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# AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNTY OF MONTEREY, STATE OF CALIFORNIA, REPEALING EXISTING TITLE 12 OF THE MONTEREY COUNTY CODE AND ADOPTING A REPLACEMENT TITLE 12 RELATING TO VEHICLES AND TRAFFIC 


#### Abstract

County Counsel Summary This ordinance repeals the existing Title 12 of the Monterey County Code and adopts a replacement Title 12. Title 12 regulates the operation of motor vehicles on county roadways and on other county facilities such as parking areas and the county cemetery and also includes certain provisions relating to traffic impacts of new development, including the Regional Development Impact Fee. The purpose of this ordinance is to compile and update all of the existing regulations that the County previously adopted within Title 12. The update primarily consists of non-substantive changes, such as changing references to "Road Commissioner" and "Director of Public Works" to "Director of Transportation" and replacing referenced exhibits and maps with equivalent text. The ordinance also clarifies the prohibition of trucks on southbound Merritt Street as adopted by the Board of Supervisors by Ordinance No. 4039 on October 19, 1999. The ordinance also adds a new section that delegates authority to the Director of Transportation to establish or remove no parking zones, with appropriate signage or curb markings, at four types of locations: within 100 feet of an intersection, within 20 feet of a driveway, within 25 feet of a railroad crossing, and within 15 feet of a fire hydrant. Lastly, the ordinance makes the following minor modifications to existing traffic regulations: adds no left turn restrictions from Atherton Drive and Mesa Drive onto State Highway 1; adds 18 two-way stop locations and 14 all-way stop locations in various parts of the unincorporated area of Monterey County; removes four locations with yield signs and converts them to two-way stops; adds two no parking zones; and modifies speed limits along Carmel Valley Road to 45 miles per hour between State Highway 1 and a point 700 feet west of Phelps Way. The ordinance will take effect on the thirty-first day after adoption.


The Board of Supervisors of the County of Monterey ordains as follows:
SECTION 1. Title 12 of the Monterey County Code is repealed.

SECTION 2. Title 12 is re-adopted and added to the Monterey County Code to read as follows:

### 12.04.005 DIRECTOR OF TRANSPORTATION.

Director of Transportation as used in this Title means the County Director of Transportation as defined in Sections 2.27.030 and 2.28.040 of Title 2 of the Monterey County Code or their designee.

### 12.04.010 NO VIOLATION IF NO SIGN - - WHEN.

No provision of this Title for which signs or curb markings giving notice thereof are required is effective unless such signs or curb markings are in place as herein directed.
(Ord. 1134, 1960).

### 12.04.020 DIRECTOR OF TRANSPORTATION TO DO CURB PAINTING.

Whenever this code or any other ordinance of the County of Monterey provides for the indicating of parking regulations by the use of paint upon curbs, the Director of Transportation of said county is directed to perform and maintain such painting.
(Ord. 1134, 1960).

### 12.04.030 STATE HIGHWAYS-APPROVAL OF REGULATIONS.

Any provision of this code which regulates traffic or delegates the regulation of traffic upon state highways, in any way for which the approval of the Department of Transportation is required by state law, shall cease to be operative six months after receipt by the County Board of Supervisors of written notice of withdrawal of approval of the Department of Transportation.
(Ord. 1251, 1962; Ord. 1134, 1960).

### 12.04.040 STATE HIGHWAYS-APPROVAL OF EXERCISE OF AUTHORITY.

Whenever this title delegates authority to a county officer, or authorizes action by the County Board of Supervisors to regulate traffic upon a state highway in any way for which state law requires the prior approval of the Department of Transportation, no such officer shall exercise such authority nor shall such action by the County Board of Supervisors be effective with respect to any state highway, without the prior approval in writing of the Department of

Transportation when and to the extent required by the Vehicle Code.
(Ord. 1251, 1962; Ord. 1134, 1960).

### 12.04.050 SPECIAL PERMITS.

All of the powers and discretion granted to the Board of Supervisors by Article 6 (commencing with Section 35780), Chapter 5, Division 15 of the California Vehicle Code relating to the issuance of the permits specified therein are delegated to the Director of Transportation. In requiring a bond, undertaking, or other security in connection with the issuance of any such permits, the Director of Transportation shall comply with any applicable resolutions of the board of supervisors relating thereto.
(Ord. 1272, 1963).

### 12.04.060 PENALTY FOR VIOLATION.

Every person who violates any provision of this Title is guilty of an infraction, and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished in the manner specified in Section 42001 of the California Vehicle Code, as amended from time to time.

### 12.08.010 CLOSING OR RESTRICTED USE-AUTHORIZED.

A. The Director of Transportation of the County of Monterey may restrict the use of, or close, any county highway whenever he considers such closing or restriction of use necessary:

1. For the protection of the public;
2. For the protection of such county highway from damage during storms;
3. During construction, improvement, or maintenance operations on the highway.
B. Any such action of the Director of Transportation may be reviewed and modified by the Board of Supervisors of this county.
(Ord. 1134, 1960).

### 12.08.020 CLOSING OR RESTRICTED USE-NOTICE.

A. To notify the public that a county highway is closed or its use restricted, the Director of Transportation may:

1. Erect suitable barriers or obstructions upon such highway;
2. Post warnings and notices of the condition of any such highway;
3. Post signs for the direction of traffic upon such highway, or to or upon any other highway or detour open to public travel;
4. Place warning devices on such highway;
5. Assign a flagman to warn, detour or direct traffic on such highway.
B. No person shall willfully remove or fail to observe any sign, marker, warning, notice, or direction, placed or given under this section.
(Ord. 1134, 1960).

### 12.08.030 REPAIRING VEHICLES:

No person shall make any repairs to, or install any part or accessory on, any vehicle while it is upon any county highway, except emergency repairs necessary to enable a disabled vehicle to be moved from the highway.
(Ord. 1134, 1960).

### 12.08.040 SELLING FROM PARKED VEHICLES OR STRUCTURES.

No person shall park any vehicle or place any structure wholly or partly within any county highway for the purpose of selling such vehicle or structure, or of selling therefrom or therein, any article or thing, and no person shall sell, display for sale, or offer for sale any article or thing either in or from any such vehicle or structure so parked or placed.

The provisions of this section shall not prohibit a seller from taking orders or delivering any commodity from a vehicle on that part of any county highway immediately adjacent to the premises of the purchaser.

As used in this section, "vehicle" means any device in, upon, or by which any person or property is or may be propelled, moved, or drawn upon a highway.

### 12.12.010 DESIGNATED.

The Board of Supervisors of the County of Monterey having determined upon the basis of an engineering and traffic survey that the vehicle speed limit of 65 miles per hour is more than is reasonable or safe upon those highways, or portions of highways, described in this section, determines and declares the prima facie vehicle speed limits designated in this section for each of said described highways, or portions of highways, which speed limits it finds most appropriate to facilitate the orderly movement of traffic and to be reasonable and safe, and the Director of Transportation of the County of Monterey is directed to erect and maintain appropriate speed restriction signs, as specified by the California Vehicle Code, at the outside entrances of the restricted speed zones described in this section:

Abbott Street, for its entire length, 55 miles per hour;
Arroyo Seco Road, from a point thereon two-tenths of a mile southerly from the existing location of the resort known as Millers Lodge, northerly to a point thereon two-tenths of a mile northerly from said resort, 35 miles per hour;

Arroyo Seco Road, from a point thereon one mile north of the existing location of the resort known as Arroyo Center, south for a distance of eight-tenths of a mile, 35 miles per hour;

Arroyo Seco Road, from a point thereon two-tenths of a mile north of the existing location of the resort known as Arroyo Center, south to Monterey County Bridge No. 326 on said highway, 25 miles per hour;

Avenida Principal, in the Corral de Tierra Oaks Subdivision, for the limits of the County portion from its eastern intersection with Corral de Tierra Road generally west 2750 feet to its intersection with Paseo Barranco, 35 miles per hour;

Berta Canyon Road, in its entire length, 35 miles per hour;
Blackie Road, in Castroville, from its intersection with State Highway 183 generally east to a point 500 feet east of the centerline of its most eastern intersection with Commercial Parkway, 40 miles per hour;

Blackie Road, in Castroville, from its intersection with State Highway 183 generally east to a point 500 feet east of the centerline of its most eastern intersection with Commercial Parkway, 40 miles per hour;

Blackie Road, from a point 700 feet west of the centerline of Molly Road, easterly to its intersection with State Highway 101, 45 miles per hour;

Blanco Road, from a point 1200 feet west of the centerline of Davis Road, easterly to the city limits of the City of Salinas, 50 miles per hour;

Boronda Road, from its intersection with Madison Lane generally north to Brooks Road, 35 miles per hour;

Turner Creek Bridge No. 536, (State No. 44C-0163), 5 miles per hour for vehicles exceeding a gross weight of vehicle and greater load than 20 tons.

### 12.28.005 PROHIBITED - SPECIFIED PLACES.

(a) The Director of Transportations is hereby authorized to prohibit stopping, standing or parking and directed to place and maintain appropriate signs and curb markings giving notice of this regulation at any of the following places when such prohibition as indicated by a traffic engineering investigation will alleviate dangerous hazardous traffic conditions or facilitate the full use of the roadway:
(1) At any place within 100 feet of the intersection of two or more highways;
(2) At any place within 25 feet of a railroad grade crossing;
(3) Adjacent to either side of a crosswalk or driveway entrance for a distance not to exceed 20 feet from either side of such crosswalk or driveway;
(4) Adjacent to any fire hydrant for a distance not to exceed 15 feet on either side when it has been determined that stopping, standing or parking of any vehicle, whether attended or unattended, would present some special hazard or would prevent ready access to the fire hydrant.
(b) When the Director of Transportation, upon the basis of a traffic engineering investigation, finds that the conditions no longer exist to prohibit stopping, standing or parking as authorized in 12.28.005(a), the Director shall remove such signs and such curb markings from
such portion of such street or highway.

### 12.28.010 PROHIBITED -- AT ALL TIMES.

No person shall stop, park, or leave standing any vehicle, whether attended or unattended, except when necessary to avoid conflict with other traffic or in compliance with the directions of a peace officer or official traffic-control device, in any of the following places at any time, and the Director of Transportation of the County of Monterey is directed to place and maintain appropriate signs or curb markings giving notice of this regulation at such places:

Crosswalks. On the right-hand side of any road or street, within 100 feet of the approach side of any yellow marked crosswalk, or within 50 feet of the departure side of such a crosswalk; and on the right-hand side of any road or street, within such number of feet of the approach side of any white-painted crosswalk as equals the sum of the speed limit in miles per hour for such road or street at such crosswalk, plus 10 feet.

Hatton Avenue, on the east side of Hatton Avenue, in Spreckels, from a point 199 feet north of the northeast curb return at Fourth Street, northerly for a distance of 18 feet;

Lincoln Street, on the east side of Lincoln Street from a point 178 feet north of the centerline of Main Street, northerly for a distance of 36 feet ( 2 diagonal stalls); on the east side of Lincoln Street from the centerline of Jackson Street, southerly for a distance of 28 feet ( 1 diagonal stall); on the east side of Lincoln Street from a point 79 feet north of the centerline of Scott Street, northerly for a distance of 32 feet (2 diagonal stalls);

McDougall Street, on the northeast side of McDougall Street from a point 39 feet
southeast of the centerline of Preston Street, southeasterly for a distance of 18 feet, in Castroville;

Ocean Avenue, on the south side of Ocean Avenue from a point 174 feet east of the centerline of Hatton Road, easterly for a distance of 25 feet;

Preston Street, on the southeast side of Preston Street from a point 92 feet northeast of the centerline of McDougall Street, northeasterly for a distance of 12 feet, in Castroville;

Sandholdt Road, on the east side of Sandholdt Road, in Moss Landing, from a point 745 feet north of the east end of Bridge No. 112, northerly for a distance of 25 feet;

Scott Street, on the south side of Scott Street from a point 27 feet west of the centerline of Lincoln Street, westerly for a distance of 30 feet ( 2 diagonal stalls).

### 12.32.010 JURISDICTION.

This Chapter shall govern parking at county owned facilities except county owned parks and Natividad Medical Center. "County owned facilities" include the driveways, paths, parking facilities or the grounds of any county owned building or other facility.
(Ord. 4104, 2001).

### 12.32.20 PARKING PROHIBITED; EXCEPTIONS.

No person shall stop, park or leave standing any vehicle at county owned facilities except under one or more of the following circumstances:
A. The operator of any vehicle displays in plain view while so stopped, parked or left standing at said facility, a valid parking permit issued under the authority of the County Administrative Officer, or their designee, and the vehicle is stopped, parked or left standing in conformance with such signs as may be posted designating the class of parking permit which is allowed to park in the area.
B. The operator of the vehicle or a passenger is a member of the public with business at the county owned facility and such vehicle is stopped, parked or left standing in areas designated for "public" or "visitor" parking and in conformance with such signs designating conditions or restrictions, as may be posted from time to time.
C. The operator of the vehicle is a member of the Board of Supervisors and the vehicle is stopped, parked or left standing in an area posted for their exclusive use.
D. The vehicle is stopped, parked or left standing at a county owned facility on a holiday on which that particular county owned facility is closed or it is between the hours of 6:00 PM and the following 7:00 AM. This exception shall not apply to red zones, emergency zones, or other areas restricted during the aforementioned times if such areas are marked with the appropriate signs or curb markings.
(Ord. 4104, 2001).

### 12.32.030 PARKING LIMITATIONS.

A. No person shall park their vehicle in any county owned parking lot or facility, except in a parking stall indicated by white painted lines or rows of buttons, and in such a manner as to occupy not more than one stall with the vehicle within the stall lines.
B. No person shall stop, park or leave standing their vehicle in any restricted area which is marked with appropriate signs or curb markings if stopping, parking or leaving their vehicle in that area would violate those restrictions.
(Ord. 4104, 2001).

### 12.32.040 AUTHORITY OF COUNTY ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICER; DESIGNATING PARKING AREAS; SIGNS AND CURB MARKINGS.

The County Administrative Officer, or their designee, shall determine what areas shall be used at each county owned facility for each class of parking permit, and what conditions or restrictions shall apply to them. The County Administrative Officer is directed to maintain appropriate signs or curb markings giving notice of such condition or restriction in the various parking areas. No condition or restriction is effective unless such signs or curb markings are in place. Curb markings shall be in accordance with Section 31458 of the Vehicle Code.
(Ord. 4104, 2001).

