COUNTY OF MONTEREY STANDARD AGREEMENT (NOT TO EXCEED \$100,000)

This Agreement is made by and between the County of Monterey, a political subdivision of the State of California (hereinafter "County") and: Monterey County Business Council (MCBC) (hereinafter "CONTRACTOR"). In consideration of the mutual covenants and conditions set forth in this Agreement, the parties agree as follows: 1.0 GENERAL DESCRIPTION. 1.01 The County hereby engages CONTRACTOR to perform, and CONTRACTOR hereby agrees to perform, the services described in Exhibit A in conformity with the terms of this Agreement. The goods and/or services are generally described as follows: Provide Facilitation and implementation of the Competitive Clusters Project. 2.0 PAYMENT PROVISIONS. County shall pay the CONTRACTOR in accordance with the payment provisions set forth 2.01 in Exhibit A, subject to the limitations set forth in this Agreement. The total amount payable by County to CONTRACTOR under this Agreement is not to exceed the sum of \$ 100,000.00 3.0 TERM OF AGREEMENT. 3.01 The of this term Agreement is from July 1, 2016 to June 30, 2017 , unless sooner terminated pursuant to the terms of this Agreement. This Agreement is of no force or effect until signed by both CONTRACTOR and County and with County signing last, and CONTRACTOR may not commence work before County signs this Agreement. 3.02 The County reserves the right to cancel this Agreement, or any extension of this Agreement, without cause, with a thirty day (30) written notice, or with cause immediately. 4.0 SCOPE OF SERVICES AND ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS. 4.01 The following attached exhibits are incorporated herein by reference and constitute a part of this Agreement: Exhibit A Scope of Services/Payment Provisions Exhibit B FY 2016-17 Work Plan

5.0 PERFORMANCE STANDARDS.

- 5.01 CONTRACTOR warrants that CONTRACTOR and CONTRACTOR's agents, employees, and subcontractors performing services under this Agreement are specially trained, experienced, competent, and appropriately licensed to perform the work and deliver the services required under this Agreement and are not employees of the County, or immediate family of an employee of the County.
- 5.02 CONTRACTOR, its agents, employees, and subcontractors shall perform all work in a safe and skillful manner and in compliance with all applicable laws and regulations. All work performed under this Agreement that is required by law to be performed or supervised by licensed personnel shall be performed in accordance with such licensing requirements.
- 5.03 CONTRACTOR shall furnish, at its own expense, all materials, equipment, and personnel necessary to carry out the terms of this Agreement, except as otherwise specified in this Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall not use County premises, property (including equipment, instruments, or supplies) or personnel for any purpose other than in the performance of its obligations under this Agreement.

6.0 PAYMENT CONDITIONS.

- 6.01 Prices shall remain firm for the initial term of the Agreement and, thereafter, may be adjusted annually as provided herein. The County does not guarantee any minimum or maximum amount of dollars to be spent under this Agreement.
- Negotiations for rate changes shall be commenced, by CONTRACTOR, a minimum of ninety days (90) prior to the expiration of the Agreement. Rate changes are not binding unless mutually agreed upon in writing by the County and the CONTRACTOR.
- 6.03 Invoice amounts shall be billed directly to the ordering department.
- 6.04 CONTRACTOR shall submit such invoice periodically or at the completion of services, but in any event, not later than 30 days after completion of services. The invoice shall set forth the amounts claimed by CONTRACTOR for the previous period, together with an itemized basis for the amounts claimed, and such other information pertinent to the invoice. The County shall certify the invoice, either in the requested amount or in such other amount as the County approves in conformity with this Agreement, and shall promptly submit such invoice to the County Auditor-Controller for payment. The County Auditor-Controller shall pay the amount certified within 30 days of receiving the certified invoice.

7.0 TERMINATION.

- 7.01 During the term of this Agreement, the County may terminate the Agreement for any reason by giving written notice of termination to the CONTRACTOR at least thirty (30) days prior to the effective date of termination. Such notice shall set forth the effective date of termination. In the event of such termination, the amount payable under this Agreement shall be reduced in proportion to the services provided prior to the date of termination.
- 7.02 The County may cancel and terminate this Agreement for good cause effective immediately upon written notice to CONTRACTOR. "Good cause" includes the failure of

CONTRACTOR to perform the required services at the time and in the manner provided under this Agreement. If County terminates this Agreement for good cause, the County may be relieved of the payment of any consideration to CONTRACTOR, and the County may proceed with the work in any manner, which County deems proper. The cost to the County shall be deducted from any sum due the CONTRACTOR under this Agreement.

7.03 The County's payments to CONTRACTOR under this Agreement are funded by local, state and federal governments. If funds from local, state and federal sources are not obtained and continued at a level sufficient to allow for the County's purchase of the indicated quantity of services, then the County may give written notice of this fact to CONTRACTOR, and the obligations of the parties under this Agreement shall terminate immediately, or on such date thereafter, as the County may specify in its notice, unless in the meanwhile the parties enter into a written amendment modifying this Agreement.

8.0 INDEMNIFICATION.

8.01 Contractor shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the County of Monterey (hereinafter "County"), its officers, agents and employees from any claim, liability, loss, injury or damage arising out of, or in connection with, performance of this Agreement by Contractor and/or its agents, employees or sub-contractors, excepting only loss, injury or damage caused by the negligence or willful misconduct of personnel employed by the County. It is the intent of the parties to this Agreement to provide the broadest possible coverage for the County. The Contractor shall reimburse the County for all costs, attorneys' fees, expenses and liabilities incurred with respect to any litigation in which the Contractor is obligated to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the County under this Agreement.

9.0 <u>INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS</u>.

9.01 Evidence of Coverage:

Prior to commencement of this Agreement, the Contractor shall provide a "Certificate of Insurance" certifying that coverage as required herein has been obtained. Individual endorsements executed by the insurance carrier shall accompany the certificate. In addition, the Contractor upon request shall provide a certified copy of the policy or policies.

