WHO WE SERVE

- CalWORKs adults with children that are mandated to participate in the Welfare-to-Work (WTW) Program
- 1682 Adults in the WTW Program (Dec.2018)
- 256 Sanctioned and 447 Exempted Adults
- 24-Month WTW Time Limit

- Job placement and employment that leads to self-sufficiency



CWES Service Delivery Model: Holistic Approach to Barrier Removal With Wrap-Around Services





- Adults Over the age of 18, low income
- **Dislocated Workers (DW)** Terminated, laid-off, job ended due to company closure
- Authorized to work in the U.S., registered through Selective Service (males)



GOAL

- Provide career planning and guidance
- Provide training and educational assistance
- Enhance employment skills and opportunities
- Provide job search assistance
- Job placement and employment





WIOA Challenges and Opportunities

Challenges – Oct 2017 OET transferred to DSS

- Less staff and time to meet contract performance goals
- Union, staff, and political unrest
- Lack of structure and accountability
- Poor outcomes and performance

Infrastructure Development and Training



- Changed service delivery model
- Identified and addressed program gaps
- Developed and issued 30 written policies and procedures
- Trained and evaluated staff
- Set clear expectations and increased staff accountability

Enrollment, Outreach & Partnership Strategies

- Shared and integrated DSS resources with core One-Stop partners and customers
- Developed common intake form, and One-Stop Orientations with DSS/EDD/BH/ WIOA staff
- Co-enrolled eligible CalWORKs & WIOA applicants

Data Informed Decision Making



- Tracked outcomes, gaps, and progress Equalized caseload/ workload
- Developed case load management reports and tools
- Developed and shared weekly data reports with staff
- Highlighting goals and performance outcomes




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Successful Outcomes – WIOA Comparisons

\$50,000 to Expand E & T Services to Working Poor


CalWORKs Home Visitation Initiative

- Facilitates seamless service delivery for customers/ families in common



Assist families and young adults (22 to 24) on transitional

Can grow this program with a 50/50 local match to serve

13,372 adults and 24,319 children on CalFresh (Dec 2018)

- Partnership with Monterey County First 5
- Use of Parents as Teachers Model

CalFresh effective February 2019

more families

- Serve 165 families over an 18 month period
- \$30 per month to CalWORKs families for each infant in the home
- Must be CWES WTW or Cal-Learn Participant
- Effective September 2018

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Customer Success Story

Presented by Marissa

Marissa's Bio:

Age 27, with 3 children ages 10, 5, & 3

Both of Marissa's parents were incarcerated by the time she was 9 years old, which left her living from couch to couch at the homes of family and friends while dragging with her several trash bags full of her belongings.

At an early age she married into an extremely mentally abusive relationship and had three children. Never feeling like she deserved better, it took having her 3 children and recognizing what they were watching to push her to make the choice to do better for herself. She wanted a better life for her children than what she had to endure.

Fast forward - after connecting with the MCDSS CalWORKs Employment Services Program, Marissa is on track to graduate from Hartnell this spring with two AA degrees; one in sociology and the other in psychology. **S**he is to apply again for a position within the County as her goal is to become a social worker for Monterey County and eventually attend CSUMB to earn a bachelors degree.

Marissa is working part-time, going to school, taking care of her children, and is full of hope.
