APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Commissioner Hughett noted an incorrect date listed for the next meeting.

Motion: Commissioner Kreyenhagen made a motion to approve the 12 December 2017 Fish and Game Advisory Commission minutes with the corrected meeting date to 12 December 2017. Commissioner Morales seconded the motion and it was unanimously approved.

PUBLIC COMMENT

ACTION: There was no comment from the members of the public.

COMMISSIONER COMMENTS, REQUESTS, REFERRALS

- Commissioner Hughett expressed concern over the designation of the \$50k under education programs in the finances and worries it would limited to just that. Commissioner Urquhart responded that there are no strings attached to the funding.
- Commissioner Urquhart stated there are upcoming options to be available on how to legally create an assault rifle.
- Commissioner Sargenti stated that Arizona is now attempting to pass mountain lion protection laws.
- Commissioner Evans expressed concern over the growing coyote population in Pacific Grove. He is seeking out solutions.
- Commissioner Evans also asked for clarification on the fishing boundaries and whether contour lines or GPS position determines location. Warden Tognazzini said to use the contour lines.
- Commissioner Nelson announced that former Monterey County Fish and Game Advisory Commissioner Bob Montgomery has passed away.
- Commissioner Cullen recommended listening to a radio program with the Conservation Leaders of Tomorrow that featured upcoming students and researchers stressing the importance of hunting and fishing from a conservation stand point.
- Commissioner Kreyenhagen mentioned he received a survey on non-lead ammunition from Ventana Wildlife Society biologist Mike Stake; 10 years ago, condor conservationists needed the hunters and now the hunters need the condor conservationists (aid in providing non-lead ammo).
- Commissioner Kreyenhagen asked for clarification on hunting near guzzlers; Warden Tognazzini responded that the only rule is within a Desert Conservation Zone, you're only allowed for 30 minutes, otherwise, no rules.
- Commissioner Kreyenhagen said he spoke with Bill Gaines about non-residents bringing in their own ammunition from outside the state; currently allowed 40–50 rounds per weapon dependent on type. Commissioner Urquhart stated that recently passed video surveillance requirements at ammunition suppliers will ruin mom and pop shops who cannot afford to comply.
- Commissioner Morales provided a letter written in support of control on coyote populations.

SCHEDULED MATTERS

1. Guest Speakers

a) Dan Haifley, Executive Director, O'Neill Sea Odyssey

Dan Haifley returned to report on the use of grant funding; the \$2500 that the Commission provided was used to transport 4 classrooms to the harbor. In 2017, a total of 214 classes were scheduled at about 30 students at a time; 111 of those classes were underwritten for bus transport. In Monterey County, 73 classes consisting of 1253 students participated in the program. Less than 10% of the students have ever been on the ocean. Course curriculum is available online.

2. Receive a verbal report from the California Department of Fish & Wildlife Warden Tognazzini began with the recent officer involved shooting on 11 December 2017 beginning on Forest Service property with the suspect being apprehended on Fort Hunter Liggett. A USFS Fire Captain was returning from a small fire on the Big Sur coast when he pulled over to allow a tailgating vehicle to pass. The suspect exited his vehicle, pulled out a .410 shotgun and shot at the victim, striking him in the neck and face with bird shot. The suspect fled towards Fort Hunter Liggett. The victim was able to radio in the situation and emergency personnel was dispatched. After a brief shootout with the suspect, the suspect was located off San Miguelito Loop Road by an FHL law enforcement officer and was apprehended without further incident.

Run-down of recent activity: Chews Ridge is once again a hot-spot for poaching of band-tailed pigeons. A local great white shark attack was confirmed, victim expected to make full recovery. A reported mountain lion attack on a pit bull was false as the prey animal turned out to be a deer. A non-resident using a false state ID attempted to obtain a resident license. Crab season has reopened with lots of violations occurring within the MPAs. A confirmed sea otter attack on a man resulted in the sea otter being taken to the Monterey Bay Aquarium for observation.

Warden vacancies are being filled as trainees are completing their field training. Captain Kelly's position still not out for advertisement. Forty-eight people set to start the academy in January.

