Monterey County Family and Children's Services HHHS Committee Report October 2022 Data

INTRODUCTION

Monterey County Family and Children's Services (FCS) offers child protective services, foster care services, and adoption services to children and youth in Monterey County. The mission of FCS is to prevent the occurrence of child abuse and neglect. Service goals strive to keep children and youth safe and within the protection of a permanent family.

This report provides a monthly update to the data provided on November 7, 2022. The staffing updates included in this report are current as of November 15, 2022. The monthly data and caseload numbers included in this report is for the month of October 2022.

INTAKE

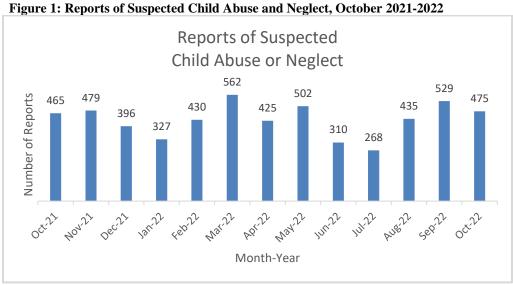
I. Staffing

Since the last report, one supervisor in the Intake Unit has taken a leave of absence. In addition, one social worker was re-assigned to an Emergency Response unit temporarily, and one social worker was re-assigned to the Intake Unit from the Court Unit temporarily.

II. Data

A. Figure 1 shows the monthly reports of suspected child abuse or neglect received in Monterey County over the past year.



B. In October 2022, Monterey County received 475 reports of suspected child abuse or neglect. Figure 2 displays the response priority for all referrals received in October 2022.

C. In October 2022, there were 151 referrals that required an investigation out of the 475 reports received. Figure 3 shows the amount of time that it took the ER social worker to make a qualified contact with the family once assigned a referral in October 2022.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE

I. Staffing

Since the last report, FCS has added 8 social workers to the Emergency Response (ER) Units. The ER social worker/supervisor positions went from 52% vacant to 20% vacant over the past month.

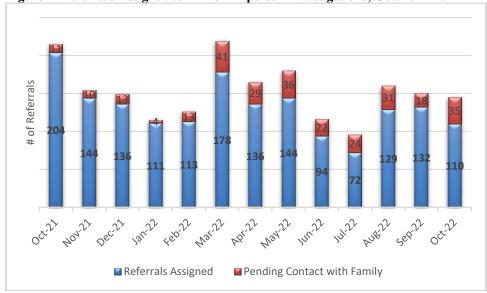

II. Data

A. Figure 4 shows the number of referrals that have been assigned to ER social workers over the past year. The blue bars show the number of assigned referrals that have a qualified contact with the family, and the red bars are the assigned referrals that are pending contact with the family.

B. **AB636 Measure 2B: Referrals by Time to Investigation (10-Day)** is the state's quarterly measure that contacts for in-person investigations were made within 10 days. From July to September 2022 (Q3), Monterey County was 73.9% compliant compared to the state goal of 90%, as shown in Figure 5. The compliance rate increased by .4% from Q2 to Q3.

C. **AB636 Measure 2B: Referrals by Time to Investigation (Immediate)** is the state's quarterly measure that contacts for in-person investigations were made within 24 hours. From July to September 2022 (Q3), Monterey County was 90.3% compliant compared to the state goal of 90%, as shown in Figure 6. The compliance rate increased by 4.8% from Q2 to Q3.

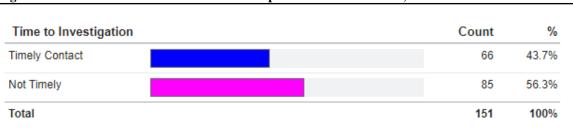
Figure 7: State Measure 2D: Time to First Completed Referral Contact, Q3 - 2022

D. State Measure 2D: Time to First Completed Referral Contact (Quarterly) is the state's measure for whether or not a qualified first contact occurred timely for all referrals received during the quarter. Figure 7 shows timely contacts for all investigated referrals received from July through September 2022 (Q3). The compliance rate increased by 2.3% from Q2 to Q3.

E. State Measure 2D: Time to First Completed Referral Contact (Monthly) is the state's measure for whether or not a qualified first contact occurred timely for all referrals received during the selected month. Figure 8 shows timely contacts for all investigated referrals received in October 2022. Timely contacts increased by 9.8% from Q2 to Q3.

III. Caseloads

A. Assignments

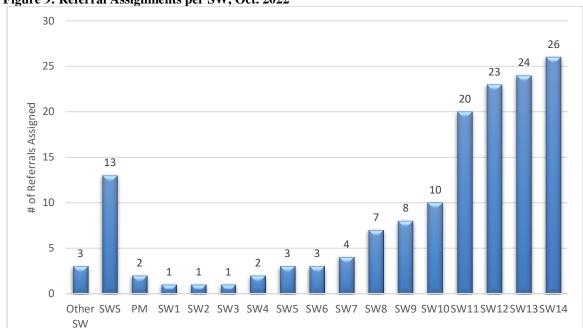


Figure 9: Referral Assignments per SW, Oct. 2022

In October 2022, there were 151 referrals that required an in-person investigation. At that time, there were 14 social workers in the ER Units

available for referral assignment. As can be seen in Figure 9, the referrals were assigned to ER social workers (SW), supervisors (SWS), the program manager (PM), or other social workers in the agency (Other SW). Referral assignments fluctuate based on staff time off, social workers needing to be taken off of assignment rotation in order to address their backlog of open referrals, and new social workers moved into the unit at various times.

