATIVES:

# **RECOMMENDATION:**

b. Direct the Department of Public Works, Facilities and Parks to prepare a final Report of 2023 Delinquent Fees for the Pajaro County Sanitation District; and

c. Direct the Department of Public Works, Facilities and Parks to publish a Notice of Public Hearing and mail it to the property owners listed in the report not less than 10 days prior to the date of hearing.

# SUMMARY:

The proposed actions will set a Public Hearing to consider placing past due sanitation service charges for the Pajaro County Sanitation District (PCSD) on the Property Tax Roll to facilitate collections. This assessment will be in the form of a lien placed on the property owner's real property until such time that the delinquent balance is paid in full.

# DISCUSSION:

PCSD provides wastewater collection services to 1,047 customers in the Pajaro, Las Lomas, and Bay Farms communities. Monterey One Water (M1W) currently acts as the billing agency for the PCSD. As of July 1, 2024, M1W will no longer provide billing/collection services for the PCSD.

In 1999, the Board of Supervisors adopted ordinances removing sanitation service charges from the Property Tax Roll and provided instead for collection through a monthly billing system. On June 9, 2007, the Board of Supervisors adopted Ordinance No. 05054 establishing procedures for collection of delinquent fees for PCSD through the Property Tax Roll. The procedures

include holding a public hearing once a year to hear the Report of Delinquent Sanitation Fees and any protests or objections by property owners liable to be assessed for delinquent fees.

The Report of 2023 Delinquent Fees (Attachment A) lists property owners within the PCSD that have accrued unpaid balances for calendar year 2023 on accounts for 82 parcels, despite multiple billing notices. The proposed action will schedule the required hearing for the 82 parcels with past due 2023 balances. On April 12, 2024, affected property owners were notified by letter that they have delinquent 2023 sewer accounts. If payments were not made, a second notification letter was sent out on or before May 6, 2024. The letters informed each property owner of the past due amount as of December 31, 2023, and that the delinquent amount is subject to collection through placement of a lien on their property. Notices of the June 11, 2024, public hearing will be mailed not less than 10 days prior to the hearing to property owners listed in the Report. The public hearing notice (Attachment B) will be published in the Monterey County Weekly not less than 10 days prior to said hearing.

# **OTHER AGENCY INVOLVEMENT:**

For Fiscal Year Ending June 30, 2024, M1W is the billing agency for the PCSD. M1W notified PWFP that it will no longer act as the billing agency as of July 1, 2024. A proposed ordinance to change the billing method to collect sewer charges through the Property Tax Roll is pending for adoption on May 21, 2024. Placement of the liens on the Property Tax Roll is completed by the Office of the Treasurer-Tax Collector.

# FINANCING:

Collectively, past due amounts for calendar year 2023 for PCSD currently total \$42,099 from 82 parcels. Costs associated with processing the liens for the delinquent accounts, including data processing, accounting, noticing, and control procedures, are calculated at \$60 per parcel for a total of \$4,920. In accordance with Ordinance No. 05054, the processing costs will be added as lien transfer fees to the delinquent amount on a per parcel basis prior to forwarding the accounts to the Treasurer-Tax Collector, for a total lien amount of \$47,019. PCSD's main revenue is generated from sewer fees, with additional revenues allocated from a portion of the general property tax. Additionally, revenue from the prior year's delinquent accounts is collected when property tax payments are made in December and April of the following year. All calendar year 2023 past due account balances and late penalty and lien transfer fees collected will be deposited to Fund 151 for PCSD. The current past due amount is consistent with previous annual past due amounts. The PCSD current revenue budget is \$5,268,926 year-to-date revenue collected totaling \$866,170. The current expenditure budget is \$7,586,167 with year-to-date expenditures totaling \$3,377,011. The budget reflects funding from Federal Aid and State Disaster Relief funds. The estimated ending fund balance for FY24 is \$607,001. The current budget can accommodate this decrease in revenue until the past due accounts can be collected on the FY 2024-25 Property Tax Roll in December 2024 and April 2025. Delinquent payments may be made through the date of the public hearing.