Marijuana laws are expected to cause additional problems, including polluting natural resources. Wardens will not deal with these problems, marijuana permitting officers are to be hired instead. The officers will make sure growing operations are in compliance and act as security for environmental staff. During the J-10 hunt at Fort Hunter Liggett (Junior either-sex), 5 illegal spikes were taken. Commissioner Evans asked why not continue the education meeting prior to the hunt. Commissioner Guilliam responded that the meeting was discontinued as it was difficult to accommodate both the number of hunters as well as their schedules as many of them are high-school students with many extra-curricular activities. The hunting program will be back under the authority of the Environmental Office as of 1 June 2018 and ENV staff plans to work closely with Warden Gil in creating and distributing information material prior to the hunt.

3. Receive current Financial Report

Commissioner Urquhart and Warden Tognazzini both affirmed that the recent decrease in fine monies is primarily due to incorrect coding in the court clerk's office. It is possible for CaDFW to audit the records. Commissioner Urquhart recommends the Board of Supervisor's requests the audit. Commissioner Evans motioned to recommend to the Board of Supervisors to audit. Commissioner Hughett stated that the county finance person is currently seeking answers from the courts and perhaps we can identify the problem without audits. Commissioner Evans asked if we can approach the problem concurrently: initiate audit while county seeks answers.

MOTION: Commissioner Kreyenhagen motioned to table the issue and allow county staff time to investigate the issue; issue to be readdressed at the February meeting. Also motioned to approve financials as-is. Commissioner Burnett seconded the motion and it was approved unanimously.

It is recommended that the Fish and Game Commission:

a) Receive Parks Fish and Game Propagation Fund FY 2017-18 Financial Summary Report through December 31, 2017.

SUMMARY/DISCUSSION:

Parks Fish and Game Propagation Fund FY 2017-18 financial update through December 31, 2017, reflects actual revenue from Other Court Fines of \$3,533. Year to date Interest Revenue is \$229 for a total of \$3,763. Overall revenue from Other Court Fines is lower in the current year than what was recognized for the same period in FY 2016-17 of \$6,942. The Fish and Game Commissioner have expressed concerned over declining revenues and have asked the County's Administrative staff to inquire with the Courts on the fine distributions. It was discovered that due to changes in the Courts accounting system, there are some known discrepancies they are aware of trying to remedy. As of December 31, 2017, only \$19.28 in expenditures have posted.

OTHER AGENCY INVOLVEMENT:

None.

FINANCING:

There is no impact to the County's General Fund because of receiving this report. The estimated uncommitted beginning fund balance for FY 2017-18 is \$17,083 and does not consider the \$50,000 designated for education programs.

SUMMARY/DISCUSSION:

Notices announcing the grant program were placed in the Monterey County Herald on December 15th, and 22, 2017 and again on January 5, 2018. On December 15, 2017, the application packet was made available and distributed to interested applicants. Applications were due on January 19, 2018.

A total of 11 grant applications were received and the total funding request is for \$60,783.45. The attached summary provides a list of applications, the sponsoring organizations and/or agencies, brief project description and requested funds.

The Propagation Grant working group members have reviewed the grants for completeness. Applicants requiring additional information or material will be notified prior to the February 13, 2018 meeting. At the February meeting the Commission will consider and recommend funding requests. Resolution No. 81-239

Operational Guidelines

Monterey County Fish and Game Commission was formed by the Board of Supervisors by enacting Resolution #81-239, on April 28, 1981. Sections 1-13 were those sections adopted by this resolution. All other there after are suggestions to supplement the original sections except Section 9 which was broadened to cover the changes we made in our election policy.

SECTION 1. CREATION OF COMMISSION

Be it resolved that: There hereby created the Monterey County Fish and Game Commission

SECTION 2. MEMBERSHIP

The Commission shall be appointed by the Monterey County Board of Supervisors and shall consist of fifteen (15) residents of Monterey County as follows: Three (3) members appointed from each supervisorial district.

SECTION 3. VACANCIES

Any vacancy shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointment. A vacancy shall exist, and shall be reported to Clerk of the Board of Supervisors, when, a) a member fails to attend two consecutive meetings of the Commission without good cause, entered into the Commissions Minutes: b) a formal letter of resignation is submitted to the Commission Chairperson and/or the appointing Supervisor; c) a Commission member no longer resides in Monterey County, or otherwise does not meet the qualifications for the appointment.