### 12.32.050 VEHICLE TOW AWAY.

Any vehicle left unattended in any of the parking areas or driveways at county owned facilities in violation of the signs or curb markings indicating the conditions or restrictions applicable in that area, or in such a location as to obstruct or create a hazard to traffic, may be moved, or removed and stored, by or at the direction of any peace officer, and the reasonable charges incurred in so doing shall be a lien upon such vehicle.
(Ord. 4104, 2001).

### 12.32.060 COPIES OF PARKING RESTRICTIONS.

The County Administrative Officer is directed to maintain at the County Administrative Office, or the office of their designee, for examination by all interested persons, a copy of this Chapter and a map or other written statement indicating the current restrictions or conditions placed on each parking area at county owned facilities. The County Administrative Officer is also directed to provide to each county owned facility a copy of the map or written statement of the current restrictions and conditions placed upon the parking area of that county owned facility, and to designate the official or employee at the facility whose duty it shall be to have custody of the map or written statement and keep it available for public examination.
(Ord. 4104, 2001).

### 12.32.070 AUTHORITY OF COUNTY ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICER; PARKING PERMITS.

Parking permits for county owned facilities for county employees, officials, jurors and visitors are authorized and shall be issued in such a manner and on forms as the County Administrative Officer or their designee may, in their discretion, determine. Permanent parking permits shall be affixed within a seven-inch square in the lower corner of the vehicle rear window farthest from the driver, consistent with Section 26708 of the Vehicle Code. Temporary parking permits shall be placed on the far-right corner of the vehicle dashboard. No person shall use upon his or her vehicle any counterfeit or facsimile parking permit. No person, who has been issued any type of permanent parking permit, shall place said permit on any unauthorized vehicle.
(Ord. 4104, 2001).

### 12.32.080 PARKING PATROL.

The County Administrative Officer is directed to designate persons as parking patrol, who shall have the duties to investigate and survey parking conditions at county owned facilities and to make and deliver notices of violations of this Chapter pursuant to applicable provisions of the Vehicle Code.

### 12.40.010 DEFINITIONS.

A. As used in this Chapter:

1. "Parking stall" means an area in a parking lot or driveway to accommodate one parked vehicle and indicated by white painted lines or by rows of buttons or discs placed upon the surface of the ground.
2. "Park" or "parking" means the standing of a vehicle, whether occupied or not, otherwise than temporarily for the purpose of and while actually engaged in loading or unloading passengers.
B. Any words or phrases used in this Chapter which are not defined by its but are defined by the Vehicle Code shall have the meanings specified by the said Code.
(Ord. 2002, 1973).

### 12.40.020 GRANT OF LIMITED PERMISSION FOR VEHICULAR TRAFFIC.

Subject to the exceptions, conditions, and regulations in this Chapter, and pursuant to the provisions of Section 21113 of the Vehicle Code, permission is granted to drive, stop, park or leave standing any vehicle upon the paved driveways and parking areas on the grounds of the Natividad Medical Center, in the City of Salinas.
(Ord. 2002, 1973).

### 12.40.030 PARKING REGULATIONS.

A. No person shall park any vehicle upon any of said driveways or parking areas at any time except that:

1. Authorized emergency vehicles may park in the driveway and parking areas adjacent to the Emergency Room entrance.
2. Drivers of vehicles upon which a permit issued pursuant to this Chapter is properly displayed and publicly-owned vehicles bearing the special " $E$ " license plates may park in any permit parking area on said driveways, or parking areas, the exact sizes and locations of such areas to be determined by the Administrative Officer and indicated by appropriate signs or markings. In establishing the sizes and locations of such permit parking areas upon such
driveways, and parking areas, the Administrative Officer is directed to be guided by, and given consideration to, the safe, efficient, and convenient functioning of the hospital and to the maintenance of the safe and unobstructed flow of both pedestrian and vehicular traffic upon the hospital grounds.
3. Vehicles owned by the county of Monterey may park in the driveway or parking area south of the maintenance shop building.
4. Passenger buses my park at a bus stop on the driveway to the south of the visitors' parking lot and near the side entrance to the main hospital building, the exact size and location of which to be determined by the Administrative Officer and indicated by appropriate signs or markings.
5. Any vehicle may stop in front of the main entrance to the main hospital building for the purpose of loading and unloading passengers for not longer than five minutes.
6. Vehicles engaged in the loading or unloading of freight may stop in front of loading docks and freight entrances to any of the hospital buildings for not longer than thirty minutes.
7. Any person may park any vehicle on the parking area at the rear, or southeast, of the tuberculosis sanitarium and the designated parking lots north and east of the hospital.
B. No person shall park in any parking lot on the hospital grounds, or in any permit parking area, except in a parking stall and in such a manner as to occupy not more than one stall and with the vehicle not over any parking stall line.
(Ord. 2002, 1973).

### 12.40.040 SIGNS AND CURB MARKINGS.

The Administrative Officer is directed to place and maintain appropriate signs or curb markings giving notice of the parking regulations set forth in Section 12.40.030A of this Chapter, and no such regulation is effective unless signs or curb markings are in place.
(Ord. 2002, 1973).

### 12.40.050 TOW-AWAY AUTHORIZED.

Any vehicle left unattended in any of said driveways or parking lots in violation of any provision of this Chapter and in such a location as to obstruct or create a hazard to traffic may be moved, or removed and stored, by or at the direction of any peace officer, and the reasonable charges incurred in so doing shall be a lien upon such vehicle.
(Ord. 2002, 1973).

### 12.40.060 PARKING PERMITS.

A. Parking permits for permit parking areas are authorized as follows, and shall be issued in such manner and form as the Administrative Officer may, in his discretion, determine:

1. STAFF PERMITS - To employees and members of the medical and dental staff of the Natividad Medical Center who are subject to emergency call back to the hospital. These permits authorize parking in such permit parking areas and during such hours as may be designated by
the Administrative Officer.
2. PATIENT PERMITS - To patients of the Natividad Medical Center who are undergoing special treatment or who, because of physical considerations, require parking adjacent to the hospital, said permits shall be temporary and valid for a specified period of time. These permits authorize parking in such permit parking areas and during such hours as may be designated by the Administrative Officer.
B. No person shall use upon his vehicle, in any of said parking areas, any counterfeit or facsimile parking permit.
(Ord. 2002, 1973).

### 12.40.070 CITATION AUTHORITY.

The Administrative Officer is directed to designate persons as parking patrolmen, who shall have the duties to investigate and survey parking conditions at said parking lots and driveways and to make and deliver notices of violations of this Chapter pursuant to the applicable provisions of the Vehicle Code.

## ARTICLE I. GENERAL REGULATIONS

### 12.44.010 DEFINITIONS.

As used in Chapter 12.44:
A. "Driveway" means a roadway giving access from a private road or public highway to a garage or house on ground abutting said private road or public highway.
B. "Private road" means a way or place in private ownership and used for vehicular travel by the owner and those having express or implied permission from the owner, but not by other members of the public.
(Ord. 2532, 1979).

### 12.44.020 TERRITORIAL SCOPE.

Chapter 12.44 applies to private roads in the unincorporated territory of the County of Monterey, except as to roads where the county has by ordinance adopted the provisions of the California Vehicle Code in the manner provided in the Vehicle Code.
(Ord. 2532, 1979).

### 12.44.030 RECKLESS DRIVING PROHIBITED-PENALTY.

A. No person shall drive any vehicle on a private road in willful or wanton disregard for the safety of persons or property.
B. Any person who violates this section, and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by imprisonment in the county jail for not less than five days nor more than ninety days, or by fine of not less than fifty dollars (\$50) nor more than two hundred fifty dollars (\$250), or by both such fine and imprisonment.
(Ord. 2532, 1979).

### 12.44.040 SPEED CONTEST PROHIBITED -- PENALTY.

A. No person shall engage in or aid or abet in any motor vehicle speed contest or exhibition of speed on any private road.
B. Any person who violates this section shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by imprisonment in the county jail for not more than ninety days, or by fine of not more than two hundred fifty dollars (\$250), or by both such fine and imprisonment.
(Ord. 2532, 1979).

### 12.44.050 THROWING SUBSTANCES AT VEHICLES PROHIBITED -- PENALTY.

A. No person shall throw any substance at any vehicle, or occupant thereof, on a private road.
B. Any person who violates this section shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by imprisonment in the county jail for not more than six months, or by fine of not more than five
hundred dollars (\$500), or by both such fine and imprisonment.
(Ord. 2532, 1979).

### 12.44.060 SPEED LIMIT.

No person shall drive any vehicle on a private road at a speed greater than is reasonable or prudent, having due regard for weather, visibility, the traffic on and the surface and width of the private road, and in no event shall a person drive a vehicle on a private road at a speed which endangers the safety of persons or property.
(Ord. 2532, 1979).

### 12.44.070 FOLLOWING TOO CLOSELY PROHIBITED.

The driver of a vehicle on a private road shall not follow another vehicle more closely than is reasonable or prudent, having due regard for the speed of such other vehicle, and the weather, visibility, the traffic on and the condition of the roadway.
(Ord. 2532, 1979).

### 12.44.080 RIGHT-OF-WAY AT INTERSECTIONS.

A. The driver of a vehicle approaching an intersection of private roads shall yield the right-of-way to a vehicle, which has entered the intersection from a different private road.
B. When two vehicles enter an intersection from different private roads at the same time, the driver of the vehicle on the left shall yield the right-of-way to the driver of the vehicle on his right.
(Ord. 2532, 1979).

### 12.44.090 PARKING RESTRICTIONS -- EXCEPTIONS.

A. No person shall stop, park, or leave standing any vehicle, whether attended or unattended, upon the main traveled portion of a private road, or in a position to block any driveway.
B. Every person who stops, parks, or leaves standing an unattended vehicle upon a private road shall position such vehicle off the main traveled portion of the roadway so that the other vehicles may pass freely and without encountering obstructions and so that a clear view of such vehicle shall be available from a distance of 200 feet from such vehicle in each direction upon such private road.
C. This section does not apply to the driver of any vehicle which is disabled in such a manner and to such an extent that it is impossible to avoid stopping and temporarily leaving such vehicle on the main traveled portion of a private road.
D. This section does not apply to a driver who is the owner of the private road.
(Ord. 2532, 1979).

### 12.44.100 PENALTY FOR VIOLATION.

## ARTICLE II. AGUAJITO AREA

### 12.44.110 PURPOSE.

This article is enacted for the purpose of adopting the provisions of the Vehicle Code of the State of California in the manner provided in Section 21107.7 of said Vehicle Code for the control of vehicular traffic in the Aguajito Area. The "Aguajito Area" means that area referenced by Ordinance No. 1656 of the County of Monterey, adopted on March 11, 1969 and consisting of Parcels 1, 2, and 3 as described in Exhibit A of Ordinance No 1656.
(Ord. 1656, 1969).

### 12.44.120 PROVISIONS ENACTED AFTER RECEIPT OF PETITION.

This article is enacted after receipt of a petition filed with the county clerk by Del Monte Properties Company, the owner of the roads which are set forth and more particularly described in Section 12.44.140.
(Ord. 1656, 1969).

### 12.44.130 APPLICATION OF VEHICLE CODE.

There are presently owned and maintained roads described in Section 12.44.140 that are not generally held open for use of the public for purposes of vehicular travel, but by reason of their proximity to and connection with highways, the interests of residents residing along said roads and the motoring public will best be served by application of the Vehicle Code of the State of California to such roads.
(Ord. 1656, 1969).

### 12.44.140 ROADS AFFECTED.

The following roads located in the Aguajito Area are affected by this article, and the provisions of the California Vehicle Code shall apply to such roads:

1. Aguajito Road
2. Josselyn Canyon Road
3. Loma Alta Road
4. Monhollan Road
5. Viejo Road
(Ord. 1656, 1969).

### 12.44.150 SIGNS.

The owner of the roads described in Section 12.44 .140 shall erect appropriate signs at the several entrances to the areas described in Sections 12.44.140, of such size, shape and color as will be readily legible during daylight hours from a distance of 100 feet, to the effect that the road is subject to such provisions of the Vehicle Code of the State of California.
(Ord. 1656, 1969).

## ARTICLE III. DEL MONTE FOREST AREA

### 12.44.160 PURPOSE.

This article is enacted for the purpose of adopting the provisions of the Vehicle Code of the State of California in the manner provided in Section 21107.7 of the Vehicle Code for the control of vehicular traffic in Del Monte Forest, and for the purpose of repealing Ordinance No. 1655 of the County of Monterey, passed March 11, 1969, and Ordinance No. 2281 of the County of Monterey, passed March 29, 1977.
(Ord. 3673, 1993).

### 12.44.165 PROVISIONS ENACTED AFTER RECEIPT OF PETITION.

This article is enacted after receipt of a petition filed with the County Clerk of the County of Monterey by the Pebble Beach Company, owner of the Private Roads which are set forth and more particularly described in Section 12.44.175.
(Ord. 3673, 1993).

### 12.44.170 APPLICATION OF VEHICLE CODE.

There are privately owned and maintained roads within the Del Monte Forest. The term "Del Monte Forest" as used in this article means that certain unincorporated geographic area described in Ordinance No. 3673 of the County of Monterey, adopted on April 4, 1993, and is that area delineated in Figure 5 of the Del Monte Forest Land Use Plan, dated July 5, 1983, of the County's Local Coastal Program.

These privately owned and maintained roads within the Del Monte Forest are not generally held open for use of the public for purposes of vehicular travel, but, by reason of their proximity to or connection with highways, the interests of residents residing along the roads, and the motoring public will best be served by application of the provisions of the Vehicle Code to certain of those roads (the "Private Roads"). The phrase "owner of the Private Roads" as used in this article shall mean Pebble Beach Company; provided that should any of the Private Roads, or portions thereof, be transferred by the Pebble Beach Company hereafter, the phrase "owner of the Private Roads" shall mean Pebble Beach Company's successors or assigns, as the case may be, as to the Private Roads, or portions thereof, so transferred.
(Ord. 3673, 1993).

### 12.44.175 ROADS AFFECTED.

A. Except as otherwise exempted by subsection B of this Section 12.44 .175 , the Private Roads within the Del Monte Forest affected by this article are as follows:

B. The following Private Roads within the Del Monte Forest are not affected by this article and the provisions of the Vehicle Code shall not apply to such roads. The limits of these Private Road exempt areas are also indicated in Figure 5.1 of the Sign Justification Report.