# BOARD OF SUPERVISORS STRATEGIC INITIATIVES:

The collection of past due amounts and lien transfer fees for delinquent accounts ensure continued cash flow to fund maintenance and operations. Responsible fiscal management ensures that sewer infrastructure needs are met and improves public health and safety.

Adopt an ordinance amending Section 16 of Pajaro County Sanitation District (PCSD) Ordinance No. 05054 to provide for the collection of sewer charges through the County of Monterey Property Tax Roll.

# **RECOMMENDATION:**

It is recommended that the Board of Supervisors, acting as the Board of Directors of the Pajaro County Sanitation District (PCSD), adopt an ordinance to amend Section 16 of PCSD Ordinance No. 05054 to provide for the collection of sewer service charges through the Property Tax Roll of the County of Monterey.

# SUMMARY/DISCUSSION:

On May 7, 2024, the Board of Supervisors acting as the Board of Directors of the PCSD introduced, waived reading, and set a hearing for adoption of the ordinance on May 21, 2024, at 10:30 a.m.

The PCSD currently contracts with Monterey One Water (M1W) to provide sewer billing and collection services for PCSD customers. On November 16, 2023, M1W notified the County of Monterey Department of Public Works, Facilities and Parks (PWFP0 that beginning with Fiscal Year 2024-25, M1W will cease providing this service to the PCSD. Therefore, PWFP staff recommends that the Board adopt an ordinance to amend Section 16 of PCSD Ordinance No 05054 to allow for the collection of sewer service charges through the Property Tax Roll of the County of Monterey pursuant to California Health and Safety Code Section 5470 et. seq. in order to collect service charges to cover the costs of providing wastewater collection services to PCSD customers.

The PCSD provides services to the communities of Bay Farms, Las Lomas, Pajaro Sunny Mesa, and Pajaro. PWFP currently manages the PCSD and does not currently have the capability to provide in-house billing services. It has been determined that the least costly and most efficient method of collecting the sewer service charges is by placing these property related fees and charges on the Property Tax Roll beginning with the FY 2024-25 tax year. The County/PCSD has been utilizing this method to collect on delinquent PCSD accounts since on or about 2010.

In addition, the County of Monterey and the Treasurer-Tax Collector have authorized Easy Smart Pay, a third-party vendor, to provide a monthly payment option for the payment of property taxes which will include the PCSD sewer service charges.

If PCSD does not provide for billing through the Property Tax Roll, PWFP will need to bill customers directly. To undertake this responsibility in-house would require an additional Accounting Technician

position at a cost of \$124,500 annually, one-time software costs estimated between \$10,000-\$20,000 and ongoing software maintenance costs. These costs could be shared between the three sanitation districts (Pajaro County Sanitation District, Boronda County Sanitation District and County Service Area 75-Chualar). Alternatively, PWFP could outsource the monthly billing, at a cost of \$12,200-18,400 annually, plus an initial implementation fee. Such a service will take time to procure and contract and will cost more than providing for the collection of sewer service charges through the Property Tax Roll, as provided in the proposed ordinance.

# OTHER AGENCY INVOLVEMENT

The Office of the County Counsel has approved the ordinance as to form and the County Administrative Office supports the recommendation.

# FINANCING:

M1W water currently charges the PCSD \$14,804 annually for sewer services billing and collection services which will cease when their billing and collection services stop on June 30, 2024. Internal expenses resulting from the billing modification will be minimal, including staff time to prepare the necessary annual Board of Directors report to allow the County to collect annual sewer service charges. This incremental cost will be offset by a savings in staff time as delinquent sewer account processing will no longer be necessary. Additionally, the Auditor Controller's office charges ¼ of 1 percent of revenue collected on the County Property Tax Roll. The estimated 2024-25 revenue from PCSD billing is \$1,324,000, resulting in an estimated annual charge by the Auditor-Controller's Office of \$3,310.