This verification of coverage shall be sent to the County's Contracts/Purchasing Department, unless otherwise directed. The Contractor shall <u>not</u> receive a "Notice to Proceed" with the work under this Agreement until it has obtained all insurance required and the County has approved such insurance. This approval of insurance shall neither relieve nor decrease the liability of the Contractor.

9.02 Qualifying Insurers:

All coverage's, except surety, shall be issued by companies which hold a current policy holder's alphabetic and financial size category rating of not less than A- VII, according to the current Best's Key Rating Guide or a company of equal financial stability that is approved by the County's Purchasing Manager.

9.03 <u>Insurance Coverage Requirements:</u> Without limiting CONTRACTOR's duty to indemnify, CONTRACTOR shall maintain in effect throughout the term of this Agreement a policy or policies of insurance with the following minimum limits of liability:

<u>Commercial General Liability Insurance</u>, including but not limited to premises and operations, including coverage for Bodily Injury and Property Damage, Personal Injury, Contractual Liability, Broad form Property Damage, Independent Contractors, Products and Completed Operations, with a combined single limit for Bodily Injury and Property Damage of not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence.

(Note: any proposed modifications to these general liability insurance requirements shall be attached as an Exhibit hereto, and the section(s) above that are proposed as not applicable shall be lined out in blue ink. All proposed modifications are subject to County approval.)

Business Automobile Liability Insurance, covering all motor vehicles, including owned, leased, non-owned, and hired vehicles, used in providing services under this Agreement, with a combined single limit for Bodily Injury and Property Damage of not less than \$500,000 per occurrence.

(Note: any proposed modifications to these auto insurance requirements shall be attached as an Exhibit hereto, and the section(s) above that are proposed as not applicable shall be lined out in blue ink. All proposed modifications are subject to County approval.)

Workers' Compensation Insurance, if CONTRACTOR employs others in the performance of this Agreement, in accordance with California Labor Code section 3700 and with Employer's Liability limits not less than \$1,000,000 each person, \$1,000,000 each accident and \$1,000,000 each disease.

(Note: any proposed modifications to these workers' compensation insurance requirements shall be attached as an Exhibit hereto, and the section(s) above that are proposed as not applicable shall be lined out in blue ink. All proposed modifications are subject to County approval.)

Professional Liability Insurance, if required for the professional services being provided, (e.g., those persons authorized by a license to engage in a business or profession regulated by the California Business and Professions Code), in the amount of not less than \$1,000,000 per claim and \$2,000,000 in the aggregate, to cover liability for malpractice or errors or omissions made in the course of rendering professional services. If professional liability insurance is written on a "claims-made" basis rather than an occurrence basis, the CONTRACTOR shall, upon the expiration or earlier termination of this Agreement, obtain extended reporting coverage ("tail coverage") with the same liability limits. Any such tail coverage shall continue for at least three years following the expiration or earlier termination of this Agreement.

(Note: any proposed modifications to these insurance requirements shall be attached as an Exhibit hereto, and the section(s) above that are proposed as not applicable shall be lined out in blue ink. All proposed modifications are subject to County approval.)

9.04 Other Requirements:

All insurance required by this Agreement shall be with a company acceptable to the County and issued and executed by an admitted insurer authorized to transact Insurance business in the State of California. Unless otherwise specified by this Agreement, all such insurance shall be written on an occurrence basis, or, if the policy is not written on an occurrence basis, such policy with the coverage required herein shall continue in effect for a period of

Agreement ID: MCBC July 1, 2016-June 30, 2017 three years following the date CONTRACTOR completes its performance of services under this Agreement.

Each liability policy shall provide that the County shall be given notice in writing at least thirty days in advance of any endorsed reduction in coverage or limit, cancellation, or intended non-renewal thereof. Each policy shall provide coverage for Contractor and additional insureds with respect to claims arising from each subcontractor, if any, performing work under this Agreement, or be accompanied by a certificate of insurance from each subcontractor showing each subcontractor has identical insurance coverage to the above requirements.

Commercial general liability and automobile liability policies shall <u>provide an endorsement naming the County of Monterey, its officers, agents, and employees as Additional Insureds</u> with respect to liability arising out of the CONTRACTOR'S work, including ongoing and completed operations, and shall further provide that <u>such insurance is primary</u> insurance to any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the County and that the insurance of <u>the Additional Insureds shall not be called upon to contribute</u> to a loss covered by the CONTRACTOR'S insurance. The required endorsement form for Commercial General Liability Additional Insured is ISO Form CG 20 10 11-85 or CG 20 10 10 01 in tandem with CG 20 37 10 01 (2000). The required endorsement form for Automobile Additional Insured endorsement is ISO Form CA 20 48 02 99.

Prior to the execution of this Agreement by the County, CONTRACTOR shall file certificates of insurance with the County's contract administrator and County's Contracts/Purchasing Division, showing that the CONTRACTOR has in effect the insurance required by this Agreement. The CONTRACTOR shall file a new or amended certificate of insurance within five calendar days after any change is made in any insurance policy, which would alter the information on the certificate then on file. Acceptance or approval of insurance shall in no way modify or change the indemnification clause in this Agreement, which shall continue in full force and effect.

CONTRACTOR shall at all times during the term of this Agreement maintain in force the insurance coverage required under this Agreement and shall send, without demand by County, annual certificates to County's Contract Administrator and County's Contracts/Purchasing Division. If the certificate is not received by the expiration date, County shall notify CONTRACTOR and CONTRACTOR shall have five calendar days to send in the certificate, evidencing no lapse in coverage during the interim. Failure by CONTRACTOR to maintain such insurance is a default of this Agreement, which entitles County, at its sole discretion, to terminate this Agreement immediately.