1. The Private Roads in the vicinity of the Lodge at Pebble Beach and Pebble Beach Golf Links including:
a. $\mathbf{1 7}$ Mile Drive from Cypress Drive to Alvarado Way,
b. Cypress Drive from Alva Lane to the Stillwater Cove Pier; and
c. Palermo Way between Cypress Drive and Whitman Lane.
2. The Private Roads within the Spanish Bay Resort area including Spanish Bay Drive, Spanish Bay Circle and Spanish Bay Court.
3. That portion of Scenic Drive situated within the city limit of the City of Monterey and not within the unincorporated area of the Del Monte Forest.
(Ord. 3673, 1993).

### 12.44.180 THROUGH HIGHWAYS.

The following roads, or portions thereof, are highways at the entrance to which vehicular traffic from intersecting highways is regulated by stop signs ("through highways"). The sole purpose of naming the following streets as "through highways" is to expedite movement of traffic on those streets and to protect drivers from traffic from cross streets. The owner of the Private Roads shall erect and maintain appropriate stop signs at all entrances to the through highways and on such roads at the locations specified herein and all vehicles shall stop before entering or crossing a through highway.
A. Alva Lane, from Portola Road where it is stopped to Cypress Drive where it is stopped;
B. Alvarado Lane, through its intersection with Stevenson Drive and Forest Lake Road through its intersection with Riata Road except at its intersection with 17 Mile Drive, making
that intersection a four-way stop;
C. Bird Rock Road, from Congress Road where it is stopped to 17 Mile Drive where it is stopped except at its intersections with Sloat Road and Stevenson Drive where it is stopped in both directions;
D. Carmel Way, from the Carmel entrance gate to both of its intersections with 17 Mile Drive where it is stopped;
E. Congress Road, from 17 Mile Drive where it is stopped to Lopez Road where it is stopped except at its intersections with Forest Lodge Road and S.F.B. Morse Drive where it is stopped in both directions;
F. Cortez Road, from its intersection with Viscaino Road where it is stopped through its intersection with Riata Road;
G. Costanilla Way, through its intersection with Los Altos Drive through its intersection with Sunridge Road;
H. Cypress Drive, from its intersection with Stevenson Drive and 17 Mile Drive to its intersection with Alva Lane;
I. Del Ciervo Road, from its eastern most intersection with 17 Mile Drive where it is stopped through its intersection with Midwood Lane;
J. Drake Road, from its intersection with Sombria Lane where it is stopped to its intersection with Stevenson Drive where it is stopped in both directions;
K. Forest Lake Road, from its intersection with Alvarado Lane and Stevenson Drive where it is stopped to its intersection with Lopez Road where it stopped;
L. Forest Lodge Road, from the County Club Gate through its intersection with Sloat Road;
M. Lopez Road, from Sloat Road where it is stopped, making that intersection a four-way stop, through its intersection with Sunridge Road and Pebble Drive;
N. Los Altos Drive, from its intersection with Costanilla Way through its intersection with Scenic Drive, El Bosque Drive and Costado Road;
O. Midwood Lane, through its intersection with Sonado Road and Spruance Road to its intersection with Del Ciervo Road where it is stopped;
P. Portola Road, from 17 Mile Drive where it is stopped through its intersection with Sombria Lane and Porque Lane and from its intersection with Sombria Lane through its intersection with Alva Lane;
Q. Riata Road, through its intersection with Alvarado Lane through its intersection with Cortez Road;
R. Ronda Road, from Cortez Road where it is stopped to its second (easterly) intersection with Sunridge Road where it is stopped, except at its first (westerly) intersection with Sunridge Road making that intersection a four-way stop;
S. S.F.B. Morse Drive, from the S.F.B. Morse gate to its intersection with Congress Road where it is stopped making that intersection a three-way stop;
T. Scenic Drive, from its intersection with Sunridge Road where it is stopped to the Monterey City limit and from its intersection with Los Altos Drive to the Monterey City limit at the east boundary of the Ocean Pines subdivision;
U. 17 Mile Drive, from the Pacific Grove entrance gate to the State Highway 1entrance
gate, except at its intersection with Sloat Road making that intersection a four-way stop, at its western most intersection with Spanish Bay Road where 17 Mile Drive is stopped in its westbound direction, at its intersection with Alvarado Lane making that intersection a four-way stop, and at its westerly intersection with Crespi Lane where 17 Mile Drive is stopped in its westbound direction;
V. Sloat Road, from its intersection with Lopez Road where it is stopped, making that intersection a four-way stop, to its intersection with Forest Lodge Road, except for its intersection with 17 Mile Drive, making that intersection a four-way stop;
W. Sombria Lane, through its intersection with Portola Road and Porque Lane through its intersection with Portola Road;
X. Spanish Bay Road, from its most easterly intersection with 17 Mile Drive where it is stopped, through its most westerly intersection with 17 Mile Drive;
Y. Spruance Bay Road, from its most easterly intersection with Ronda Road where it is stopped through its intersection with Sonado Road and Midwood Lane;
Z. Spyglass Hill Road, from its intersection with Stevenson Drive where it is stopped to its intersection with 17 Mile Drive where it is stopped;

AA. Stevenson Drive, from 17 Mile Drive near Sloat Road where it is stopped to its intersection with Forest Lake Road and Alvarado Lane where it is stopped;

AB. Sunridge Road, from its intersection with Lopez Road where it is stopped to its intersection with 17 Mile Drive near the State Highway 1Gate except for its intersection with Pebble Drive and Lopez Road where it is stopped in the easterly direction, at its first intersection with Ronda Road making that intersection a four-way stop, its intersection with Costanilla Way at which only westbound traffic on Sunridge is stopped, and at its intersection with Chamisal Way and Sunset Lane making that intersection a four-way stop intersection;

AC. Viscaino Road, from Forest Lake Road where it is stopped to its intersection with Ronda Road where it is stopped.
(Ord. 3673, 1993).

The following intersections are stop intersections. The owner of the Private Roads shall erect and maintain appropriate stop signs at the entrances to the stop intersections as designated in this Section prior to entering the same.

AA. Intersection of Midwood Lane and Del Ciervo Road, stop required on Midwood

AB. Intersection of Ondulado Road (EB) and Stevenson Drive, stop required on Ondulado Road (EB) at the entrance to Stevenson Drive;

AC. Intersection of Portola Road and 17 Mile Drive, stop required on Portola Road at the entrance to 17 Mile Drive;

AD. Intersection of Rodeo Drive and Ocean Road, stop required on Rodeo Drive a both entrances to Ocean Road;

AE. East most intersection of Ronda Road and Sunridge Road, stop required on Ronda Road (EB) at the entrance to Sunridge Road;

AF. West most intersection of Ronda Road and Sunridge Road, at which all approaches are stopped (4-way);

AG. Intersection of Scenic Road and Sunridge Road, stop required on Scenic Drive (WB) at the entrance to Sunridge Road;

AH. Intersection of SFB Morse Drive and Congress Road, at which three approaches are stopped (3-way);

AI. Intersection of $\mathbf{1 7}$ Mile Drive and Alvarado Lane, at which all approaches are stopped (3-way);

AJ. Intersection of $\mathbf{1 7}$ Mile Drive westbound connector and Alvarado Lane, stop required on the 17 Mile Drive westbound connector at the entrance to Alvarado Lane;

AK. West most intersection of $\mathbf{1 7}$ Mile Drive and Crespi Lane, stop required on 17 Mile Drive (WB) at the entrance to Crespi Lane;

AL. Intersection of $\mathbf{1 7}$ Mile Drive and Cypress Drive/Stevenson Drive, stop required on 17 Mile Drive at the entrance to Cypress Drive/Stevenson Drive;

AM. Intersection of $\mathbf{1 7}$ Mile Drive and Sloat Road, at which all approaches are stopped (4-way);

AN. Intersection of 17 Mile Drive and Spanish Bay Road, stop required on 17 Mile Drive (WB) at the entrance to Spanish Bay Road;

AO. Intersection of Sloat Road and Lopez Road, at which all approaches are stopped (4-way);

AP. Intersection of Sloat Road and Majella Road, stop required on Sloat Road at the entrance to Majella Road;

AQ. Intersection of Spanish Bay Road and 17 Mile Drive, stop required on Spanish Bay Road at the entrance to 17 Mile Drive;

AR. Intersection of Spruance Road and Ronda Road, stop required on Spruance Road at the entrance to Ronda Road;

AS. Intersection of Spyglass Hill Road and 17 Mile Drive, stop required on Spyglass Hill Road at the entrance to 17 Mile Drive;

AT. Intersection of Spyglass Hill Road and Stevenson Drive, stop required on Spyglass Hill Road at the entrance to Stevenson Drive;

AU. Intersection of Stevenson Drive and 17 Mile Drive, stop required on Stevenson Drive (NB) at the entrance to 17 Mile Drive;

AV. Intersection of Stevenson Drive southbound connector and Portola Road, stop required on Stevenson Drive southbound connector at the entrance to Portola Road;

AW. Intersection of Sunridge Road and 17 Mile Drive, stop required on Sunridge Road (SB) at the entrance to 17 Mile Drive;

AX. Intersection of Sunridge Road and Costanilla Way, stop required on Sunridge Road (WB) at the entrance to Costanilla Way;

AY. East most intersection of Sunridge Road and Lopez Road, stop required on Sunridge Road (EB) at the entrance to Lopez Road;

AZ. West most intersection of Sunridge Road and Lopez Road, stop required on Sunridge Road (SB) at the entrance to Lopez Road;

BA. Intersection of Sunridge Road and Chamisal Way, at which all approaches are stopped (4-way);

BB. Intersection of Valdez Road and Ocean Road, stop required on Valdez Road at both entrances to ocean Road;

BC. Intersection of Viscaino Road and Forest Lake Road, stops required at all three entrances to the intersection.
(Ord. 4103, 2001; Ord. 3673, 1993).

### 12.44.190 YIELD INTERSECTIONS DESIGNATED.

The following intersections are yield intersections. The owner of the Private Roads shall erect and maintain appropriate yield right-of-way signs located at or near the entrance or entrances to the yield intersections where motorists are required to yield the right-of-way.
A. West most intersection of Ronda Road and Sunridge Road, the sign to be erected on the northeast corner of the intersection and yield required of right turning westbound Ronda Road traffic as it merges with northbound through traffic on Sunridge Road.
B. Intersection of Mission Road and Saw Mill Gulch Road, yield required at the entrance to Saw Mill Gulch Road from Mission Road.
(Ord. 3769, 1994; Ord. 3673, 1993).

### 12.44.195 SPEED LIMITS.

A. Residence Districts. Pursuant to Sections 515 and 22342 of the Vehicle Code, the speed limit on the Private Roads in all residence districts in the Del Monte Forest shall be 25 miles per hour.

1. The owner of the Private Roads shall erect and maintain 25 -mile-per-hour signs at the locations identified in the Sign Justification Report, and as approved by the County of Monterey in accordance with Section 12.44.225.
B. Decrease of Local Limits. In accordance with Sections 627 and 22358 of the Vehicle Code, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Monterey has determined upon the basis of an engineering and traffic survey that the limit of 55 miles per hour is more than is reasonable or safe upon those highways, or portions of highways, described in this subsection. Therefore, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Monterey determines and declares the following prima facie speed limits for each of the described highways, or portions of highways, which speed
limits are most appropriate to facilitate the orderly movement of traffic and are reasonable and safe. The owner of the Private Roads is directed to erect and maintain appropriate signs giving notice of such prima facie speed limits upon the highways described in this subsection.
(Ord. 3673, 1993).

### 12.44.200 CROSSWALKS.

A. Stevenson Drive south of Wranglers Trail;

F. Stevenson Drive east of Ondulado Road;
G. Forest Lodge Road north of Sloat Road;
H. Sloat Road north of Bird Rock Road;
I. San Carlos Road east of Stevenson Drive;
J. San Carlos Road west of Bird Rock Road;
K. 17 Mile Drive east of Spanish Bay Road;
L. 17 Mile Drive south of Point Joe ( 2 crosswalks);
M. 17 Mile Drive south of Bird Rock Road;
N. 17 Mile Drive at Cypress Point (2 crosswalks);
O. 17 Mile Drive at Cypress Point;
P. Colton Road north of Arroyo Drive;
Q. Colton Road south of Arroyo Drive;
R. Ocean Road east of 17 Mile Drive (2 crosswalks);
S. Spyglass Hill Road east of 17 Mile Drive (2 crosswalks);
T. Palermo Way east of Cypress Drive;
U. El Bosque Drive mid-way between Chamisal Way and Sunridge Road;
V. Forest Lake Road at Viscaino Road;
W. Forest Lake Road north of the Robert Louis Stevenson School entrance;
X. Spanish Bay Road, approximately 700 feet east of 17 Mile Drive.

### 12.44.205 PARKING.

A. Prohibited at All Times. No person shall stop, park, or leave standing any vehicle, whether attended or unattended, except when necessary to avoid conflict with other traffic or in compliance the directions of a peace officer or official traffic control device, in any of the following places a time, and the owner of the Private Roads shall erect and maintain appropriate signs or curb markings giving notice thereof.

1. Sunset Lane, on both sides of Sunset Lane beginning at approximately 200 feet south
of the El Bosque Drive/Sunridge Road/Sunset Lane intersection and ending approximately 100 feet south, through the sharp curve on Sunset Lane;
2. Benbow Place, on the south side of Benbow Place from the end of the cul-de-sac to approximately 300 feet east of Forest Lake Road;
3. Viscaino Road, on both sides of Viscaino Road from approximately 500 feet east of Forest Lake Road to Forest Lake Road;
4. Ondulado Road, on both sides of Ondulado Road between Stevenson Drive and Alva Lane;
5. 17 Mile Drive, on the northeasterly side beginning 100 feet northwest of Del Ciervo Road and continuing northwest for 50 feet;
6. 17 Mile Drive, on the northwesterly side beginning 100 feet northwest of Palermo Way and continuing northwest for 400 feet;
7. 17 Mile Drive, on the ocean side from 2800 feet north of Ocean Road to 4120 feet north of Ocean Road, generally in the vicinity of Point Joe.
B. Angle Only Permitted. Angle parking is permitted on the following roads or streets, or portions thereof, only where the owner of the Private Roads has placed signs or painted parking stalls giving notice that such parking is permitted. Where such signs or painted parking stalls are in place, no person shall park in any manner other than at the angle indicated by such signs or painted parking stalls and no person shall park in such a manner as to occupy more than one stall, or in such a manner as to place his vehicle over any painted parking stall line.
8. $\mathbf{1 7}$ Mile Drive, on $\mathbf{1 7}$ Mile Drive northwest of the Lone Cypress.
C. Handicapped. No person shall stop, park, or leave standing any vehicle, whether attended or unattended, in a stall or space designated for physically handicapped persons if, immediately adjacent to and visible from such stall or space, there is posted a sign consisting of a profile view of a wheelchair with occupant in white on a blue background, unless the vehicle displays a valid distinguishing license plate or placard.
(Ord. 3673, 1993).

