
Vision Statement



- Bright Beginnings covers the first goal areas of Bright Futures Education Partnership, and we work closely with Bright Futures staff and partners








Bright Beginnings

- Bright Beginnings is an opportunity for the community to work together to ensure that young children, from the prenatal stage through age 8, have what they need to succeed
- Investing in young children improves their well-being and fulfills their rights today, and also has numerous positive impacts, with a \$13 return per \$1 spent!
