WASHINGTON, D.C., May 16.—(UPI)—The new FCC has now ruled by 11 to 1 that Telephone merging, Prudential and General, since the continued locking of the telephone system by the two companies will force the telephone to move their four areas of domination and deception.

An executive spokesman of Telecom said the decision was the best news the world could get that day. Then the ruling resulted in a resounding cheering from the members and pressmen who had gathered in the room.

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

An hour's trip to Brazil back is a grand way to spend an afternoon—as the Watsonville Woman's club had an opportunity to find out Friday. Carlino Watsonville high's faculty member in the history-social sciences department, gave his audience on a quick tour of Rio de Janeiro, Sao Paulo and interior parts of Brazil via color slides.

Coelho was on sabbatical last year, spending a year at the University of Sao Paulo studying the history and geography of the country. And although Coelho assured his listeners that Rio is all glamour but has slums interspersed with skyscrapers, from the top panaroma we first saw, white buildings against the curve of blue water seemed very wonderful.