### 12.44.210 NO TURNING MOVEMENT.

A. No person shall make a left turn with a vehicle at any of the following intersections. The owner of the Private Roads shall erect and maintain appropriate signs giving notice thereof.

1. From Carmel Way, at its easterly intersection with 17 Mile Drive;
2. From 17 Mile Drive, at its westerly intersection with Carmel Way; and
3. From SBF Morse Drive, at its intersection with Highway 68.
B. No person shall make a right turn with a vehicle at any of the following intersections. The owner of the Private Roads shall erect and maintain appropriate signs giving notice thereof.
4. From 17 Mile Drive, at its intersection with the eastern portion of Carmel Way; and
5. From the western portion of Carmel Way, at its intersection with 17 Mile Drive.
(Ord. 3673, 1993).

### 12.44.215 GOLF CARTS.

The Private Roads provide access to several golf courses and are hereby designated for combined use by golf carts (as defined in Section 345 of the Vehicle Code) and regular vehicular traffic. Pursuant to Section 21115 of the Vehicle Code, it shall be lawful to drive golf carts that are not registered with the California Department of Motor Vehicles upon the Private Roads, or portions thereof, with speed limits of 25 miles per hour or less. Golf cart operation under this Section shall be limited to daylight hours unless the carts meet the equipment requirements of Section 24001.5 of the Vehicle Code.
(Ord. 3673, 1993).

### 12.44.220 SIGNS AND MARKINGS.

A. The owner of the Private Roads shall erect appropriate signs at the five gated vehicular entrances to the Del Monte Forest, and at the exits from the exempt areas set forth in Section 12.44.175, Subsection B, of such size, shape and color as to be legible during daylight hours from a distance of 100 feet, to the effect that the Private Roads are subject to the provisions of the Vehicle Code. Signs shall also be placed at the entrances to the exempt areas set forth in Section 12.44.175, Subsection B, to the effect that the Private Roads within these areas are not subject to the provisions of the Vehicle Code.
B. Pursuant to Vehicle Code Section 21107.7(a), the owner of the Private Roads shall erect and maintain traffic regulatory and warning signs and markings as set forth in the Sign Justification Report and subsequent approvals by the County of Monterey pursuant to Section 12.44.225. The owner of the Private Roads shall remove all regulatory and warning signs not approved by the Sign Justification Report or subsequent approvals by the County of Monterey pursuant to Section 12.44.225.
C. Except as to variances approved by the Sign Justification Report or pursuant to Section 12.44.225, all traffic regulatory and warning signs and markings shall conform to the design and signing standards depicted in the most current editions of the FHWA "Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices" or the California Department of Transportation "Traffic Manual."
D. The owner of the Private Roads shall keep on file the type and location of all traffic control devices approved by the Sign Justification Report and all subsequent changes approved pursuant to Section 12.44.225.
(Ord. 3673, 1993).

### 12.44.225 CHANGES.

A. Changes to traffic regulatory and warning signs, signals, markings, and devices located on the Private Roads within Del Monte Forest affected by this ordinance, or variances from the design and signing standards for signs described in section 12.44 .220 or changes adding to or deleting from the Private Roads within the Del Monte Forest affected by this ordinance are hereby defined as ("Changes"). Requests for Changes shall be made by the owner of the Private Roads by letter request to the Director of Transportation. The letter request shall state the reason for the request and shall be supported by appropriate data (e.g., engineering study) as determined
necessary by the Director of Transportation.
B. Requests for Changes should include a summary of the comments received from the Del Monte Forest Property Owners Association, if any.
C. Except as provided in subsection D of this Section 12.44 .225 , all Changes shall be approved administratively by the Director of Transportation. The decision of the Director of Transportation may be appealed to the Monterey County Board of Supervisors.
D. The following changes require an amendment to this article:

1. Changes to parking restrictions;
2. Mid-block crosswalk locations;
3. Stop and Yield sign locations;
4. Signed turning movement restrictions at intersections;
5. Speed limit designations; and
6. The addition or deletion of Private Roads affected by this ordinance.

### 12.48.021 MERRITT STREET (STATE HIGHWAY 183).

Kelton Drive, in its entirety, five tons;
Main Street (Castroville), in its entirety, five tons;
Medbury Drive, in its entirety, five tons;
Merritt Street (King City), in its entirety, eight tons;
Norman Way, in its entirety, five tons;
Onyx Court, in its entirety, five tons;
Opal Court, in its entirety, five tons;
Palmer Street (Castroville), in its entirety, five tons;
Paseo De Vaqueros, in its entirety, three tons; Paseo Hermoso, in its entirety, three tons;
Penzance Street, between San Juan Grade Road and Jade Drive, five tons;

B. The Director of Transportation of the County of Monterey is directed to erect and maintain appropriate signs as necessary to clearly delineate the roads specified in subsection $A$.
C. This section does not apply to any vehicle exempted from the coverage of this Chapter by State law, including the following:

1. Any vehicle subject to Public Utilities Code Sections 1031-1036 (buses and other vehicles operated by passenger stage corporations), exempted by Vehicle Code Section

35701(a);
2. Vehicles making pickups or deliveries from or to buildings, structures, or lots located on the restricted street, exempted by Vehicle Code Section 35703;
3. Vehicles owned by a public utility or a licensed contractor while necessarily in use in the construction, installation, or repair of any public utility, exempted by Vehicle Code Section 35704.

### 12.50.010 FINDINGS AND DECLARATIONS.

In accordance with Senate Bill 2232 (Stats. 1986, Ch. 1378), local authorities are asked to provide reasonable access to super trucks attempting to reach terminal or service facilities from the State Highway System. Caltrans has designated certain state routes in Monterey County as super truck routes. This Chapter is necessary to designate certain county roads that will allow reasonable access yet provide safety, continuity, and direction within the system to facilitate the movement of goods.
(Ord. 3332, 1988).

### 12.50.020 DEFINITIONS.

The following words and phrases shall have the meaning set forth, and if any word or phrase used in this Chapter is not defined in this section, it shall have the meaning set forth in the California Vehicle Code; provided that if any such word or phrase is not defined in the Vehicle Code it shall have the meaning attributed to it in ordinary usage:
(a) "Terminal" means a facility at which freight is consolidated to be shipped or where full load consignment may be loaded and off-loaded or at which vehicle combinations are maintained, stored or manufactured.
(b) "Service" means a facility for purposes limited to fuel, food, lodging, and repair when such access is consistent with the safe operation of the combinations of vehicles and when such facility is within one-half mile of identified points of ingress and egress to the designated state highways.
(c) "Super Truck" means a truck tractor and semi-trailer or truck tractor, semi-trailer and trailer with unlimited length as regulated by the Vehicle Code. Overall length is unlimited because no constraints are applied to tractor length. Maximum trailer lengths are 28 feet 6 inches for twin trailer combinations and 48 feet for semi-trailers.
(d) "King Pin Setting" means the distance between and the king pin and the rear axle of the trailer.
(e) "CalTrans" means the State of California Department of Transportation.
(f) "Terminal Route" or "Service Route" means a highway or portion thereof, approved
and signed, for travel by super trucks.
(Ord. 3332, 1988).

### 12.50.030 APPLICATION.

(a) Any interested person requiring terminal access for super trucks from the federally designated system shall submit their request in writing, together with such information as may be required by the Director of Transportation.
(b) Upon receipt of the request set forth above, the Director of Transportation will cause an investigation to be made to ascertain whether or not the proposed terminal facility meets the requirements of the truck terminal. Upon his or her approval of that designation, he or she will then determine the capability of the route requested, and alternate routes, whether requested or not. Determination of route capability will include, without limitation, a review of adequate turning radius and lane width of ramps, intersections and highways and general traffic conditions such as sight distance, speed and traffic volumes. No access off a federally designated highway system will be approved without the approval of CalTrans.
(c) Should the requested route pass through the County of Monterey to a terminal located in another jurisdiction, the applicant shall comply with that jurisdictions application process. Coordination of the approval of the route through the County will be the responsibility of the entity which controls the terminals land use.
(Ord. 3332, 1988).

### 12.50.040 REVOCATION OF ROUTE.

The Director of Transportation may revoke any approved terminal route if the route becomes a traffic hazard for vehicular traffic. A safety hazard includes the inability of interstate trucks to negotiate the route or said vehicles causing unsafe driving conditions for other vehicular traffic or pedestrians.
(Ord. 3332, 1988).

### 12.50.050 APPEAL PROCESS.

(a) If the Director of Transportation denies terminal designation, route feasibility or revokes a previously approved route, the applicant/terminal owner, within ten (10) days following the date of receipt of the decision of the Director of Transportation, may appeal said decision to the Board of Supervisors in writing. Any appeal shall be filed with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors. The appeal shall state specifically wherein there was an error or abuse of discretion by the Director of Transportation or wherein the decision is not supported by the evidence in the record. Within five days of filing of the appeal, the Director of Transportation shall transmit to the Clerk of the Board the request for terminal route, sketches of the revoked route, and all other data filed therewith.
(b) The Clerk of the Board of Supervisors shall make copies of the data provided by the Director of Transportation available to the applicant and to the Appellant (if the applicant is not the Appellant) for inspection and may give notice to any other interested parties who requested
notice of the time when the appeal will be considered by the Board of Supervisors.
(c) If CalTrans and not the Director of Transportation denies or revokes terminal access from federally designated highways, no appeal may be made to the Board of Supervisors, but must be made to CalTrans as may be permitted by CalTrans.
(Ord. 3332, 1988).

### 12.50.060 SUPER TRUCKS PERMITTED - SIGNING.

(a) Whenever the Board of Supervisors, by ordinance, prohibits the operation of a truck with a king pin setting in excess of 38 feet and up to an including 40 feet with an overall length of up to 65 feet, from roads or portions of roads, the Director of Transportation shall designate such roads or portions thereof by appropriate signs.
(b) Whenever the Board of Supervisors, by ordinance, permits the operation of a truck with a king pin setting in excess of 40 feet or an overall length greater than 65 feet, on roads or portions of thereof, the Director of Transportation shall designate such roads or portions thereof by appropriate signs.
(c) When appropriate signs are in place giving notice thereof, no person shall operate any truck contrary to the posted regulation on any such road or portion thereof.
(Ord. 3332, 1988).

## Chapter 12.52 MOTORCYCLES

### 12.52.010 UNLAWFUL TO OPERATE IN COUNTY CEMETERY.

A. For purposes of this section, "motorcycle" means a motorcycle or motor driven cycle as defined in Sections 400 and 405 of the Vehicle Code of the State of California.
B. It is unlawful for any person to operate, drive, ride or maneuver a motorcycle on that property belonging to the County of Monterey and known as the Monterey County cemetery, said property being at the southeast corner of the intersection of Natividad Road and East Laurel Drive in the City of Salinas.
C. This regulation shall not apply to the operation of emergency vehicles or maintenance vehicles owned by any public body or public utility.
D. The ordinance codified in this section is adopted pursuant to the provisions of Section 21113 of the Motor Vehicle Code of the State of California and violations of said code section and penalties for said violations shall be those established by said code.

## Chapter 12.56 SKATEBOARDS

### 12.56.000 DEFINITIONS.

As used in this Chapter, the term "Skateboard" shall mean any board or other flat object which has wheels attached to it by any means whatsoever and which is intended to be propelled by pushing, pulling, or the forces of gravity. For the purpose of this Chapter, the term "skateboard" shall also mean roller skates or roller blades.

### 12.56.010 PROHIBITED ON CERTAIN ROADWAYS.

No person shall ride or propel a skateboard upon the roadways of any of the following roads at any time:

On the east side of Mercurio Road, the adjacent concrete drainage ditch, beginning 496 feet north of Carmel Valley Road, and, ending 901 feet north of Carmel Valley Road.

Olmstead Road/Jacks Peak Drive.
(Ord. 3111, 1986; Ord. 2331, 1977; Ord. 1134, 1960).

### 12.56.015 PROHIBITION OF SKATEBOARDS ON PRIVATE PROPERTY.

No person riding on a skateboard shall ride upon any private property when appropriate signs giving notice thereof have been posted on such private property. The sign shall be approved both as to wording and place of posting by the Sheriff.
(Ord. 3667, 1993).

### 12.56.020 PROHIBITION OF SKATEBOARDS ON PUBLIC PROPERTY.

A. No person shall ride or propel a skateboard upon property owned by the County of Monterey when such property displays a sign prohibiting such use. The County Administrative Officer shall determine which county owned property, or portion thereof shall be subject to this ordinance.
B. Signs so limiting the use of public property shall be placed at entrances to such public property, as determined by the County Administrative Officer or the County Administrative Officer's designee, and which are accessible to pedestrians. The signs shall be substantially similar to the signs approved by the Sheriff pursuant to Section 12.56 .015 of this code.

No railroad conductor or engineer, while operating a train, shall permit such train to obstruct the ordinary travel on any highway in the County of Monterey for longer than ten consecutive minutes, except when such conductor or engineer has no control over the situation causing the obstruction, or when the train cannot be moved without endangering the safety of the passengers or freight. The Director of Transportation of the County of Monterey is directed to indicate said places by appropriate signs or red paint on the curbs, or both.

Hatton Avenue, on the east side of Hatton Avenue, in Spreckels, from a point 217 feet north of the northeast curb return at Fourth Street, northerly for a distance of 20 feet; effective times: at all times.

Rogge Road, on the south side of Rogge Road, from a point beginning 330 feet west of Bollenbacher Drive, extending westerly for a distance of 60 feet.

Rio Road, across Rio Road, in the Carmel area, 400 feet east of State Highway 1;
Rio Road, across Rio Road on the east side of its intersection with Via Nona Marie (a private road) located approximately 300 feet west of Carmel Rancho Boulevard;

Salinas Road, across Salinas Road, 300 feet north of Fremont Street;
Sandholdt Road, across Sandholdt Road, 980 feet northwest of the centerline of Moss Landing Road;

San Miguel Canyon Road, across San Miguel Canyon Road, 150 feet southeasterly of its intersection with Prunedale North Road;

Valley Greens Drive, two mid-block crosswalks across Valley Greens Drive, 837 feet east of River Place and 310 feet east of Poplar Lane in Carmel.