10.0 RECORDS AND CONFIDENTIALITY.

10.01 Confidentiality. CONTRACTOR and its officers, employees, agents, and subcontractors shall comply with any and all federal, state, and local laws, which provide for the confidentiality of records and other information. CONTRACTOR shall not disclose any confidential records or other confidential information received from the County or prepared in connection with the performance of this Agreement, unless County specifically permits CONTRACTOR to disclose such records or information. CONTRACTOR shall promptly transmit to County any and all requests for disclosure of any such confidential records or information. CONTRACTOR shall not use any confidential information gained by

- CONTRACTOR in the performance of this Agreement except for the sole purpose of carrying out CONTRACTOR's obligations under this Agreement.
- 10.02 <u>County Records.</u> When this Agreement expires or terminates, CONTRACTOR shall return to County any County records which CONTRACTOR used or received from County to perform services under this Agreement.
- 10.03 Maintenance of Records. CONTRACTOR shall prepare, maintain, and preserve all reports and records that may be required by federal, state, and County rules and regulations related to services performed under this Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall maintain such records for a period of at least three years after receipt of final payment under this Agreement. If any litigation, claim, negotiation, audit exception, or other action relating to this Agreement is pending at the end of the three year period, then CONTRACTOR shall retain said records until such action is resolved.
- Access to and Audit of Records. The County shall have the right to examine, monitor and audit all records, documents, conditions, and activities of the CONTRACTOR and its subcontractors related to services provided under this Agreement. Pursuant to Government Code section 8546.7, if this Agreement involves the expenditure of public funds in excess of \$10,000, the parties to this Agreement may be subject, at the request of the County or as part of any audit of the County, to the examination and audit of the State Auditor pertaining to matters connected with the performance of this Agreement for a period of three years after final payment under the Agreement.
- 10.05 Royalties and Inventions. County shall have a royalty-free, exclusive and irrevocable license to reproduce, publish, and use, and authorize others to do so, all original computer programs, writings, sound recordings, pictorial reproductions, drawings, and other works of similar nature produced in the course of or under this Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall not publish any such material without the prior written approval of County.

11.0 NON-DISCRIMINATION.

11.01 During the performance of this Agreement, CONTRACTOR, and its subcontractors, shall not unlawfully discriminate against any person because of race, religious creed, color, sex, national origin, ancestry, physical disability, mental disability, medical condition, marital status, age (over 40), or sexual orientation, either in CONTRACTOR's employment practices or in the furnishing of services to recipients. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that the evaluation and treatment of its employees and applicants for employment and all persons receiving and requesting services are free of such discrimination. CONTRACTOR and any subcontractor shall, in the performance of this Agreement, fully comply with all federal, state, and local laws and regulations which prohibit discrimination. The provision of services primarily or exclusively to such target population as may be designated in this Agreement shall not be deemed to be prohibited discrimination.

12.0 COMPLIANCE WITH TERMS OF STATE OR FEDERAL GRANTS.

12.01 If this Agreement has been or will be funded with monies received by the County pursuant to a contract with the state or federal government in which the County is the grantee, CONTRACTOR will comply with all the provisions of said contract, to the extent applicable to CONTRACTOR as a subgrantee under said contract, and said provisions shall

be deemed a part of this Agreement, as though fully set forth herein. Upon request, County will deliver a copy of said contract to CONTRACTOR, at no cost to CONTRACTOR.

13.0 INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR.

13.01 In the performance of work, duties, and obligations under this Agreement, CONTRACTOR is at all times acting and performing as an independent contractor and not as an employee of the County. No offer or obligation of permanent employment with the County or particular County department or agency is intended in any manner, and CONTRACTOR shall not become entitled by virtue of this Agreement to receive from County any form of employee benefits including but not limited to sick leave, vacation, retirement benefits, workers' compensation coverage, insurance or disability benefits. CONTRACTOR shall be solely liable for and obligated to pay directly all applicable taxes, including federal and state income taxes and social security, arising out of CONTRACTOR's performance of this Agreement. In connection therewith, CONTRACTOR shall defend, indemnify, and hold County harmless from any and all liability which County may incur because of CONTRACTOR's failure to pay such taxes.

14.0 NOTICES.

14.01 Notices required under this Agreement shall be delivered personally or by first-class, postage pre-paid mail to the County and CONTRACTOR'S contract administrators at the addresses listed below:

- 15.02 <u>Amendment.</u> This Agreement may be amended or modified only by an instrument in writing signed by the County and the CONTRACTOR.

- 15.03 <u>Waiver</u>. Any waiver of any terms and conditions of this Agreement must be in writing and signed by the County and the CONTRACTOR. A waiver of any of the terms and conditions of this Agreement shall not be construed as a waiver of any other terms or conditions in this Agreement.
- 15.04 Contractor. The term "CONTRACTOR" as used in this Agreement includes CONTRACTOR's officers, agents, and employees acting on CONTRACTOR's behalf in the performance of this Agreement.
- 15.05 <u>Disputes.</u> CONTRACTOR shall continue to perform under this Agreement during any dispute.
- 15.06 Assignment and Subcontracting. The CONTRACTOR shall not assign, sell, or otherwise transfer its interest or obligations in this Agreement without the prior written consent of the County. None of the services covered by this Agreement shall be subcontracted without the prior written approval of the County. Notwithstanding any such subcontract, CONTRACTOR shall continue to be liable for the performance of all requirements of this Agreement.
- 15.07 Successors and Assigns. This Agreement and the rights, privileges, duties, and obligations of the County and CONTRACTOR under this Agreement, to the extent assignable or delegable, shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the parties and their respective successors, permitted assigns, and heirs.
- 15.08 <u>Compliance with Applicable Law.</u> The parties shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws and regulations in performing this Agreement.
- 15.09 <u>Headings</u>. The headings are for convenience only and shall not be used to interpret the terms of this Agreement.
- 15.10 <u>Time is of the Essence</u>. Time is of the essence in each and all of the provisions of this Agreement.
- 15.11 Governing Law. This Agreement shall be governed by and interpreted under the laws of the State of California.
- 15.12 Non-exclusive Agreement. This Agreement is non-exclusive and both County and CONTRACTOR expressly reserve the right to contract with other entities for the same or similar services.
- 15.13 Construction of Agreement. The County and CONTRACTOR agree that each party has fully participated in the review and revision of this Agreement and that any rule of construction to the effect that ambiguities are to be resolved against the drafting party shall not apply in the interpretation of this Agreement or any amendment to this Agreement.
- 15.14 <u>Counterparts.</u> This Agreement may be executed in two or more counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but all of which together shall constitute one and the same Agreement.