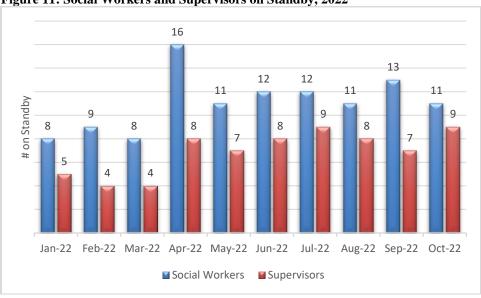


Figure 11: Social Workers and Supervisors on Standby, 2022

A. As can be seen in Figure 11, there were 11 social workers and 9 social work supervisors who worked standby in October 2022.

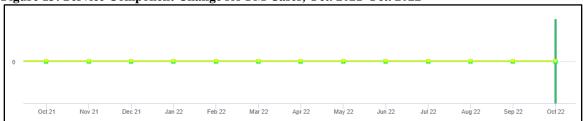
Figure 12: Family Stabilization Cases Open, Oct. 2022

B. **AB 636 Measure 4A: Placement with Siblings** is a state measure that shows the proportion of children who were in a placement setting with all or some siblings. Figure 16 displays data from July 1, 2022 through September 30, 2022 that shows 48% of Monterey County foster children are placed with all of their siblings. The rate of children placed with all siblings decreased by .6% from Q2 to Q3.

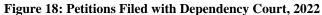

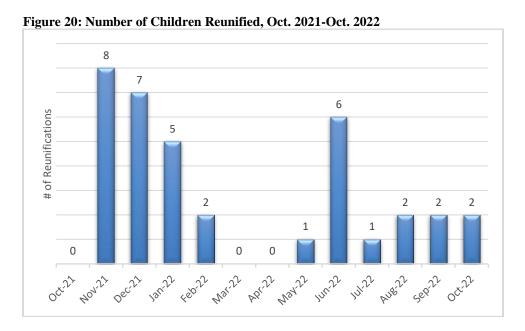

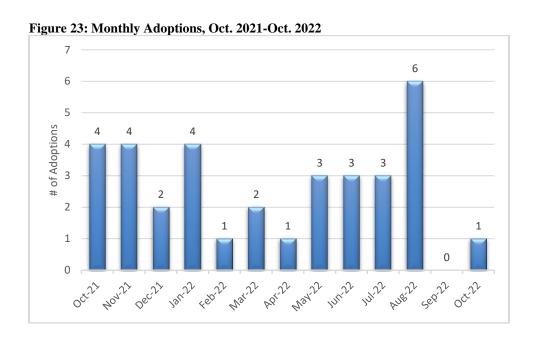

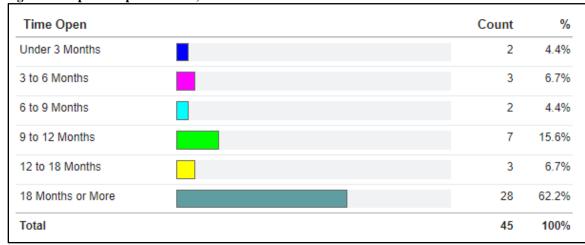

CFSR MEASURES

I. **CFSR Measure P1: Permanency in 12 Months for Children Entering Care** is a state measure of all children who entered foster care in the selected 12-month period and calculates the percent who achieved permanency within 12 months of their removal. This measure presented in Figure 29 is for children who entered foster care between October 1, 2020 and September 30, 2021. The P1 Measure decreased by 4.2% from the last report.

II. **CFSR Measure P2: Permanency in 12 Months for Children Entering Care** is a measure of all children who have been in foster care for 12-23 months and achieve permanency. The measure presented in Figure 30 is for children in foster care for 12-23 months as of October 1, 2021. The P2 Measure decreased by 5.8% from the last report.

III. CDSS CFSR Measure P3: Permanency in 12 Months for Children in Foster Care 24 Months or More is a measure of all children who have been in foster care for 24 months or more on the first day of the selected 12-month period and determines what percent were discharged to permanency within 12 months of the start of the period. The measure presented in Figure 31 include children in foster care for 24 months or more as of October 1, 2021. The P3 Measure decreased by 3.3% from the last report.

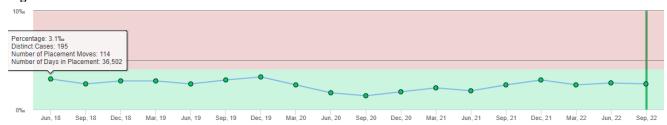