### 12.72.010 FINDINGS AND DECLARATIONS.

In addition to and in accordance with the authority granted by the State of California under Vehicle Code Sections 22660 and 22669 to abate and remove the public nuisances of abandoned, wrecked, dismantled or inoperative vehicles and/or vehicle part(s) from private and/or public property, including highways, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Monterey makes the following findings and declarations:

The accumulation and storage of abandoned, wrecked, dismantled, or inoperative vehicles and/or vehicle part(s) on private or public property, including highways, creates a condition tending to reduce the value of private property, promotes blight and deterioration, invites plundering, creates fire hazards, constitutes an attractive nuisance creating a hazard to the health and safety of minors, creates a harborage for rodents and insects, and is injurious to the health, safety, and general welfare. Therefore, the presence of an abandoned, wrecked, dismantled or inoperative vehicle and/or vehicle part(s), on private and/or public property, including highways, except as expressly permitted by this Chapter, constitutes a public nuisance which may be abated as such in accordance with the provisions of this Chapter.
(Ord. 4097, 2001).

### 12.72.020 DEFINITIONS.

For purposes of this Chapter, the following words and phrases shall have the meaning indicated herein:
"Abandonment." In reference to highways, "abandonment" is presumed to have occurred if a vehicle is left parked, resting, or otherwise immobilized for 72 or more consecutive hours on any highway or public right-of-way; or lacks an engine, or transmission, or wheels, or tires, or doors or a windshield, or any other part of equipment necessary to operate safely on the highway. Such vehicles are presumed to be a hazard to public health, safety, and welfare and may be removed immediately upon discovery by a peace officer or other designated employee. No vehicle abandoned, parked, or left standing upon a highway or public right-of-way shall be deemed to have been removed or abated unless it has been moved on the highway or public right-of-way for a distance of at least 300 feet from its previous location. (Ord. 4205, 2003).
"Employee." An "employee" means a County employee designated by the Sheriff to do all that is necessary to abate abandoned vehicles (Ord. 4097, 2001).
"Highway." A "highway" means a place, or whatever nature, publicly maintained and open to the use of the public for purposes of vehicular traffic. Highway includes a street, and all or any part of the entire width of the right of way of said highway (Ord. 4097, 2001).
"Peace Officer." A "peace officer" means an individual as defined in Chapter 4.5 (commencing with Section 830) of Title 3 of Part 2 of the Penal Code (Ord. 4097, 2001).
"Vehicle." A "vehicle" is a device in, upon, or by which any person or property is or may be propelled, moved or drawn upon a highway, excepting a device moved by human power or used exclusively upon stationary rails or tracks (Ord. 4097, 2001).
"Vehicle, Abandoned." A vehicle is an "abandoned vehicle" if it is left on a highway, public right-of-way, public property, or private property in such inoperable or neglected condition that it may be reasonably concluded that the owner intends to relinquish all further rights or interests in it. "Abandoned vehicle" includes a "public nuisance vehicle" as defined herein; "abandoned vehicle" does not include a vehicle described in sections 5004, 5004.5, 5004.6 , or 5052 of the Vehicle Code (Ord 4205, 2003).
"Vehicle Abatement Officer" is the Sheriff or their designee as designated by the Board of Supervisors to perform the functions specified in Section 22669 ("Removal of Abandoned Vehicles") of the California Vehicle Code (Ord. 4097, 2001).
"Vehicle Abatement Hearing Officer" is the individual designated by the Sheriff to hear and determine appeals under this Chapter (Ord. 4097, 2001).
"Vehicle, Dismantled." A "dismantled vehicle" is any vehicle that is partially or wholly disassembled (Ord. 4097, 2001).
"Vehicle, Inoperative." An "inoperative vehicle" is any motor vehicle that cannot be moved under its own power (Ord. 4097, 2001).
"Vehicle, Public Nuisance." A "public nuisance vehicle" is any vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) that is abandoned, wrecked, dismantled or inoperative, that is left on public or private

property, not including highways; or that creates a condition tending to reduce the value of private property, or promotes blight and deterioration, or invites plundering, or creates fire hazard, or constitutes an attractive nuisance or endangers the health or safety of minors, or harbors rodents or insects, or jeopardizes health, safety and general welfare. In addition to the foregoing, "public nuisance vehicle" includes, but is not limited to, any vehicle found or located on private property with a registration expiration date in excess of six months before the date it is found or located, unless the vehicle has a certification of non-operation pursuant to Vehicle Code section $22651(0)(1)$ or is exempt from the filing of a certification of non-operation pursuant to Vehicle Code section 4604 (d). (Ord 4205, 2003).
"Vehicle, Wrecked." A "wrecked vehicle" is any vehicle that is damaged to such an extent that it cannot be operated upon the highway. A vehicle which has been wrecked in a traffic accident, and which has been removed from the roadway to a storage facility, but which has not been claimed by its owner will not be considered an abandoned vehicle. (Ord. 4097, 2001).

### 12.72.030 PROVISIONS NOT EXCLUSIVE.

This Chapter is not the exclusive regulation of abandoned, wrecked, dismantled or inoperative vehicles and/or vehicle part(s) within the County of Monterey. It shall supplement and be in addition to the other regulatory codes, statutes, and ordinances heretofore or hereafter enacted by the County of Monterey, the State, or any other legal entity or agency having jurisdiction.
(Ord. 4097, 2001).

### 12.72.040 EXEMPTIONS.

A. This section shall not apply to:

1. A vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) which is completely enclosed within a building in a lawful manner where it is not visible from the street or other public or private property.
2. A vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) which is stored or parked in a lawful manner on private property in connection with the business of a licensed dismantler, licensed vehicle dealer, or junkyard. (Authority: Vehicle Code Section 22661(b))
B. Nothing in this section shall authorize the maintenance of a public or private nuisance as defined under provisions of law other than Chapter 10 (commencing with Section 22650) of Division 11 of the Vehicle Code and this Chapter.
(Ord. 4097, 2001).

### 12.72.050 ENFORCEMENT AUTHORITY.

A. Except as otherwise provided in this Chapter or by law, the Board of Supervisors designates that the provisions of this Chapter shall be administered and enforced by the Sheriff or their designee.
B. In the enforcement of this Chapter, if the Vehicle Abatement Officer has reasonable grounds to believe that a vehicle has been abandoned within the meaning of California Vehicle Code Section 22523, he/she may enter upon private or public property to examine the vehicle

and/or vehicle part(s), or obtain information as to the identity of a vehicle, and to remove or cause the removal of a vehicle and/or vehicle part(s), declared to be a nuisance pursuant to this Chapter. (Authority: Vehicle Code Section 22663)
(Ord. 4097, 2001).

### 12.72.060 AUTHORITY OF PEACE OFFICER OR VEHICLE ABATEMENT OFFICER TO REMOVE ABANDONED VEHICLES.

Any peace officer of Vehicle Abatement Officer who has reasonable grounds to believe that a vehicle has been abandoned may remove the vehicle from a highway or from public or private property within the territorial limits within which the officer or Vehicle Abatement Officer is authorized to act. (Authority: Vehicle Code Section 22669) (Ord. 4097, 2001).

### 12.72.070 AUTHORITY OF CONTRACTOR TO REMOVE ABANDONED VEHICLES.

When the Board of Supervisors has contracted with or granted a franchise to any person or persons pursuant to Vehicle Code Section 22710(a), such person or persons may remove a vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) from a highway or may enter upon private property or public property to remove or cause the removal of a vehicle and/or vehicle part(s), after a determination and authorization by a peace officer or Vehicle Abatement Officer that the vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) is abandoned. (Authority: Vehicle Code Section 22669)
(Ord. 4097, 2001).

### 12.72.080 AUTHORITY OF CONTRACTED PERSON TO ENTER PRIVATE PROPERTY.

When the Board of Supervisors has contracted with or granted a franchise to any person or persons for the abatement of abandoned vehicles and/or vehicle part(s), such person or persons shall be authorized to enter upon private property or public property to remove or cause the removal of a vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) declared to be a nuisance pursuant to this Chapter. (Authority: Vehicle Code Sections 22663, 22669)
(Ord. 4097, 2001).

### 12.72.090 VEHICLES LEFT FOR 72 HOURS ON A HIGHWAY.

No vehicle shall be abandoned, parked, or left standing upon a highway for 72 or more consecutive hours. No vehicle abandoned, parked, or left standing upon a highway or public right-of-way shall be deemed to have been removed or abated unless it has been moved on the highway or public right-of-way for a distance of at least 300 feet from its previous location.
(Authority: Vehicle Code Section 22651(k))
(Ord. 4205, 2003, Ord. 4097, 2001).

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### 12.72.100 DETERMINATION OF ABATEMENT COST.

The Board of Supervisors or its designee shall, from time to time, determine and fix an amount to be assessed as vehicle abatement costs, for removal of any vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) under this Chapter. Such costs shall be in amounts sufficient to recover all costs of abatement or removal of the vehicle and/or vehicle parts, including but not limited to administer the program; conduct hearings and appeals; salary, benefits, and overhead of a Vehicle Abatement Officer and staff; vehicle mileage and towing charges; postage; documentary photography or videography; and reasonable attorney's fees. These charges are independent of those costs which might be assessed pursuant to Vehicle Code Section 22523(c).
(Ord. 4097, 2001, Ord. 4205, 2003).

### 12.72.110 REMOVAL -- COLLECTION OF COSTS.

If the administrative costs and the cost of removal incurred as a result of a hearing conducted pursuant to Sections 12.72.140 and 12.72.150 are not paid within thirty (30) days of the date of the order, such costs shall be assessed against the parcel of land pursuant to Government Code Section 25845, and shall be transmitted to the Tax Collector for collection. Said assessment shall have the same priority as other county taxes. If the vehicle was abandoned on a highway, or if the owner of a parcel of land is successful in his or her appeal challenging the abatement cost, the last registered owner of record shall be responsible for the abandonment of the vehicle and shall thereby be liable for the cost of removal and disposition of the vehicle. If such costs are not paid within thirty (30) days from the date of the order, such costs shall be transmitted to the Revenue Division for collection.
(Ord. 4097, 2001).

### 12.72.120 APPEAL OF ABATEMENT COSTS.

Any appeal challenging the abatement cost' assessed pursuant to Section 12.72 .100 shall be submitted in writing to the Sheriff within fifteen (15) days of receiving notice of an assessment. Said appeal shall be reviewed by the Sheriff or their designee. Their written findings shall be mailed to the appealing party within fifteen (15) days of the letter of appeal.
(Ord. 4097, 2001).

### 12.72.130 ABANDONED VEHICLES ON PUBLIC OR PRIVATE PROPERTY, EXCLUDING A HIGHWAY.

A. Upon discovery, on public or private property, excluding a highway, of an abandoned vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) or a vehicle which lacks an engine, or transmission, or wheels, or tires, or doors, or windshield, or other major part or equipment necessary to operate safely on the highway, the Sheriff or their designee, shall have the authority to cause the abatement and removal of said vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) in accordance with the procedure prescribed in this Section. (Ord. 4097, 2001).
B. Notice of intention to abate and remove a vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) as a
public nuisance shall be given in writing at least ten (10) days prior to such abatement and removal, unless the property owner and owner of the vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) have signed releases authorizing removal and waiving further interest in the vehicle and/or vehicle part(s). A notice of intention is not required for removal of a vehicle that is (1) inoperable due to the absence of a motor, transmission, or wheels and incapable of being towed, and (2) is valued at less than two hundred dollars (\$200) by a person specified in Vehicle Code Section 22855, and (3) is determined to be a public nuisance presenting an immediate threat to public health or safety, provided the property owner has signed a release authorizing removal and waiving further interest in the vehicle and/or vehicle part(s). Prior to final disposition under Vehicle Code Section 22662 of such a low-valued vehicle or vehicle part(s) for which evidence of registration was recovered pursuant to 12.72 .120 , the Sheriffs Department shall provide notice to the registered and legal owners of intent to dispose of the vehicle and/or vehicle part(s). If the vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) is not claimed and removed within twelve (12) days after the notice is mailed, from a location specified in Vehicle Code Section 22662, final disposition may proceed. Neither the County nor its contractors shall be liable for damage caused to a vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) removed pursuant to this section. (Authority: Vehicle Code Section 22661(c)) (Ord. 4097, 2001).
C. Such notice shall contain a statement of the hearing rights of the owner of the property on which the vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) is located, and the owner of the vehicle and/or vehicle part(s). The statement shall include a notice to the property owner that he or she may appear in person at a hearing or may present a sworn written statement denying responsibility for the presence of the vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) on the land with his or her reasons for such denial, in lieu of appearing. If it is determined at the hearing that the vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) was placed on the land without consent of the landowner and he or she has not acquiesced in its presence, the local authority shall not assess costs of administration or removal of the vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) against the property upon which the vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) is located or otherwise attempt to collect such costs from such owner. (Authority: Vehicle Code Section 22661(d),(g))
(Ord. 4097, 2001).

### 12.72.140 REMOVAL - REQUEST FOR HEARING.

A. A public hearing shall be held before the Vehicle Abatement Officer upon request for such hearing by the owner of the vehicle and/or vehicle part(s), or the owner of the land on which the vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) is located. The request shall be made in writing-to the Sheriff, within ten (10) days after the mailing of notice of intention to abate and remove the vehicle and/or vehicle part(s). (Authority: Vehicle Code Section 22661(e)) (Ord. 4097, 2001).
B. The owner of the land on which the vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) is located, is authorized to appear in person at the hearing, or present a sworn written statement, within ten (10) days of the mailing of the notice of intent to abate, denying responsibility for the presence of the vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) on is or her land, together with his or her reason for such denial.

This statement shall be construed as a request for a hearing, which does not require the presence of the owner submitting such request. (Authority: Vehicle Code Section 22661(g)) (Ord. 4097, 2001).
C. The notice of the hearing shall be mailed to all parties who request a hearing and to all landowners who have submitted sworn written statements denying liability at least fifteen (15) days in advance of the hearing. (Ord. 4097, 2001).
D. If a request for hearing is not received within the time period specified above, the Vehicle Abatement Officer shall cause the removal of said vehicle and/or vehicle part(s), and shall assess administrative and removal costs. (Authority: Vehicle Code Section 22661(e))
(Ord. 4097, 2001).