- 15.16 <u>Integration.</u> This Agreement, including the exhibits, represent the entire Agreement between the County and the CONTRACTOR with respect to the subject matter of this Agreement and shall supersede all prior negotiations, representations, or agreements, either written or oral, between the County and the CONTRACTOR as of the effective date of this Agreement, which is the date that the County signs the Agreement.
- 15.17 <u>Interpretation of Conflicting Provisions.</u> In the event of any conflict or inconsistency between the provisions of this Agreement and the Provisions of any exhibit or other attachment to this Agreement, the provisions of this Agreement shall prevail and control.

Agreement by and between the County of Monterey, through its Economic Development Department, hereinafter referred to as "County" AND

Monterey County Business Council, hereinafter referred to as "CONTRACTOR"

Scope of Services / Payment Provisions

This EXHIBIT A shall be incorporated by reference as part of the Professional Services Agreement dated July 1, 2016. This Exhibit A governs work to be performed under the above referenced Agreement, the nature of the working relationship between County and CONTRACTOR, and specific obligations of the CONTRACTOR.

A. SERVICES TO BE PROVIDED

CONTRACTOR shall provide services and staff, and otherwise do all things necessary for or incidental to the performance of work, which shall result in creating 30 new jobs in Monterey County, or retaining 30 jobs in Monterey County, as set forth below:

KEY PROGRAMS/PROJECTS

1. Monterey Bay Procurement Technical Assistance Center (PTAC)

The funding amount for this performance measurement is \$50,000.

- a. MCBC, will create 20 new jobs in Monterey County, or will retain 20 jobs in Monterey County through business expansion and businesses receiving assistance from Monterey Bay PTAC, between July 1, 2016 and June 30, 2017.
- b. MCBC, through Monterey Bay PTAC, will assist small businesses and local entrepreneurs to secure the award of a minimum of \$250,000 in new government contracts between July 1, 2016 and June 30, 2017.

2. Small and Medium Size Business Outreach Efforts

The funding amount for this performance measurement is \$50,000.

a. MCBC, through overall economic activities that include (1) hosting various business showcasing events (Annual MCBC Anniversary Gala; Celebration of Small Businesses in Monterey County; Monthly Business Luncheons; etc.) and facilitating and implementing the industry clusters (Higher Ed/Research; Hospitality/Tourism; Creative Technology; Ag/Eco-Tourism; Advancing Manufacturing; Health/Wellness); (2) promotion of the County as "Language Capital of the World" through the MCBC website and newspaper articles; (3) support through funding of the Monterey Regional Defense Alliance, and also providing advocacy in support of retaining the Defense Language Institute and the

Foreign Language Institute in Monterey County; (4) support through funding of the Central Coast Broadband Consortium and (5) effective use of its website and social media platforms, will create 10 new jobs in Monterey County, or will retain 10 jobs in Monterey County between July 1, 2016 and June 30, 2017.

B. PAYMENT PROVISIONS: COMPENSATION, PAYMENT SCHEDULE AND MISCELLANEOUS MATTERS

B1. Compensation

The amount of compensation allocated to CONTRACTOR for Fiscal Year 2016/2017, which is the period July 1, 2016 – June 30, 2017, shall not exceed \$100,000. CONTRACTOR shall submit monthly invoices. Compensation shall be paid to CONTRACTOR in twelve monthly installments in the amount equal to $1/12^{th}$ of the total allocated above. Payment of compensation is based upon the performance of all things necessary for or incidental to the Scope of Services identified in Section A.

B2. Standard Payment Schedule

The Auditor-Controller shall pay the monthly invoice within 30 days of receipt. Payment is conditional upon receiving performance reports that are acceptable to the County, with the adequacy of the reports to be in the sole discretion/judgment of the county.

The performance report shall be in a format that is easy to understand that can be shared with the Economic Opportunity Committee and the Board of Supervisors. B5. Determination of Compliance

CONTRACTOR is expected to substantially meet or exceed the stated goals, objectives, tasks and performance measures. CONTRACTOR is expected to provide various reports, documents, plans, and other deliverables in a timely manner. Furthermore, CONTRACTOR is expected to cooperate with Economic Development Department staff, the Economic Opportunity Committee and Board of Supervisors in conducting its responsibilities of this Agreement.

The determination of whether performance meets standard is at the sole judgment of County. County will review periodic progress reports and perform other monitoring tasks at its discretion to make its determination. This may include making site visits and reviewing related records, which CONTRACTOR shall make readily available upon request. Payment is conditional upon receiving performance reports that are acceptable to the County, with the adequacy of the reports to be in the sole discretion/judgment of the county.

In the event County determines CONTRACTOR is not meeting its expectations as expressed above, in whole or in part, County reserves the right to determine the appropriate remedy. These remedies could include, but are not limited to, requiring a corrective action plan, disallowance of costs, withholding payment, changing the compensation schedule, reduction of future allocations and/or termination of the Agreement.

B6. Modifications to the Scope of Work

The Economic Development Director or his/her designee may approve modifications to the specific tasks described in the Scope of Work with the concurrence of the Administrative Committee of the Monterey County Economic Opportunity Committee. Such modifications must be in writing. Any modifications to compensation and to the Scope of Work must be approved by the Board of Supervisors.

