

#### Activities Allowed in Red Tier

#### Effective Wednesday, March 17:

- Restaurant indoor dining capacity is limited to 25% or 100 people, whichever is less.
- Retail store indoor capacity is limited to 50% and grocery stores can operate at full capacity.
- Shopping center indoor capacity is limited to 50%, with reduced capacity food courts.
- Gym and fitness center indoor capacity is limited to 10%.
- Movie theater indoor capacity is limited to 25% or 100 people, whichever is less.

#### Activities Allowed in Red Tier


#### Effective Wednesday, March 17:

- Zoo, museum, and aquarium indoor capacity is limited to 25%.
- Higher education indoor lectures and student gatherings are limited to 25% capacity or 100 people, whichever is less.
- Schools may reopen grades TK through 12 for in-person instruction after they have publicly posted their COVID-19 Safety Plans for at least five days.

## Possible Reasons for Decreased Testing Rates

- Fewer people ill/fewer exposures
- Less travel (non-holiday season)
- More interest in vaccinating than testing
- Pandemic fatigue
- Fear of repercussions of positive test (loss of income and/or housing)

#### **Expanded Testing Opportunities**

#### LHI Optum Traveling Team for Schools

- ➤ Added capacity of up to 1,000 tests per week
- ➤ Onsite, free testing for educational employees
- Easy access, appointments facilitated by school staff
- > 7 sites currently with possibility of expansion:
  - ➤ Gonzales Unified School District, Laurel Wood Elementary School, Lincoln Elementary School, Natividad Elementary School, Pacific Grove Unified School District and Vista Verde Middle School
- ➤ Utilization currently at 3%



#### **Expanded Testing Opportunities**

#### Agricultural Worksite Testing Options from CA Testing Task Force

- > Employers may choose rapid antigen testing or PCR testing
- >CDPH will provide ordering physician, laboratory director, and CLIA waiver
- If utilizing PCR testing, companies can drop off tests at LHI sites rather than pay shipping
- There is no maximum limit on number of tests
- For PCR testing, CDPH will collect insurance information but not bill client if no insurance or insurance does not fully cover cost

#### Who Should be Tested

People with symptoms of COVID-19, including people that have had COVID-19 and people who have been vaccinated.

People who are infectious are identified and isolate from others to reduce the spread of COVID-19

People who have had close contact with someone with COVID-19

 People who are exposed to COVID-19 and in quarantine can know if they have developed COVID-19 and can then isolate appropriately

People who cannot work from home and must engage the public

• Regular screening can identify people who have developed COVID-19 and can then remove themselves from the worksite and prevent further spread of COVID-19 in the worksite.


People who have been advised by their health care provider to get tested.

### Immunizations

#### Vaccination Eligibility: March 17

- > Everyone 65 years of age and older
- People at risk of exposure while working in health care, education, childcare, food, agriculture, and emergency services sectors
- ➤ People 16 64 years of age with underlying medical conditions or disabilities that place them at greatest risk for severe COVID-19 disease

# Community Actions to Reduce COVID-19 Infections

## Strategies to Further Reduce Transmission of COVID-19

- Wear a face covering when outside the home
- Avoid gatherings
- Wash hands frequently
- Practice social distancing
- Get vaccinated when you are eligible
- Get tested if you have been in contact with someone who is sick or if you feel sick yourself
