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What is VAMP

Vehicle Asset Management Program (VAMP), also known as the Vehicle Replacement Program (VRP)

- Established in Fiscal Year 2011-12
- A voluntary capital planning tool for departments
- Reflects industry-standard and government best practices
- Supports long-term sustainability of vehicle and equipment
- Reduces emergency vehicle replacement costs
- Improves forecasting of operational and budgetary needs
- Does not include all County fleet

How VAMP Works

- Participating departments contribute a monthly fee per vehicle
- Contributions are based on vehicle estimated replacement cost
- Contributions are used solely for the replacement of the specific vehicle
 - Collected amount remains until replaced
- Vehicles are replaced upon reaching useful life and department request
- Typical vehicle lifespan: 6–8 years
- Contributions earn interest while awaiting replacement

Governance and Structure

- Fund 478 Resource Planning (Internal Service Fund) administered by the CAO
- PWFP began managing VAMP in FY 2022-23 as one of four capital planning subfunds:
 - VAMP Vehicle Asset Management (voluntary)
 - 2. ERP Enterprise Resource Planning
 - 3. BIR Building Improvement & Replacement
 - 4. EIR Equipment Improvement & Replacement

FY 2026 Contribution Overview

- General Fund departments scheduled to contribute: \$2,996,382
- PWFP scheduled contribution: \$523,199 suspended for FY 2025-26 in lieu of eliminating filled positions
- All contributions are voluntary and managed by each department in partnership with PWFP-Fleet

VAMP Fund Balance

- Beginning Balance as of FY 2024-25: \$34.4 million set aside for future vehicle replacements
- Substantial reserve reflects strong participation and long-term planning
- Funds are restricted and can only be used by those departments that paid in

VAMP Balances by Department (General Fund)

- Collections to Date reflect savings set aside for future vehicle replacement
 - Some vehicles have reached full collection but are not yet replaced
 - Older Vehicles may have stopped collecting below today's replacement cost
- Balance to Collect reflects outstanding amount to collect for future replacement

Pros and Cons of Suspending Contributions (One-Year Pause)

Pros of Suspending Contributions

- Frees up General Fund dollars for FY 2025-26
- Helps departments avoid staff reductions or service cuts
- Flexibility: Department has a choice based on current fleet health
- Opportunity to reassess fleet strategy and contribution formulas

Cons of Suspending Contributions

- Potential delays in vehicle replacement
- Contributions must resume in future years to maintain fleet health
- Suspending contributions may create future pressure to "catch up" on savings
- Some departments are reimbursed for VAMP through external sources
- Some departments are on a strict replacement schedule (ex. Sheriff)

Summary

- VAMP is voluntary, long-term capital planning tool
- Temporary contribution suspension can offer short-term relief
- Impact of suspending VAMP contributions varies across departments
- Fund balance is restricted (belongs to department that contributed)