### 12.72.150 REMOVAL -- HEARING PROCEDURE.

A. All hearings under this Chapter shall be before the Vehicle Abatement Hearing Officer, at the place within Monterey County designated in the notice of hearing. The Vehicle Abatement Hearing Officer shall hear all relevant facts and testimony on the condition of the vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) and the circumstances concerning its location on the private property or public property. The Vehicle Abatement Hearing Officer shall not be limited by the technical rules of evidence. The owner of land on which the vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) is located, or their written designee, may appear in person at the hearing, or may present a sworn written statement denying responsibility for the presence of the vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) on the land, with his/her reasons for such denial.
B. The Vehicle Abatement Hearing Officer may impose such conditions and take such other appropriate action as is authorized under the California Vehicle Code, to carry out the purpose of this Chapter. Any such action may delay the time for removal of the vehicle and/or vehicle part(s), if the circumstances justify it. At the conclusion of the hearing, the Vehicle Abatement Hearing Officer may find that a vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) has been abandoned, wrecked, dismantled, or is inoperative on private or public property, and may order the same removed from the property as a public nuisance and disposed of as provided in this Chapter. The Vehicle Abatement Hearing Officer may determine the administrative costs and the costs of removal to be charged against the owner of the parcel of land on which the vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) is located. The order requiring removal shall include a description of the vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) and the correct identification number and license number of the vehicle and/or vehicle part(s), if available at the site. If the interested person makes a written statement to the Vehicle Abatement Hearing Officer, but does not appear, that person shall be notified in writing of any decision within five (5) working days thereafter.
C. An interested party may appeal the decision of the Vehicle Abatement Hearing Officer by filing a written notice of appeal with the Monterey County Sheriff within five (5) working days after the decision is mailed. The appeal shall not be de novo, and shall state the factual and/or legal basis for the appeal. Such appeal shall be heard by the Monterey County Sheriff who may affirm, amend, or reverse the order, or take other action as is deemed appropriate. The Sheriff or their designee shall give written notice of the time and place of the appeal hearing to the appellant, to the owner of the land, and the owner of the vehicle and/or
vehicle part(s). In conducting the appeal hearing, the Monterey County Sheriff shall not be limited by the technical rules of evidence.
(Ord. 4097, 2001).

### 12.72.160 REMOVAL -- DISPOSAL, DISPOSITION OF ABANDONED VEHICLES.

A. Upon removal of a vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) pursuant to this Chapter, the vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) may be disposed of by removal to a scrap yard, automobile dismantler's yard, or other suitable site. (Authority: Vehicle Code Section 22662)
B. Prohibition Against Reconstruction. After a vehicle has been removed, it shall not thereafter be reconstructed, or be made operable, unless it is a vehicle that qualifies for either horseless carriage license plates, or historical license plates, pursuant to Vehicle Code Section 5004, in which case the vehicle may be reconstructed or made operable. (Authority: Vehicle Code Section 22661(f))
(Ord. 4097, 2001).

### 12.72.170 REMOVAL -- NOTICE TO DEPARTMENT OF MOTOR VEHICLES.

Within five (5) days after the date of removal of a vehicle pursuant to this Chapter, notice shall be given to the Department of Motor Vehicles identifying the vehicle removed. At the same time, there shall be transmitted to the Department of Motor Vehicles any evidence of registration available, including registration certificates, certificates of title, and license plates. (Authority: Vehicle Code Section 22661(a))
(Ord. 4097, 2001).

### 12.72.180 REMOVAL -- NOTICE TO DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE.

A. Whenever an officer or an employee removing a California registered vehicle from a highway or from public property for storage under this Chapter does not know and is not able to ascertain the name of the owner, or for any other reasons is unable to give notice to the owner as required by Vehicle Code Section 22852, the officer or employee shall immediately notify, or cause to be notified, the Department of Justice, Stolen Vehicle System, of its removal. The officer or employee shall file a notice with the proprietor of any public garage in which the may be stored. The notice shall include a complete description of the vehicle, the date, time, and place from which removed, the amount of mileage on the vehicle at the time of removal, and the name of the garage or place where the vehicle is stored.
B. Whenever an officer of an employee removes a vehicle not registered in California from a highway or from public property for storage under this Chapter and does not know and is not able to ascertain the owner or for any other reason is unable to give notice to the owner as required by Vehicle Code Section 22852, the officer or employee shall immediately send, or cause to be sent, a written report of the removal by mail to the Department of Justice at Sacramento and shall file a copy of the notice with the proprietor of any public garage in which the vehicle may be stored. The report shall be made on a form
furnished by that department and shall include a complete description of the vehicle, the date, time, and place from which the vehicle was removed, the amount of mileage on the vehicle at the time of removal, the grounds for removal, and the name of the garage or place where the vehicle is stored.
C. Whenever an officer or employee or private party removing a vehicle from private property for storage under this Chapter does not know and is not able to ascertain the name of the owner or for any other reason is unable to give notice to the owner as required by Vehicle Code Section 22852, and if the vehicle is not returned to the owner within a period of 120 hours, the officer or employee or private party shall immediately send, or cause to be sent, a written report of the removal by mail to the Department of Justice at Sacramento and shall file a copy of the notice with the proprietor of any public garage in which the vehicle may be stored. The report shall be made on a form furnished by that department and shall include a complete description of the vehicle, the date, time, and place from which the vehicle was removed, the amount of mileage on the vehicle at the time of removal, the grounds for removal, and the name of the garage or place where the vehicle is stored. (Authority: Vehicle Code Section 22853)
(Ord. 4097, 2001).

### 12.72.190 STORAGE OF VEHICLE, MILEAGE.

A. Whenever a peace officer or employee removes a vehicle from a highway, or from public or private property, unless otherwise provided, he or she shall take the vehicle to the nearest garage or other place of safety, or to a garage designated by the County, where the vehicle shall be placed in storage. (Authority: Vehicle Code Section 22850)
B. At the time of removal, the officer or employee shall determine the amount of mileage on the vehicle. (Authority: Vehicle Code Section 22850)
C. A vehicle placed in storage shall be released to the owner, or person in control of the vehicle, only if the owner or person furnishes to the law enforcement agency or employee who placed the vehicle in storage, satisfactory proof of current registration.

### 12.72.200 NOTICE AND HEARING RIGHTS-LOW VALUE VEHICLES.

If any peace officer or Vehicle Abatement Officer or employee determines that an abandoned vehicle or vehicle part(s) have a value not exceeding $\$ 300.00$, that peace officer or Vehicle Abatement Officer or employee shall provide notice and the opportunity for a hearing and disposal in accordance with Vehicle Code Sections 22851.2 through 22851.12.

### 12.72.210 STORAGE, NOTICE, AND HEARING.

Whenever a peace officer or employee directs the storage of any vehicle, the vehicle's registered and legal owners or record, or their agents, shall be given notice and the opportunity for a post storage hearing, if required by Vehicle Code Section 22852.

### 12.72.220 PENALTIES.

A. Unlawful to Abandon or Store-Exception. It is unlawful and a misdemeanor for any person to abandon, park, store, or leave or permit the abandonment, parking, storage, or leaving
of any licensed or unlicensed vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) which is in an abandoned, wrecked, dismantled, or inoperative condition upon any private property or public property, not including county highways within the County, for a period in excess of thirty (30) days, unless such vehicle and/or vehicle part(s)is completely enclosed within a building in a lawful manner where it is not plainly viable from the street or other public or private property, or unless such vehicle is stored or parked in a lawful manner on private property in connection with the business of a licensed dismantler, licensed vehicle dealer, or a junkyard.
B. Unlawful to Fail or Refuse to Remove. It is unlawful and a misdemeanor for any person to fail or refuse to remove an abandoned, wrecked, dismantled, or inoperative vehicle and/or vehicle part(s), or refuse to abate such nuisance when ordered to do so in accordance with the abatement provisions of this Chapter, or state law where such state law is applicable.
C. No person shall abandon a vehicle upon any highway. Any violation of this section constitutes an infraction. (Authority: Vehicle Code Section 22523)
D. Every person who parks or leaves a vehicle on a highway for seventy-two (72) consecutive hours or more is guilty of an infraction. (Authority: Vehicle Code Section 22651(k))
E. No person shall abandon a vehicle upon private or public property without the express or implied consent of the owner, or person in lawful possession or control of the property. Any violation of this section constitutes a misdemeanor. (Authority: Vehicle Code Section 22523)
F. Any person convicted of a misdemeanor or an infraction under this Chapter shall be punished as provided in Section 1.20.040 B of this Code and shall provide proof that the costs of removal and disposition of the vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) have been paid. No part of any fine imposed shall be suspended. The fine may be paid in installments, if the Court determines that the defendant is unable to pay the entire amount in one (1) payment. (Authority: Vehicle Code Section 22523)
G. Proof that the costs of removal and disposition of the vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) have been paid shall not be required if proof is provided to the Court that the vehicle and/or vehicle part(s) was stolen prior to abandonment. That proof may consist of a police report or other evidence acceptable to the Court. (Authority: Vehicle Code Section 22523)
H. Every person who willfully resists, delays, or obstructs any peace officer or Vehicle Abatement Officer in the discharge or attempt to discharge any duty of his or her office or employment, when no other punishment is prescribed, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine not exceeding one thousand dollars (\$1000), or by imprisonment in the county jail not to exceed one year, or by both such fine and imprisonment. (Authority: California Penal Code Section 138(a)(1))

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## Chapter 12.75 OBSTRUCTIONS PROHIBITED

## Sections:

12.75.010 Obstructions Prohibited.
12.75.020 Violation and Infraction.

### 12.75.010 OBSTRUCTIONS PROHIBITED.

It shall be unlawful for any person to stop, block, or obstruct any sidewalk or roadway of the Main Street/Porter Drive Bridge over the Pajaro River from the Monterey/Santa Cruz County line to the intersection of San Juan Road and Porter Drive which may cause or is likely to cause any of the following circumstances:
A. Any sidewalk or roadway obstruction;
B. Any sidewalk or roadway hazard; or
C. Impede traffic.

### 12.75.020 VIOLATION AND INFRACTION.

Any violation of this Chapter will be punishable as an infraction.

## Chapter 12.76 FISHING ON SANDHOLDT ROAD BRIDGE

## Sections:

12.76.010 Prohibited.

### 12.76.010 PROHIBITED.

No person shall fish or prepare to fish while located on the Sandholdt Bridge (County Bridge No. 112) which crosses the Old Salinas River at Moss Landing.
(Ord. 2445 (part), 1978; Ord. 1134 Section 60, 1960).

## Chapter 12.77 SPECIAL PERMITS FOR OVERSIZE; OVERWEIGHT; AND OTHER VARIANCES

## Sections:

12.77.010 Powers delegated.

### 12.77.010 POWERS DELEGATED.

All of the powers and discretion granted to the Board of Supervisors by Article 6 (commencing with Section 35780), Chapter 5, Division 15 of the California Vehicle Code relating to the issuance of the permits specified therein are hereby delegated to the Director of Transportation. In requiring a bond, undertaking, or other security in connection with the issuance of any such permits, the Director of Transportation shall comply with any applicable resolutions of the Board of Supervisors relating thereto.
(Ord. 1272, Section 55, 1960).

## Chapter 12.78 OPERATION OF VEHICLES ON SLOPES, CUTS OR FILLS PROHIBITED

## Sections:

12.78.010 Operation of vehicles on slopes, cuts or fills prohibited.

### 12.78.010 OPERATION OF VEHICLES ON SLOPES, CUTS OR FILLS PROHIBITED.

No person shall operate a vehicle on a slope, cut or fill on a county road right of way where the slope exceeds three to one. A slope of three to one is a slope which has a rise or fall of one foot in a horizontal distance of three feet. This section shall not apply to officers, employees, agents or contractors of the County of Monterey engaged in work on the county roads and highways.

### 12.80.010 PURPOSE.

This Chapter outlines the requirements for the Facilities Trip Reduction Ordinance. It includes definitions and land use considerations which will help achieve the overall goals of $1.6 \%$ per year trip reduction, 1.35 Average Vehicle Ridership (AVR), or 60 percent Drive Alone Rate (DAR).

The intent of this Chapter is to ensure that new development, redevelopment, and expanse existing development contain the needed infrastructure and programs to, firstly, reduce the need to travel, and, secondly, to encourage alternative modes of travel. "Trip" as used herein refers to all trip purposes and all modes of travel.

### 12.80.020 DEFINITIONS.

For the purposes of this Chapter, the following words and phrases are defined and explained:
"Alternative Transportation Mode" means any mode of travel that serves as an alternative to the single occupant vehicle. This can include all forms of ridesharing such as carpooling or vanpooling, public transit, bicycling, walking, or alternative modes such as telecommuting.
"Applicable Development" means any new development project that is determined to meet or exceed the 50 employee threshold or any existing development that applies to increase its floor areas by 25,000 gross square feet. Applicable Developments include Complexes exceeding the 50 employee threshold. The following are the employee generation factors by type of use:

| Land Use Category | Number of Employees |

| Commercial (Regional, Community or <br> Neighborhood) | $1 / 500$ gross square feet |
| Office/Professional | $1 / 250$ gross square feet |
| Industrial | $1 / 525$ gross square feet |

| Restaurant | 1 per 10 seats |

Note: Locally generated data using summer (May-Sept.) figures may be substituted if known.
"Average Vehicle Ridership (AVR)" means the figure determined by dividing the number of employees (including those telecommuting) at a regulated work site who commute to and from work during the peak period, by the number of vehicles driven by these employees between home and the work site over that five-day period. The methodology for calculating AVR is contained in Appendix 2.
"Buspool" means a heavy duty vehicle occupied by at least 16 passengers, the routing or scheduling for which is arranged between employer(s) and transit operators.
"Carpool" means an organization of at least two (2), but not more than six (6) employees traveling together to work in a light duty motor vehicle.
"Commercial Developer" means a developer of a commercial project that falls under the definition of Applicable Development above.
"Commercial project" means a development to serve business, professional, or office purposes.
"Complex" means any business park, shopping center, or mixed use development in separate or common ownership, which can be identified by two or more of the following characteristics:
a. It is known by a common name given to the project by its developer.
b. It is governed by a common set of covenants, conditions, and restrictions.
c. It was approved, or is to be approved as an entity by the County.
d. It is covered by a single tentative or final subdivision map or has been represented to the County as a single site and development.
e. It is located on a single assessor's parcel.
f. It is part of a master plan community or a specific area plan.

