OVERVIEW OF 2018 MIDTERM ELECTION RESULTS:

The November 6, 2018, midterm elections were full of mixed results across the U.S., including in California. Although ballots at designated precincts may have been reported, there are **still more than 4.5 million provisional and mail-in ballots left to be counted throughout the state**. County elections officials plan to complete all their work related to the general election by December 7, 2018.

- As expected, Lieutenant Governor Gavin Newsom was elected Governor, becoming the second progressive Democratic former Bay Area mayor in a row to become Governor. In addition, Democrats were elected to every partisan state constitutional office.
- Unexpectedly, the \$8.9 Billion water bond, included in Proposition 3, appears to be headed for defeat as it is trailing, at the moment, by 4 points.
- Democrats in both houses of the legislature appear poised to enjoy super-majorities beginning in December.

All of this means that Democratic control of California state government continues to strengthen and shows no sign of reversing in any future election. Below please find a summary of the election results.