B7. CONTRACTOR Finances, Budget, Audits and Financial Statements

CONTRACTOR is expected to operate in a financially sound manner in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. This is a requirement of eligibility to receive an allocation from County. By signing this Agreement, CONTRACTOR acknowledges that this requirement is met.

CONTRACTOR agrees that its Board of Directors will approve an annual budget applicable to its fiscal year. A copy of that adopted budget will be provided to County with 10 business days after adoption.

CONTRACTOR shall provide County with a copy of its most recent annual audit and subsequent annual audits that may be completed during this Agreement's during its duration. Such audits shall be provided within 10 business days of their presentation to CONTRACTOR's Board of Directors.

CONTRACTOR shall provide County with financial statements covering the end of the second quarter and fourth quarter of CONTRACTOR'S fiscal year. Such statements shall be provided within 10 business days of their presentation to the CONTRACTOR'S Board of Directors. County reserves the right to request more frequent financial statements, which shall be provided by CONTRACTOR within 10 business days if such request is made.

CONTRACTOR agrees to notify County if there are budget or financial issues that are likely to materially adversely affect the ability of CONTRACTOR to achieve the Scope of Work in Section A. Such notification shall be made in a timely manner, which shall be construed as no later than 10 days after such information is made available to the CONTRACTOR's Board of Directors.

B8. Acknowledgement of County Funding

The County shall be acknowledged for the funding support it provides to CONTRACTOR and for explicit funding support for any project, event or initiative funded by this Agreement. This acknowledgement shall be included in any written materials, advertisements or banners associated with the project, event or initiative where it is customary to list sponsors. It is CONTRACTOR's responsibility to pass this requirement through to its subcontractors or funded organizations that may be involved in any project, event or initiative funded by County. CONTRACTOR shall ensure their compliance with this requirement. Failure to acknowledge this funding support may result in projects, events or initiatives being deemed by County as ineligible to receive future funds.

B9. Written Publications

CONTRACTOR shall provide County with a copy of any final written or visual publication and any other work product (e.g. print advertisement) that is funded in whole or in part by this agreement. CONTRACTOR'S website shall prominently display that the County is a major funding partner or contributor to CONTRACTOR. Said documents shall be provided within 10 business days of their publication.

B10. Unincorporated Area Representation and Service

CONTRACTOR is encouraged to include on its Board individuals who reflect the interests of unincorporated areas of the County of Monterey and ensure that CONTRACTOR'S services apply to unincorporated as well as incorporated areas of the County. A list of current Board Members shall be included in the periodic reports required.

B11. Presentations

CONTRACTOR shall be required to provide periodic presentations to the Board of Supervisors, the Economic Opportunity Committee (EOC), and/or the Administrative

Committee of the EOC with reasonable advance notification. In addition, CONTRACTOR is expected to attend meetings of these bodies upon request.

B12. Submittal of Communications, Documents, Reports and Other Deliverables

WORKPLAN 2016-2017

MCBC Mission

We are an alliance of business, government and non-profit executives and professionals providing collaborative leadership to help people from business, government, education, and the community work together on countywide issues reflecting our organization's strong commitment to the environment, economic vitality, and quality of life.

On August 1, 2015, the MCBC and the Monterey Bay PTAC moved from their prior shared location with the Institute for Innovation & Economic Development (iiED²) on the CSUMB campus to the University of California's Monterey Bay Education, Science and Technology Center (UC MBEST) in Marina. This relocation has aided in the long-delayed vision of the UC MBEST Center as a regional economic development initiative and cornerstone of the Fort Ord Reuse Authority's (FORA) base reuse plan by drawing more commercial tenants to the site. Indeed, prior to relocation the MCBC encouraged Red Shift Internet Services to open an office in the Center and has partnered with this local Internet Service Provider to provide high-speed Internet access and technical support for Center tenants. This successful partnership allowed the MCBC to recently welcome a pioneering Salinas Valley Ag Tech firm to the Center and proves the move has fostered the Monterey Bay PTAC's purpose of generating employment and improving the general economic condition of the Monterey Bay region through bringing it in closer proximity with existing clients while aiding in recruitment of new clients. The move has also proved helpful as the facility provides ample parking and conference rooms for workshops and training presentations and brings it next to Center-based clients, such as Vocational Rehabilitation Specialists Inc., which the PTAC has helped secure over a half-dozen contracts, including one \$200,000 contract award to further its work assisting veterans and eligible service members with vocational counseling and employment services As noted by the Association of Procurement Technical Assistance Centers (APTAC), the award allowed VRS to increase its "staff from 4 to 6 employees and provide much needed services to nearly 100 area veterans."³

The move to the UC MBEST Center also complements the MCBC's key focus on workforce development while simultaneously saving the County substantial sums in reduced rental and overhead expenses. The MCBC introduced the Monterey County Workforce Development Board (WDB) to the Center, and on December 15, 2015 the WDB, which is part of the County's Economic Development Department, received unanimous approval from the Board of Supervisors to enter into a sublease for shared office space. The WDB uses the sublet premises as, among other things, an Employment Center lab and for staff cubicles, to offer America's Job Center services and Ambassador's for Peace program services to youth ages 16-24, and to provide services to Adults/Dislocated workers, with priority afforded to veterans and their eligible spouses. The MCBC worked with Monterey-Salinas Transit (MST) to locate an additional stop at the Center in order to better serve those the WDB helps find employment while also aiding in the joint ongoing efforts of both the MCBC and Monterey Bay PTAC to better position the Center to attract more commercial tenants. Notably, in the Board report for the consent for WDB to enter into the sublease with the MCBC, it was stressed that the move from the former location in Seaside "offers a cost savings of \$25,920 per year" to Monterey County and that the WDB concluded that the location "is in a better position to serve the WDB's clientele". See the December 15, 2015 Board Report, UC Consent to

Sublease, and Unanimous Board Order contained in File # 15-1290 for the December 15th Agenda. The move is a "win" for both parties as a successful private-public partnership.