At the discretion of the County, a complex may also include the Central Business district and/or strip commercial areas.
"Congestion Management Program (CMP)" means the county-wide program developed in accordance with California Government Code Sections 65088 et seq., requiring local jurisdictions and Congestion Management Agencies to adopt and implement a trip reduction and travel demand. The CMP law also requires designation of a CMP principal arterial network, a transit network, a land use impact analysis program, a Deficiency Plan and Level of Service monitoring system, and a seven year capital improvement program.
"County" means an administrative body or person within the organizational structure of the County of Monterey, such as the Board of Supervisors, Planning Commission, or Zoning Administrator, with the power to grant a permit or other entitlement for use which requires an
administrative determination as to its environmental impact, including its impact on traffic.
"Developer" means the individual or company who is responsible for the planning, design, and/or construction of an applicable development project. The developer is the individual who signs all permit applications on behalf of the property owner.
"Drive Alone Rate" means the percentage of employees driving to and from work without a passenger.
"Facility(ies)" means the total of all buildings, structures and grounds that encompass a development site, at either single or multiple locations, that comprise or are associated with an application development project.
"Mixed-Use Development" means any development project that combines residential uses with any one of these land uses: day care, office; commercial, light industrial, retail, and business parks.
"Monterey Bay Unified Air Pollution Control District (MBUAPCD)" means the regional governmental body responsible for the development and enforcement of regulations for control of air pollution within the Counties of Monterey, Santa Cruz and San Benito.
"Park-and-Ride Lot" means the parking lot located near residential communities or along highway which is served by a transit route or can be used by commuters as a staging area for carpool formation or for catching a bus. A Park-and-Ride lot may also be used by visitors as a staging area for tourist shuttle buses. Parking is free for commuters or visitors using a park-andride lot.
"Parking Cash Out Program" means an employer funded, tax-deductible program where employees provide a cash allowance to an employee that is equivalent to the parking subsidy the employer would otherwise provide. State law requires the County to grant appropriate parking requirement reductions for developments that implement parking cash out programs.
"Parking Management" means comprehensive management of the location, cost and availability of parking to effect changes in travel behavior, trips generated, and mode used. Parking management involve charging for employee parking, providing an employee transportation monetary allowance for use in paying for a bus pass or other alternative commute mode or charging for a parking space. Parking management can also mean offering preferential, priority or reserved free parking for those employees who use alternative modes. Parking Management can also involve changing time limits for parking lot or street parking to reduce employee parkers.
"Permit" means a discretionary permit for use requiring an administrative determination as to its environmental impact, including its impact on traffic.
"Residential Developer" means an individual, group or designee responsible for the development of single family or multiple family housing units in which twenty-five (25) or more housing units will be constructed as a part of a single application.
"Site Development Plan" means a precise plan of development that may be subject to public hearing before the Planning Commission, or that may or may not be subject to a discretionary permit.
"Special Event" means a seasonal, recurring activity or a singular event which attracts both residents and non-residents to a facility for recreational or other activities.
"Special Event Promoter" means the applicant who applies to stage, present, or advertise

[^5]a special event.
"Telecommuting" means a method of conducting work without leaving one's residence and thereby eliminating the commute round trip.
"Tourist-oriented Development" means a development whose purpose is to accommodate, or to sell to, the traveling public, or to promote tourism.
"Transportation Demand Management (TDM)" means the implementation of programs, p pricing, or policies designed to encourage changes in individual travel behavior. TDM can include pricing to affect travel mode change; an emphasis on alternative travel modes to the single occupant vehicle (SOV) such as carpools, vanpools and transit; reduction or elimination of vehicle trips, or shifts in the time of vehicle commutes to other than the peak period. A listing of TDM techniques is included as Appendix 1.
"Transportation Management Association (TMA)" means a group of employers or others joining together in a formal association with the intent to reduce trips.
"Trip" See Vehicle Trip.
"Trip Reduction" means reducing the number of trips made in single occupant vehicles. "Trip Reduction Checklist" means the method to be used by developers to outline TDM measures they will implement to reduce trips.
"Vanpool" means the organization of seven or more persons traveling to and from work in one vehicle.
"Vehicle Trip" means a point to point journey or trip in one direction utilizing a vehicle. For example, an employed mother driving a car and dropping off two children at two day care facilities and then going to an instant cash facility on the way to her job, makes a total of four vehicle trips.
(Ord. 3687, 1993).

## 12. 80.030 APPLICABILITY.

This Chapter shall apply to all residential developers, commercial developers, or touristoriented facility developers, and to all applicable developments.
(Ord. 3687, 1993).

### 12.80.040 COMPLIANCE.

A. Monterey County shall ascertain compliance, review residential development proposals, apply the Chapter and ensure and enforce its implementation. The County shall seek transit operator input into this process.
B. The County shall also ensure compliance with this Chapter in the review and approval of new, development and special events. (Ord. 3687, 1993).

### 12.80.050 RESPONSIBILITIES OF RESIDENTIAL DEVELOPERS AND DEVELOPMENTS.

A. Developers of all residential developments with 25 or more units must submit a Trip Reduction Checklist as part of the discretionary permit review process. The Checklist and
site development shall identify proposed design elements and facilities that encourage alternative transportation use for residents of the development.
B. The County shall take into consideration the nature and size of the project when reviewing the Trip Reduction Checklist. The County will determine the necessary programs as part of the permit approval process. After review of the Trip Reduction Checklist prepared by the developer, the County may require, but not be limited to, one or all of the following programs from the developer:

1. Provide ridesharing, public transportation, and nearby licensed child care facility information to tenants/buyers as part of move-in materials.
2. Print transit scheduling information on all promotional materials.
3. Install bicycle amenities, such as bicycle racks and bicycle lanes (where appropriate), paths and routes, and at intermodal connection points.
4. Provide bus pull-outs, pedestrian access, transit stops, shelters and amenities as part of the site plan, as described in the MST Development Review Guidebook or subsequent publications.
5. Provide locked and secure transportation information centers or kiosks with bus route and schedule information, as part of common areas.
6. Provide pedestrian facilities linking transit stops and common areas.
7. Provide financial resources for site amenities that reduce vehicle trips
8. Provide park-and-ride facilities.
9. Provide on-site child care facilities.
10. Provide local TDM Improvements defined as shuttle bus services or bus pools or improved transit service as part of the development.
11. Provide facilities such as computers and modems to encourage Telecommuting.
12. Provide Trip Generation Fees with proceeds to go toward provision of transit service, Transportation Management Associations, Ridesharing services and other alternative transport services.
13. Provide mixed land uses designed to reduce the length and number of vehicle trips where permitted by the zoning ordinance.
14. Provide pedestrian and bicycle system improvements.
15. Provide transit Oriented Design or Pedestrian Oriented Design, or both.

The County may require other measures to be added to or substituted for any or all of the above. Additional techniques for reducing trips are acceptable.
(Ord. 3687, 1993).

### 12.80.060 RESPONSIBILITTS OF TOURIST-ORIENTED DEVELOPERS AND DEVELOPMENTS.

A. Developers of all tourist-oriented developments must submit a Trip Reduction Checklist as part of the permit review process. The Checklist shall identify proposed design elements and facilities that encourage alternative transportation usage by visitors to the development.
B. The County shall take into consideration the nature and size of the project when

reviewing the' Trip Reduction Checklist. The County will determine the necessary programs as part of the permit approval process and in consultation with the transit operator. After review of the Trip Reduction Checklist prepared by the tourist-oriented developer or special event promoter, the County may require, but not be limited to, one or all of the following programs:

1. Provide park-and-ride, public transportation shuttles, and associated marketing to special event ticket purchasers as part of the special event promotion or site or business promotion.
2. Print transit scheduling information on all promotional materials.
3. Install bicycle amenities, such as bicycle racks and bicycle lanes (where appropriate), paths or routes, and at intermodal connection points.
4. Provide bus pull-outs, pedestrian access, transit stops, shelters and amenities as part of the site plan, as described in the MST Development Review Guidebook or subsequent documents.
5. Provide locked and secure transportation information centers or kiosks with bus route/schedule information, as part of common areas and at intermodal connection points.
6. Provide pedestrian facilities linking transit stops and common areas and at intermodal connection points.
7. Provide financial resources for site amenities that reduce vehicle trips.
8. Provide park-and-ride facilities.
9. Provide local TDM Improvements defined as shuttle bus services or bus pools or improved transit service as part of the development.
10. Pay Trip Generation Fees with proceeds to go toward provision of transit service, Transportation Management Associations, Ridesharing services, and other alternative transport services.
11. Provide mixed land uses designed to reduce the length and number of vehicle trips where permitted by the zoning ordinance.
12. Provide pedestrian and bicycle system improvements.
13. Provide alternative transportation from the airport, provide airport information displays, contribute to the marketing or fare promotions of transit service and transit passes, provide concierges as sources of tourist transit promotion, rent bicycles to visitors, provide contributions of funds for implementing rail service to the area, provide transit information displays.
14. Provide educational and marketing strategies designed to induce tourists to reduce their vehicle trips.
15. Prepare programs and projects to provide alternatives to automobile transportation into Monterey County.
The County may require other measures to be added to or substituted for any or all of the above. Additional measures which reduce vehicle trips are acceptable. (Ord. 3687, 1993).

### 12.80.070 RESPONSIBILITIES OF COMMERCIAL DEVELOPERS AND DEVELOPMENTS.

A. Developers of all commercial developments must submit a Trip Reduction Checklist
as part of the permit review process. The Checklist shall identify proposed design elements and facilities that encourage alternative transportation usage by the customers and employees of the development.
B. The County shall take into consideration the nature and size of the project when reviewing the Trip Reduction Checklist. The County will determine the necessary programs as part of the permit approval process. After review of the Trip Reduction Checklist prepared by the developer, the County may require, but not be limited to, one or all of the following programs:

1. Provide ridesharing, public transportation and nearby child care facility information to employees as part of orientation materials.
2. Provide on-site day care for customers and employees.
3. Provide on-site banking automatic teller machines (ATMs), restaurants, dry cleaners, grocery, and other typically needed services to reduce the need for vehicle trips. Link these uses with convenient and pedestrian oriented paths. Provide transit access that allows bus passengers convenient access to uses with a minimum of walking distance.
4. Locate building entrances close to bus stops with access uninterrupted by parking lots, parking aisles, and interior roadways. Place parking at the rear of the development and the transit stop at the front of the development near the main entrance.
5. Print transit information in employee paychecks occasionally. Provide on-site trip information displays.
6. Install bicycle amenities such as bicycle racks and bicycle lanes (where appropriate), paths or routes, and at intermodal connection points.
7. Provide bus pull-outs, pedestrian access, transit stops, shelters and amenities as part of the development as described in the MST Development Review Guidebook or subsequent documents.
8. Provide locked and secure alternative mode information kiosks.
9. Offer parking cash out program for employees.
10. Provide park-and-ride facilities within the development which are not limited to on-site customers or employees.
11. Provide preferential parking for employees who rideshare.
12. Provide local TDM improvements defined as shuttle bus services/bus pools or improved transit service as part of the development.
13. Provide facilities and policies to encourage telecommuting.
14. Provide pedestrian, bicycle, and transit system improvements.

The County may require other measures to be added to or substituted for any or all of the above. Additional measures which reduce vehicle trips are acceptable.
(Ord. 3687, 1993).

### 12.80.080 REPORTING OF JURISDICTIONS.

As part of the annual conformance process of the Congestion Management Program, the County shall provide the Transportation Agency for Monterey County (TAMC) with materials and documentation as needed. The County shall ascertain compliance by reviewing tourist shuttle
implementation, special event transportation shuttles and parking programs, park-and-ride lot development, provisions for bicyclists and pedestrians, and other parking, pricing, marketing efforts, and educational strategies to induce reduced trips.
(Ord. 3687, 1993).

### 12.80.090 ENFORCEMENT AND PENALTIES.

Enforcement will occur via the implementation of the County's zoning ordinances, subdivision ordinances, development standards and permit conditions. Upon project completion and final inspection, the department issuing the permit shall enforce the conditions.
(Ord. 3687, 1993).

### 12.80.100 VIOLATIONS.

1. A violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be an infraction,
2. Failure to incorporate Trip Reduction techniques as mandated by this ordinance into new or expanded development is a violation of this ordinance.
3. Failure to submit the Trip Reduction Checklist is a violation of this ordinance.
4. Each day that a provision of this ordinance, or the terms and conditions of any approved Trip Reduction Checklist are violated shall constitute a separate violation.
5. Falsifying information is a violation of this ordinance:
6. Failure to ensure that required amenities are available for alternative modes for the life of the development or until the development permit conditions are otherwise amended is a violation of this ordinance.
(Ord. 3687, 1993).

### 12.80.110 ENFORCEMENT.

For purposes of ensuring that the provisions of this Chapter are fully adhered to, the County may, following written notice, initiate enforcement actions against property owners, developers or designees which may include, but not be limited to, the following:

1. Withhold approval of development permits.
2. Issue stop work order,
3. Initiate proceedings to revoke the site development permit or other discretionary action.
4. Withhold issuance of a Certificate of Occupancy.
5. Withhold final Building Permit sign-off
6. Withhold consideration of other applications pending from the same developer.
(Ord. 3687, 1993).
12.80.120 FINES.

Revenues received from fines levied to ensure compliance with this ordinance shall be used to support alternative transportation.
(Ord. 3687, 1993).

## APPENDIX 1.

## TRANSPORTATION DEMAND MANAGEMENT (TDM) TECHIQUES

TDM techniques may include the following:

1. Ridesharing
a. Carpool/vanpool matching
b. Preferential parking for carpools and vanpools
c. Carpool/vanpool financial subsides or rewards
d. Employer-provided vehicles for carpools/vanpools
e. Employer-sponsored vanpools
f. Ridesharing marketing campaigns
g. Financial subsidy of vanpool liability insurance
2. Transit
a. Work site transit ticket sales
b. Transit ticket financial subsides
c. Transit route maps and schedules distributed and displayed on-site at the workplace
d. Shuttle to transit lines
3. Trip Elimination
a. Compressed works weeks
b. Work-at-home programs
c. Telecommuting
4. Parking Pricing
a. Establishing fees for employee parking that cost as much as a monthly bus pass
b. Elimination of any employer parking financial subsidy
c. Transition from employer parking financial subsidy to general transportation monetary allowance for all employees
d. Reduced parking rates for carpools and vanpools
5. Bicycle and Pedestrian
a. Bicycling financial subsides or rewards
b. Financial subsidy to employees for the purpose of bicycles for commute trip use
c. Bicycle lockers or other secure, weather-protected bicycle parking facilities
d. Bicycle access to building interior
e. Bicycle and/or walking route information
f. On-site bicycle registration
6. On-Site Facilities/Services
a. Employee shower facilities and clothes lockers
b. Site modifications that would encourage walking, transit, carpool, vanpool and bicycle use
c. On-site services to reduce mid-lay vehicle trips, e.g., direct deposit of payroll, cafeteria, Automatic Teller Machines, apparel cleaning, etc
d. On-site transportation fair to promote commute alternatives
7. Other
a. Membership in a Transportation Management Association that provides services and incentives
b. Establishment of employee committee to help design, develop, and monitor the trip reduction program
c. Guaranteed ride home program
d. Financial subsides or rewards for using walking and other non-motorized transportation modes, transit, or carpools
e. Shuttles between multiples work sites
f. Providing child day care at/near work site
g. Enhance trip reduction efforts
8. Any additional techniques not listed here which bring about the desired reduction in vehicle trips, (Ord. 3687, 1993).

