⁵ FORA allocated 134 afy of recycled water availability to the County to supplement the groundwater allocation. MCWD required the East Garrison development to be dual-plumbed for recycled water, where an estimated 75 afy could be used for landscape and open space areas. In addition, the County required the MPC EVOC project to use recycled water where feasible, which has been estimated to be potentially 20 afy. However, use of recycled water is contingent on MCWD providing the infrastructure to deliver the recycled water, and MCWD has stated they do not intend to provide the infrastructure until the groundwater allocation is being utilized, not just allocated. It is uncertain if MCWD will extend the infrastructure out to use recycled water at East Garrison or the MPC/EVOC projects. Until/unless MCWD installs (or at least plans for such in their CIP) recycled water lines, the County presumes it is limited to 720 afy of groundwater. In that regard, to date the County has committed 526.2 afy of groundwater, leaving 193.8 afy available for future sub-allocations.