The MCBC's key objectives for 2016-2017 remain the following:

- To create greater alignment among the activities of business, government, education, media, health and foundation / community based efforts;
- To build coalitions around key community issues and foster increased publicprivate partnerships;
- To develop strategies and programs that support the development of jobs and business opportunities, workforce training and development;
- To work to improve the business climate to retain and expand existing businesses and the recruitment of new businesses; and
- To work to integrate workforce services with business needs.

In order to fulfill those objectives, the MCBC will continue to provide facilitation and implementation of the Competitive Clusters (C²) Program, including Agriculture, Advancing Manufacturing, Higher Education & Research, Tourism & Hospitality, Sustainable Building & Design, Small Business Outreach & Entrepreneurship, Technology Development & Transfer, all of which aid efforts to accelerate regional development of Small and Medium Businesses and the creation and retention of jobs. These efforts support of Economic Opportunity Committee's designated five pillar working groups of Agriculture, Education, Military Support, Research and Tourism.

The MCBC expects continued regional success in these areas as it successfully launched the Monterey Bay Economic Partnership (MBEP) in 2014 in order to better brand, showcase and promote the Monterey Bay Region as a top tier location for economic development and investment. The MBEP is an independent 501(c)(3) organization consisting of public, private and civic entities in San Benito, Santa Cruz and Monterey counties, with the mission of creating a thriving region with quality jobs, excellent education, and a high quality of life for all residents. The MCBC will continue to develop and provide MBEP its economic development programs, such as its existing workforce development and broadband adoption initiatives, which the MBEP can promote regionally. Although the MCBC was the driving force behind the successful creation and launch of the MBEP, and shares Directors with the MBEP, the MBEP is an independent entity and as an MBEP partner, the MCBC will continue to help populate its website. Site selectors have told economic developers that they will spend 30 to 60 seconds on a website to pre-screen for a client match. The MBEP's professional website gives MCBC and its partners the capability to prominently showcase Monterey County and its cities and communities as an outstanding place to do business. Our ability to capture who is looking to do business, what they follow on the site, etc., is the key to the success of sustained business in our region. Indeed, during this past fiscal year the MCBC President and Executive Director met with over 20 site selectors and directed all of them to the MBEP website for data. In turn, the work affiliated with hosting and entertaining site selectors, event panelists/speakers, and the companies we have brought to our County has directly contributed to Transient Occupancy Tax (TOT) revenues as MCBC can confidently report that it will have been directly involved in accounting for over 500 hotel nights by the end of this fiscal year and well over \$50,000 in venue fees and meal and beverage expenditures for hospitality partners hosting our events.

The MCBC's ongoing promotion of the County as the "Language Capital of the World" has directly contributed to the aforementioned revenue stream. MCBC secured the trademark registration for "Language Capital of the World" in 2014 in order to promote and increase the visibility and recognition of the language capabilities of Monterey County's residents, companies and institutions of higher education for economic development and cross-cultural understanding. Local companies and institutions of Higher Education continue to use the mark on their materials, in presentations, and on their websites to enhance international recognition of Monterey County as "Language Capital of the World". The MCBC continues to work closely with the City of Monterey and various stakeholders, such as the Wharf Association and Old Monterey Business Association, in planning for the second Language Capital of the World ® Cultural Festival scheduled to take place May 13 - 15, 2016 in Monterey. After last year's inaugural festival, the MCBC began working with Moravia, an international interpretation and translation company, which visited the region multiple times throughout the summer through late winter of 2015. The MCBC showed Moravia over twenty possible office locations and connected Moravia with faculty and staff at, among others, the Middlebury Institute of International Studies at Monterey (MIIS), Monterey Peninsula College (MPC), the Defense Language Institute Foreign Language Center (DLIFLC), the Naval Postgraduate School (NPS), and the City of Monterey in order to address workforce, educational, housing, transportation, broadband and other related business concerns the company factored into its decision as to whether it should open a Monterey location. After months of back and forth, Moravia signed a commercial lease on December 31, 2015, and began formal operations on April 1st at 797 Munras Avenue in Monterey, with an initial staff of 7 full-time personnel and upwards of 60 part-time workers expected by the end of this fiscal year.

On March 24th, the MCBC Executive Director moderated a panel on "Language Capital of the World" at the 12th Annual Global California Conference held at MIIS with representatives of MIIS, MediaLocate, Moravia and LanguageLine Solutions. Within a week of the conference, the MCBC had fielded queries from an additional two companies looking to provide language services from our region and is currently working with another major international company about opening a local office within the next six months. MCBC will continue to brand and promote our County as "Language Capital of the World" and will work with our partners, such as MIIS' Custom Language Services (CLS) in furtherance of ongoing efforts to improve intercultural and linguistic competency in Monterey County and in increasing the language and cross-cultural training opportunities for Monterey County's global companies.

The MCBC's language-based work is a crucial component of our support in furtherance of efforts to prepare our region for the next possible round of Base Closure and Realignment (BRAC). As part of such efforts, MCBC will continue to work with a regional Big Data Consortium by convening and providing administrative and logistical support to its meetings, which include members of the Monterey Bay National Security Alliance and faculty and staff from CSUMB, MIIS, NPS, Defense Manpower Data Center (DMDC), and the U.S. Army Training and Doctrine Command (TRADOC) Analysis Center (TRAC), as well as employees from Northrop Grumman. Participants give updates on their research projects and collaborations, like research into topics such as using social science theory to understand social media data and current and planned research using social media data, such as dealing with foreign and domestic terrorism. Native language capabilities are crucial to such national security efforts. Further, a recent memorandum issued by the Assistant Secretary of Navy (Manpower and Reserve Affairs) Deputy Under Secretary of the Navy (Management) emphasized the Department of Navy's need to create a "data savvy workforce" to ensure the military "stays at the forefront of this rapidly evolving data-centric environment" in which "information sharing, data analytics, and knowledge management touch all aspects of the workforce." The participants in the Big Data Consortium meetings are at the forefront of such efforts and the MCBC will continue to work with our region's military personnel and facilities to help ensure they remain at the forefront of such work and thereby better prepare to demonstrate that our regional military installations are vital to not only our local economy, but to national defense and security.

