## California vs. United States, 2014




# Age Group of the Uninsured vs. Total Population




California, 2014



# No Usual Source of Care, by Insurance Source



California, 2014



# Reasons Cited for Lack of Insurance

Notes: All numbers reflect population under age 65. Other reasons for not having insurance include: can get health care for free / pay for own; not offered at job; delay due to switching insurance companies; family situation changed; not eligible due to working status; in process of looking for / getting insurance; can't qualify for public program coverage; don't know where or how to get insurance; health insurance was canceled/dropped; procrastination; and falsely thinking oneself insured.

Blue Shield estimates half of CA's Remaining Uninsured are undocumented.  
50% of 96,000 = 48,000

# Programs available for the Remaining Uninsured

## Low income, documented:

- ▶ CHDP/Gateway – for uninsured children who need immunizations or physicals.
- ▶ Every Woman Counts – for uninsured or under-insured women 40+ who require a mammogram screening.
- ▶ Family Pact – for patients of reproductive age who need family planning services, pap smears, STD testing & treatment, birth control. (does not cover infertility)
- ▶ Merck Assistance Program – Uninsured or under insured patients may qualify for vaccine coverage. (does not include administration fee). Program includes: human papillomavirus, measles mumps & rubella (MMR), Pneumococcal, Hepatitis B, Hepatitis A, Varicella Virus, and Zoster.

## Low income, undocumented:

- ▶ Pilot Project for the Remaining Uninsured: specific pharmacy, radiology and laboratory services.
- ▶ Emergency Medi Cal: medical care directly related to an emergency, including renal dialysis services and emergency labor and delivery.

# Gaps in Healthcare for the Remaining Uninsured

- ▶ No medical home
- ▶ Difficulty getting to clinic (geographically remote)
- ▶ No access to Specialty care
- ▶ Even basic services often unaffordable

# Pilot Project Status

- ▶ November 1, 2015 start through October 11, 2016
  - 1,315 enrolled
  - Spent \$72,877 of \$500,000 to date