## APPENDIX 2.

## AVERAGE VEHICLE RIDERSHIP (AVR) METHODOLOGY

The average period cannot contain a holiday and shall be for a normal, representative week. The AVR for the work site is calculated by dividing the total "employee days" by the total "vehicle trip days" for the survey week. The survey will be done at least annually for the same sample week.

Employee-Days are the total number of employees reporting or assigned to a work site during the peak period each work day of the survey week. The following procedures are used in totaling employee-days:

1. Employees who telecommute or are off due to a compressed work week schedule are counted as reporting to the work site in calculating the total employees-days.
2. The following employees are included in the employee-days total:
a. Employees not working because of vacation, sickness, or other time off
b. Employees who report to a different work site of an off-site work-relative activity.
c. Disabled employees.

Vehicle Trip-Days: The total number of vehicles used by employees in reporting to the work site each work day of the survey week. A vehicle trip-day is based on the means of transportation used for the greatest distance of an employee's home-to-work commute trip. The following numerical values are used in calculating vehicle trip-days.:

1. Single Occupant Vehicle (drive alone) $=1$.
2. Employee dropped-off vehicle by another person=1.
3. Carpool $=1$ divided by the number of employees on the carpool, regardless of whether the other employees in the carpool work for the employer or at the work site.
4. Vanpool $=1$ divided by the number of employees in the vanpool, regardless of whether the other employees in the vanpool work for the employer or at the work site.
5. Motorcycle, moped, scooter, or motor bike $=1$.
6. The following $=0$ vehicle trip-days:
a. public transit
b. private Buspool
c. bicycle
d. walking and other non-motorized transportation modes
e. employee who telecommute (only on the days those employees work at home for the entire day.)
f. employees who work a compressed work week schedule (only on their compressed day(s) off).
g. disabled employee vehicle at all times.
Example of AVR Calculation:
100 employees all commuting to and from work
Employees reporting to work:
Monday ..... 100
Tuesday ..... 100

### 12.90.010 FINDINGS.

A. The Board of Supervisors of the County of Monterey finds that future development within the unincorporated County to the year 2030 will result in degradation of traffic levels of service on the regional transportation system of streets, arterials, and highways throughout the County of Monterey.
B. The Board of Supervisors of the County of Monterey finds that failure to expand the capacity of the existing circulation system as new development is approved will increase congestion on the regional system, as documented in the "Regional Impact Fee Nexus Study Update" (dated March 26, 2008) (the "Study") approved by the board of the Transportation Agency for Monterey County ("TAMC"), TAMC commissioned the Study, which looks at, among other matters, future development and the planned future road improvements needed to serve the new development.
C. The Board of Supervisors of the County of Monterey finds and declares that the fairshare traffic impact fee to be levied upon new development pursuant to this Chapter provides a mechanism to fund new developments' share of regional transportation system improvements that are needed to mitigate congestion and related adverse impacts caused by the new development. The Regional Development Impact Fee can serve as mitigation along with other mitigations for such congestion and related adverse impacts if and as appropriate as a result of full analysis of the impacts of each new development.
D. The Board of Supervisors of the County of Monterey finds that exactions from new development are necessary to provide a portion of the funding for the construction of the regional transportation improvements needed to accommodate traffic that will be generated by new development of land within the County.
E. The Board of Supervisors of the County of Monterey finds that the Study has determined the extent to which the new development of land will generate traffic volumes impacting the regional transportation system and that this Chapter establishes a fair and equitable method for distributing the unfunded costs of transportation improvements necessary to accommodate the traffic volumes generated by such development.
F. The Board of Supervisors of the County of Monterey finds there is a reasonable relationship between the use of the Regional Development Impact Fee to pay for the constructions of the Regional Transportation Improvement Projects and the type of development
for which the Regional Development Impact Fee is charged in that all new development in the County, both residential and non-residential, will generate or contribute to the need for the Regional Transportation Improvement Projects in different degrees as further described in the Study.
G. The Board of Supervisors of the County of Monterey finds that the cost estimates set forth in the TAMC 2008 Regional Impact Fee Nexus Study Update are reasonable cost estimates for constructing the Transportation Improvement Projects, and the Regional Development Impact Fees expected to be generated by future development will not exceed the projected costs of constructing the Transportation Improvement Projects.
H. The Board of Supervisors of the County of Monterey also finds that the fees collected pursuant to this Chapter shall only be used to finance the Regional Transportation Improvement Projects. The County adopts this ordinance with the expectation that a required minimum number of TAMC member governing bodies will also adopt the Regional Development Impact Fee on a uniform basis and that the County and these other TAMC members will use the fees collected in a coordinated manner to provide for financing and construction of the Regional Transportation Improvement Projects.
I. The Board of Supervisors of the County of Monterey has reviewed and considered the certified Environmental Impact Report for the 2005 Monterey Bay Area Metropolitan Transportation Plan and Addendum thereto prepared by TAMC, the lead agency for the Regional Development Impact Fee for purposes of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) (Public Resources Code section 21000, et seq.). The County, as a responsible agency under CEQA, has followed the process set forth in section 15096 of Title 14 of the California Code of Regulations and has made the appropriate findings under CEQA.
J. The Board of Supervisors of the County of Monterey has authorized the execution and delivery of a Joint Powers Agreement ("JPA") establishing the Monterey County Regional Development Impact Fee Join Powers Agency ("RDIF Agency") to coordinate the activities of the parties to the JPA in connection with the collection, transmittal, and expenditure of the Regional Development Impact Fee.

### 12.90.020 TERMS AND DEFINITIONS.

For purposes of this Chapter, the following definitions shall apply;
A. "Applicant" means the person or entity applying for a tract map, parcel map, tentative subdivision map, conditional use permit, land use permit, building permit or other land use entitlement for a new development project and their successors and assigns.
B. "RDIF Agency" refers to the Monterey County Regional Development Impact Fee Joint Powers Agency.
C. "Regional Development Impact Fee" or "the Fee(s)" or "RDIF" refers to the fees approved by the governing boards of the County and other TAMC members on new development within their respective jurisdictions and transmitted to the RDIF Agency as provided in the JPA. The project list for the Regional Development Impact Fee is in Exhibit "B" of the JPA.
D. "Regional Transportation Improvement Projects" or "Transportation Improvement Projects" or "Projects" refers to those public improvements required to mitigate the regional
impacts of new development on the roads, highways and arterials within the County as specified in Section 12.90.070 of this Chapter.
E. "Strategic Expenditure Plan" refers to a plan prepared by the RDIF Agency, which shall include project cost estimates, revenue estimates for the RDIF, other matching funds, a draft timeline for project delivery and, in the event the County-wide sales tax measure for transportation improvements fails to pass, a plan for prioritizing the expenditure of RDIF collected from development within a particular Transportation Improvement Zone on Transportation Improvement Projects within that zone. The Strategic Expenditure Plan is further defined in Section 10 of the JPA.

### 12.90.030 ESTABLISHMENT OF A REGIONAL DEVELOPMENT IMPACT FEE.

A. The Regional Development Impact Fee is hereby established in the amounts specified in a resolution to be adopted by the Monterey County Board of Supervisors for the purpose of paying for Regional Transportation Improvement Projects identified in Exhibit "B" of the JPA needed to meet increased demand created by traffic resulting from new development. The revenues raised from the impact fee shall be remitted to the RDIF Agency to be held, maintained, used and accounted for as required in Government Code section 66006 of the Mitigation Fee Act in a coordinated fashion, as provided in the JPA.
B. The Regional Development Impact Fee shall be automatically adjusted as of July 1 of each year following the first year after the effective date of this Chapter. The adjustment shall be calculated by TAMC as administrator of the RDIF Agency, based on the increase or decrease in the Engineering News Record Construction Cost Index for the San Francisco Bay Area for the period ending December 31 of the preceding calendar year.
C. In addition to the automatic adjustment set forth above, TAMC may recommend to the County and other TAMC members that the Regional Development Impact Fee be increased to reflect revisions to the project list in the Monterey Regional Transportation Plan, program revenue, increases in land values over the inflationary increase, or other factors.
D. Except as provided in Government Code sections 65961, 66474.2 and 66498.1 or as otherwise provided by state or federal law or the exemptions set forth in Section 12.90.040 below, not tract map, parcel map, tentative subdivision map, conditional use permit, land use permit, building permit or other land use entitlement for a new development project shall be approved or issued unless payment of the Fee is a condition of approval for any such entitlement. Prior to issuance of a building permit or at such other time as required by law, the County shall require the applicant to pay the Fee.
E. The Fees shall be imposed and collected by the Count and, along with any interest earned on the Fees while in the possession of the County, shall be transmitted by the County to the RDIF Agency no later than the tenth business day of each month for all Fees collected during the prior month. The Fees shall be placed by the RDIF Agency in Regional Development Impact Fee Accounts as described In section 7 of the JPA. All interest or other earnings of the Accounts shall be credited to the Accounts.

### 12.90.040 EXEMPTIONS.

In addition to any exemptions from the levy of development impact fees provided by law,
including, as applicable, the levy of development impact fees as a condition of a vesting tentative map, the following development projects are exempt from payment of the fee required by this Chapter:
A. The reconstruction of any building so long as the reconstructed building both continues a use of the same category as the prior use and generates the same or fewer trips as the original building, and, so long as the permit for reconstruction is issued and reconstruction commences within one (1) year from destruction of the building.
B. Development within the Fort Ord Reuse Agency ("FORA") area that is subject to transportation improvement fees for transportation projects within the FORA plan area.
C. Development pursuant to a development agreement that was entered prior to the Effective Date of Joint Powers Agreement in accordance with the terms of the development agreement in effect prior to the Effective Date of the Joint Powers Agreement.

### 12.90.050 CREDITS OR REIMBURSEMENTS.

An Applicant who constructs all or part of one of the Transportation Improvement Projects may be eligible for a credit or reimbursement, as provided herein;
A. Credit or Reimbursement for Regional Transportation Improvement Projects funded by the Strategic Expenditure Plan.

An Applicant may be eligible for a credit to be applied against payment of the Regional Development Impact Fee if the Applicant constructs or dedicates right-of-way with respect to all or a part of one of the Transportation Improvement Projects that is, at the time the Applicant enters into an agreement with the County for construction of such Project, included in the prioritization plan of the Strategic Expenditure Plan as a Project to be funded.

An Applicant may be eligible for a reimbursement if the cost of constructing such a Transportation Improvement Project, or a part of such Project, exceeds the amount of the Regional Development Impact Fee to be paid by the Applicant. The amount of reimbursement shall equal the difference between the cost of constructing all or a part of the Regional Transportation Improvement Project and the Regional Impact Fee for the development project.

Reimbursement shall be from Regional Development Impact Fee revenues only, and the right to reimbursement shall be terminated ten years from the date the Applicant entered into the agreement for construction of the Project.

The amount of credit, or the credit and reimbursement together, shall be in an amount equal to the cost of the Regional Transportation Improvement Project or portion thereof, as calculated by the RDIF Agency. The credit, or the credit and reimbursement together, shall be calculated at the time the Applicant enters into an agreement for construction of the Regional Transportation Improvement Project. The credit shall be granted at the same time. Once calculated, the amount of reimbursement shall not increase for inflation nor shall it accrue interest.
B. Reimbursement for Projects Not Funded for Construction in the Strategic Expenditure Plan.

If an Applicant constructs all or a part of a Transportation Improvement Project that is not, at the time the Applicant enters into an agreement for construction of such Project, included in the Strategic Expenditure Plan as a Project to be funded, the Applicant may be eligible for
reimbursement as set forth herein, provided that the Strategic Expenditure Plan is subsequently revised to include the improvement as a Project to be funded.

In such event, the amount of reimbursement shall be in an amount equal to the cost of the Transportation Improvement Project or portion thereof, as set forth in the Strategic Expenditure Plan, and shall be calculated by the County Director of Transportation and the Treasurer of the RDIF Agency. The amount of the reimbursement shall be calculated when the Applicant enters into an agreement for construction of the Transportation Improvement Project and posts bonds. Once calculated, the amount of reimbursement shall not increase for inflation nor shall it accrue interest. Reimbursement shall be from Regional Development Impact Fee revenues only, and the right to reimbursement shall be terminated ten years from the date the Applicant entered into the agreement for construction of the Project.

### 12.90.060 SEVERABILITY.

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this Chapter is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or otherwise invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the portions of this Chapter not held to be unconstitutional or invalid. The Board of Supervisors hereby declares that it would have passed this Chapter and each section, subsection, clause or phrase thereof irrespective of the fact that one or more sections, subsections, clause or phrases thereof be declared unconstitutional or invalid.

### 12.90.070 LIST OF PROJECTS IN THE REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION SYSTEM.

The Regional Development Impact Fee shall be used to fund all or a portion of the list of Transportation Improvement Projects described in Exhibit "B" of the JPA.

### 12.90.080 ADMINISTRATIVE COSTS.

The RDIF Agency may establish a processing fee or administrative surcharge to defray the reasonable cost of administration of the RDIF program by the RDIF Agency in an amount not to exceed $1 \%$ of the fees collected by the County, and the RDIF authorized by this Chapter may be utilized for this processing fee, in accordance with Government Code section 66014 and as otherwise provided by law.

SECTION 3. SEVERABILITY. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase of this ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance. The Board of Supervisors hereby declares that it would have passed this ordinance and each section, subsection, sentence, clause and phrase thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, or phrases be declared invalid.

SECTION 4. This ordinance shall become effective on the thirty-first day following its adoption.