Among the two most important factors in convincing Moravia and other companies to relocate to and/or expand operations in Monterey County is proving to companies that we have a qualified workforce and the broadband capabilities necessary to move vast amounts of data in the 21st century's digital economy. Identifying a ready and skilled workforce is paramount to companies looking to locate and expand to new areas and MCBC plays a crucial role in this effort through its ongoing efforts to expand test sites and the user base for the ACT WorkKeys program, a nationally recognized program that supplies training, assessment and certification of workforce readiness skills for companies, and which helps our region showcase the depth and breadth of our workforce. It was through the leadership of the MCBC and WDB that Monterey County received the distinction of being a "Work Ready Community", which places us on a national register for employers to view. Some local organizations that already use the test or consider it in an application are MST, Hyatt Regency Monterey Hotel and Spa, Green Mountain Coffee Roasters and Encore Recycling.

The MCBC continues to provide leadership, administrative and logistical support to the Central Coast Broadband Consortium (CCBC), which is dedicated to improving broadband availability, access and adoption in Monterey, Santa Cruz and San Benito Counties. The top priority of the CCBC is providing resources and incentives to telecommunications service providers, including local government agencies, to build broadband infrastructure and extend it throughout our tri-county region. For a little over four years, rural and urban regional consortia such as CCBC have been working to promote ubiquitous broadband deployment and to advance broadband adoption in

unserved and underserved areas throughout the state. Thanks to the work of the CCBC, a dozen communities in Monterey, San Benito and Santa Cruz counties were identified by the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) as high priority areas for broadband infrastructure development. It was the identification of those areas which resulted in success of what is referred to as the "Sunesys Project" - the deployment of a 91-mile fiber optic backbone down the Salinas Valley along the Highway 101 corridor. It was the collaborative leadership of the CCBC, MCBC and the University of California, Santa Cruz (UCSC) that resulted in the CPUC in approving a \$10.6 million grant from the California Advanced Services Fund (CASF) to build the network from the UCSC to Watsonville, Moss Landing, Castroville to Salinas and down through Gonzales with a The environmental review process is complete and current terminus in Soledad. construction has begun; however, the MCBC and CCBC continue to work with regional consortia partners in San Luis Obispo to extend the current terminus in Soledad on through King City and down 101 into San Luis Obispo. Once installed, regional ISP's will be able to connect to the "middle mile" to provide the "last mile" services to County residents and businesses. It is this "middle mile" infrastructure that is crucial to developing our economy and realizing the much ballyhooed promise of an ag tech economy. As part of MCBC's work for the CCBC, MCBC continues to work with each jurisdiction in our tri-county region to adopt and/or endorse the Dig Once policy as part of a broadband master plan. Thus far, we have been successful in seeing such policies officially adopted and/or endorsed by the cities of Gonzales and Santa Cruz, the counties of San Benito and Santa Cruz, and employed in practice by the cities of Salinas and Seaside. The MCBC will not cease in our efforts to "light up" the entire County.

MCBC's success with the Monterey Bay PTAC, Work Ready Communities, the Central Coast Broadband Consortium, MBEP, iiED, and the "Language Capital of the World," has resulted in greater awareness of our County's incredible resources and has broadened our base of assets, collaborations and successful entrepreneurial endeavors.

KEY PROGRAMS/PROJECTS

I. Monterey Bay Procurement Technical Assistance Center (PTAC)

Monterey Bay PTAC Funding Request: \$50,000.00

The Monterey Bay PTAC is providing consulting to small and medium business, enabling them to consult with others throughout the U.S. for contracts in all sectors of government – federal, state, and local. Our PTAC is funded, in part, by a \$300,000 contract with the Defense Logistics Agency (DLA) and a match from the MCBC and its partners. Since opening its doors in September 2012, the Monterey Bay PTAC has helped its clients receive 406 contract awards worth a collective \$143,369,046, which includes \$48,314,225 for Monterey County based businesses⁴. Under SBA Guidelines

that allow for one job for each \$50,000 of investment funds generated through the awarded contract, this accounts for <u>996</u> jobs in less than four years of operation Further, a January 2016 economic impact report prepared for California PTAC's revealed that every \$1 of funding invested in state PTAC's generates \$108 in contract awards – a staggering return on investment of 10,898%!

The continued growth of this program is assured with the increased awareness of local businesses for contracting opportunities with state, local and federal governmental agencies.

II. Increase Small and Medium Size Business Outreach Efforts

Funding Request:

\$50,000

The MCBC's ongoing approach for existing business in our County is provided through overall economic development activities that include, but are not limited to: showcase events (Annual MCBC Anniversary Gala; Celebration of Small Businesses in Monterey County; Monthly Business Luncheons; etc.) and industry clusters (Higher Ed/Research; Hospitality/Tourism; Creative Technology; Ag/Eco-tourism; Advancing Manufacturing; Health/Wellness).

The MCBC will continue to assume a leadership role in the facilitation of the Competitive Clusters (C²) Program by providing administrative support, assisting in implementation of the cluster initiatives, convening the Working Group meetings, providing support to the initiative champions and monitoring the progress of the initiatives. The MCBC will also continue to educate and engage the public in such cluster efforts by, among other things, highlighting the success of cluster initiatives and partners through events such as our annual Higher Education & Research Leadership Summit (Summit) and Annual Economic Vitality Awards. The County of Monterey is recognized as a sponsor on all promotional and program materials for both the Summit and Annual Gala. The County is also recognized in weekly emails and our Friday Facts.

