CIPA IS THE CHILDREN'S INTERNET PROTECTION ACT



CIPA DATES BACK TO DECEMBER 2000

The law requires schools and libraries in the United States to filter the Internet and implement certain other measures to protect children from harmful online content in order to receive some types of federal funding.

E-RATE FUNDING



The E-Rate program provides heavy discounts to assist schools and public libraries to obtain affordable telecommunications and Internet services under the direction of the Federal Communications Commission (FCC)

Internet policy must address:

- Electronic messaging
- Disclosure of personal information
- Unlawful online activities



FURTHER CONSIDERATIONS

- ✓ Need to have an internet safety policy
- ✓ Must provide measures for educating minors about appropriate online behavior
- ✓ Provide reasonable public notice
- ✓ Hold at least one public hearing or meeting

FILTERS



- MCFL currently offers a filtering option on all public computers.
- ✓ The current default setting for MCFL computers is no filters.
- ✓ Internet users can turn on and off the filters themselves or ask for assistance in turning them on and off.
- ✓ All staff computers are unfiltered.

THE FILTERS




- ✓ In the past filters were unreliable and filtered or allowed materials through in an unreliable way.
- ✓ The insufficient bandwidth was another barrier in the way of efficient filtering.
- ✓ Filters have improved greatly.
- MCFL has invested in improved bandwidth.
- ✓ But filters are still not guaranteed and MCFL supports the right and responsibility of parents/guardians to monitor what their children view in the library.

CIPA'S OTHER FILTERING REQUIREMENTS




- ✓ All library computers linked to the internet via E-Rate funded connections must be filtered.
- Staff and public computers must be filtered.
- ✓ Public and/or staff must ask to have the internet turned off.
- ✓ No one under 16 may request unfiltered access to the internet

SOME CONSIDERATIONS



- ✓ Some members of the public may balk at asking for the filter to be turned off.
- ✓ No provision for minors to request turning off of filters
- Additional workload on staff

SOME CONSIDERATIONS



- Money vs Expectations of full access
- MCFL does not receive cash directly; instead receives discounts for telecommunications and the purchase of internet related equipment, etc.; and the ability to apply for federal technology grants
- Dollar value to MCFL could be almost \$1,000,000 over the next 5 years
- Value of money to the community vs the loss in access to information
