Dear Clerk of the Board;

As a resident of the City of Salinas and County of Monterey, I am glad to see progress being made on renaming of "Confederate Corners," i.e. the U.S. Board on Geographic Names has requested a recommendation from the Monterey County Board of Supervisors regarding a name change. Although I completed the County's online survey about this renaming endeavor, I am emailing you to submit a copy of the letter I wrote and mailed to all of the County Supervisors - and which I copied to Congressional Representative Jimmy Panetta, CA State Assembly member (and former Mayor of Salinas) Anna Caballero, and CA State Senator Anthony Cannella. See attached letter.

A condensed version of what I state in said letter is provided in the following letter to the editor of mine that was published in *The Salinas Californian* last week, which the newspaper titled "What about 'Chicoy Corners' or 'Casillas Corners'?" (http://www.thecalifornian.com/story/opinion/2017/10/17/letters-editor-what-chicoy-corners-casillas-corners/774180001/):

With respect to the proposed name change of "Confederate Corners" (formerly "Spring Town") to "Campesino Corners," I propose alternative name changes for consideration – "Chicoy Corners" or "Casillas Corners" – based on John Steinbeck's fictional "Rebel Corners" ("The Wayward Bus," 1947) which was inspired by "Confederate Corners." Most importantly, Steinbeck's portrayal of the place endorses our current social concern regarding "public symbols of the Confederacy" and "publicly supported spaces dedicated to the Confederacy" (which is how "Confederate Corners" is termed/listed by the Southern Poverty Law Center.) Read the first two pages of "The Wayward Bus." Further, Steinbeck's fictional characters Juan and Alice Chicoy own and operate a store and restaurant, service and gas station, and bus service, and "Rebel Corners is well known and the Chicoys are well liked." In real life today, Raphael Casillas owns and operates the Casillas Brothers Market and Beacon gas station at Highway 68 and Hitchcock Road and is becoming as well-known as "Confederate Corners" itself. It seems that Mr. Casillas is also well-liked.

Hello Monterey County Supervisors,

I am sending a brief email letter as I have been out of State for awhile and the

news of possibly renaming a "Confederate Corners" just came to my attention.

I have a a few thoughts, and some history on this part of Monterey County.

My Mother lived on the family Gambetta Ranch on Hitchcock Road when she was a young girl.

She told me stories of her early years in Springtown many time as we would drive by to and from Salinas.

She never called it Confederate Corners. Neither did my Grandparents.

My Mother walked to nearby "Spring School" for elementary school. The school is now Bokay Nursery.

I have a photo of her elementary school class. Mr. Tanimura was a classmate of hers.

The same Mr. Tanimura that passed away recently.

Heading West on Hwy. 68 from Salinas, one came to Springtown at the corner of Hitchcock Rd, continuing on, one came to Hilltown at the corner of Spreckels Blvd. I recall there being a small two-pump gas station at the corner of

Reservation Rd. in my youth. I don't recall what "town" that was called. An elementary school classmate of mine

had a Grandfather that owned and ran that small gas station business. Thre was also a small two-pump gas station

in the town of Spreckels. I had a relative that owned and ran that business.

When one got to what is now the Toro Cafe, the area was called Toro, but not Torotown. It too had a small gas station too,

now the Toro Cafe. Further west, one came to Corral de Tierra,

a mail drop and mail pick up spot, now the Corral Market. Now still called Corral de Tierra.

(Translation="Corral of Dirt", an early cattle ranch in Monterey County, later a dairy farm).

There's a small gas station on the corner of Corral de Tierra Rd and Highway 68, now the Flowers & Gas business.

This gas station was started in the mid-teens of the 1900's, same location.

I am a fourth generation Californian on my Mother's side, the Gambetta's and the Scheiza's, who were early dairy farmers from Switzerland. I am a fourth generation Monterey County resident.

That corner on Hitchcock has always been known as Springtown to our family. "Confederate Corners" must have been a nickname, how it got put into some type of registry is a mystery.

I am a fifth-generation Californian on my father's side, Weaver, and that corner was never referred to as Confederate Corners by any Weaver's.

My recommendation is to call it Spring Town, because that's what it is. But please, don't incorporate it, or allow a strip mall and a housing subdivision there.