The October 23, 2015 Summit served to increase MCBC's small business outreach. MCBC worked with the current co-chairs for the Higher Education and Research Leadership Competitive Cluster, Hartnell College President Willard Lewallen, CSUMB President Eduardo Ochoa, and MPC President Walter Tribley, to make a primary focus of this year's Summit the Bright Futures Cradle-to-Career initiative in which regional partners are working together to ensure that every child is prepared for school, succeeds in and out of the classroom, completes a post-high school credential and enters a promising career. The Summit served as a public launch for the initiative and planning for the upcoming October 27, 2016 Summit includes an update on the successes (and struggles) of the initiative over the past year. In addition, this year's Summit will also feature an update on local military work as last year's Summit featured an

informative presentation by NPS President, Vice Admiral (Ret.) Ronald A. Route, who spoke about the role NPS plays in protecting our nation, while Dr. Ray Buettner, Director of both the Joint Interagency Field Experimentation (JIFX), and Consortium for Robotics and Unmanned Systems Education and Research (CRUSER)., gave a presentation entitled "Research Highlights from NPS: "Here Come the Drones!" which was a highlight of the Summit. The MCBC will continue to partner with such regional entities to highlight, among other things, the collaborations and career pathways between our institutions of Higher Education & Research with regional businesses and the vital role of our military installations.

The Economic Vitality Awards are presented annually by the MCBC, and for its 21st Anniversary Annual Gala on February 6, 2016, we honored nominees in each key industry cluster that have made significant contributions to the economic vitality, growth and preservation of Monterey County. The 2016 honorees were (i) Creative & Technology - Sand City, West End; (ii) Health & Wellness - The Monterey Program for Executive Health; (iii) Higher Education & Research - MIIS; (iv) Hospitality - Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance; (v) Sustainable Building & Design - Carmel Building & Design; (vi) Agriculture - Taylor Farms; (vii) Advancing Manufacturing - Steiner eOptics. This year's Gala was a very special event as the MCBC was pleased to be the first organization to honor Congressman Sam Farr for his years of service and myriad contributions to our regional economic prosperity.

The MCBC recognizes the small business owners who are the backbone of our economy by its annual "Celebration of Small Businesses in Monterey County" held in conjunction with the SBA's Small Business Week. Congressman Sam Farr will give the keynote presentation at this year's event on May 6th, while a panel of local lenders will discuss ongoing loan programs for small businesses. The program features the MCBC's designated Small Businesses of the Year from around Monterey County. Lenders and financial institutions that serve Monterey County participate by nominating up to three local businesses for which they have provided a small business loan in the past 24 months, while City Managers and Economic Development Directors for each jurisdiction make nominations recognizing outstanding small businesses in their locale. Thus far, the cities of Del Rey Oaks, Monterey, Pacific Grove, Seaside and Salinas have nominated businesses for this year's Celebration.

The MCBC will continue to advocate for the region's military missions by providing leadership, as well as administrative and logistical support, to multiple efforts which seeks to prepare the County for the next anticipated BRAC round. The first prong of this effort is underway, which is to gather data gained from strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats (SWOT) analysis being conducted by the City of Monterey on the critical value of the region's installations. The MCBC is working with a private partner to then prepare an economic impact of the County's military installations. In addition, the MCBC continues to work with Congressman Sam Farr's staff and regional partners on "Team Monterey". The Monterey Bay area encompasses a wide variety of Department of Defense and National Security organizations (DoD/NS), and in order to gain maximum funding for these organizations and to prepare for the next round of

BRAC, Team Monterey has fostered a collaborative team environment between these organizations to identify common areas of interest and capability for partnering. These organizations include: Fleet Numerical Meteorology & Oceanography Center; the Naval Research Laboratory; the Naval Postgraduate School; the Defense Manpower Data Center; the Defense Language Institute; U. S. Coast Guard Monterey; Fort Hunter Liggett; Camp Roberts; and the Defense Personnel Security Research Center. Approximately 10,000 people are employed in the local defense sector, a \$1.4 billion impact on the local economy, which does not take into the account the impact on local businesses, such as barbershops, dry cleaners, and restaurants, by our regional military installations. The closure of one installation could have devastating economic impact, as is made crystal clear by the closure of Fort Ord. The MCBC is working with regional partners to prevent such an economic catastrophe. Further, we took the lead in gathering business opportunities and regional assets and capabilities for the aforementioned Big Data Consortium, which consists of our educational, research and military institutions working on big data and the potential business opportunities associated therewith.

As noted above, the MCBC continues to provide both guidance and administrative support to the CCBC while also encouraging endorsement and/or adoption of comprehensive regional broadband policies by elected officials in all jurisdictions of San Benito, Santa Cruz and Monterey Counties. The MCBC will continue to convene meetings of ISP's and officials from the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) to update them on CCBC progress and potential business opportunities.

Partners in all the aforementioned activities include, but are not limited to, the following: Arts Council of Monterey County; the Association of Monterey Bay Area Governments; the Monterey County Office of Education; CSUMB; MPC, Hartnell College; MIIS; NPS; the WDB; all major departments of the County; Small Business Administration; SBDC's; local chambers of commerce, trade organizations, and all cities of the County. The MCBC continues to recognize the importance of arts and culture to economic development and seeks to incorporate the same into our ongoing work. Monterey County is internationally recognized for its artistic and cultural output, festivals and institutions, such as the Monterey Jazz Festival, which also encompasses our growing wine and culinary reputation, making the County a desired tourist destination for reasons other than our stunning natural beauty. The co-chairs of our Tourism Cluster, the General Manager of the Monterey Regional Airport and Executive Director of the Monterey County Vinters & Growers Association, are working with the MCBC to better brand and promote our South County wines and destinations. The MCBC will continue to participate in trade missions and seek foreign investment, as we have done with the Central Coast Marketing Team and other organizations.

The MCBC continues to update its Website and gain more followers through Facebook, LinkedIn, Twitter, and other ubiquitous 21st century social media platforms that increase publicity of its myriad ongoing efforts and increase community awareness and foster increased collaboration with new and existing partners throughout the County.