SECTION 4. TERM OF OFFICE

Each member of the Commission shall hold office for a term of three (3) years, from and after February 1 of the year in which he or she is appointed. Terms shall be staggered so that a simple majority is appointed in one year, and balance the following year.

SECTION 5. MEETINGS

The Commission shall hold regular meetings, open and public, within Monterey County, at a regularly established time and place, as selected by a majority of the Commissions members. Special public meetings may be held at such times and places as the Commissions Chairman and the Board of Supervisors shall direct.

SECTION 6. MINUTES

Official Minutes, indicating attendance and recording actions taken at each meeting of the Commission, shall be maintained and submitted to each member of the Commission and to each member of the Board of Supervisors, through its Clerk, prior to subsequent meetings.

SECTION 7. DUTIES OF THE COMMISSION

The Commission shall make recommendations to the Board of Supervisors relative to the preservation and propagation of fish and wildlife and use of fish and game propagation funds. The Commission shall also investigate and evaluate proposals for projects intended to enhance and protect fish and wildlife.

SECTION 8. QUORUM

A quorum shall be a majority of the total current appointed membership of the Commission. Commission action may be taken by a majority of those present and voting at any given meeting.

SECTION 9. OFFICERS

The Commission shall elect a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman, and a Secretary who shall be elected during the Commission's first meeting of the year. Officers shall serve for one year and may run for reelection, with official duties commencing on the second meeting of the year.

SECTION 10. COUNTY STAFF SUPPORT

The Commission shall be assisted by the Administrative Office. The Administrative Officer may designate a member of his or her staff to be his or her representative to the Commission.

SECTION 11. NOTICE OF SUBCOMMITTEES

A subcommittee shall mean any subsidiary study group appointed by the Commission to give assistance for longer than six months. Subcommittee members need not be Commission members, except that the Commission Chairperson shall designate a Commission member to serve on said subcommittee.

SECTION 12. EXPENSES

Subject to budget limitations, the members of the Commission shall be entitled to reimbursement for travel expenses to and from Commission meetings and reimbursement for reasonable and necessary expenses incurred in the course of their official duties.

SECTION 13. ANNUAL REPORT

The Commission shall submit a concise annual report to the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors by July 30 of each year. The report shall contain a summary for the Commissions activities and projects for the preceding year, and shall contain a list of individual Commission members and Commission responsibilities.

SECTION 14. REVIEW AND AWARDING OF GRANT MONEY

Public notices shall be placed in local papers for grant request no later than November 15th. Grant allocations will be made at the February meeting or at a special meeting in March if more time is needed. A simply majority vote on any given request by Commission members will be needed to allocate funding. Late requests for grant money can be made any time during the year for special consideration defined as an Emergency. That being an uncommon and/or unforeseen circumstance that may arise. The Commission shall be appointed by the Monterey County Board of Supervisors and shall consist of fifteen (15) residents of Monterey County as follows: Three (3) members appointed from each supervisorial district.

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SECTION 5. MEETINGS

The Commission shall hold six regular meetings a year, open and public, within Monterey County, at an regularly established time and place, as selected by a majority of the Commissions members. Special public

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SECTION 7. DUTIES OF THE COMMISSION

The Commission shall make recommendations to the Board of Supervisors relative to the preservation and propagation of fish and wildlife and use of fish and game propagation funds and other funds it may receive. The Commission shall also investigate and evaluate proposals for projects intended to enhance and protect fish and wildlife.

SECTION 8. QUORUM

A quorum shall be a majority of the total current appointed membership of the Commission. Once a quorum is established at a meeting Commission action by voting may be taken by a majority of those present. and voting at any given meeting.

Without a quorum no voting will be allowed.

SECTION 9. OFFICERS

The Commission shall elect a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman, a Treasurer and a Secretary who shall be elected during the Commission's first meeting of the year. Officers shall serve for one year and may run for reelection, with official duties commencing on the second meeting of the year.
