



The Monterey County Area Agency on Aging (AAA) Advisory Council is pleased and excited to endorse and support development and implementation of the Covia Home Match program in Monterey County! The AAA is part of a nationwide network of services designed to assist low-income residents as they age. The mission of the Monterey County AAA is to provide leadership in addressing issues that relate to older Monterey County residents; to develop community-based systems of care that provide services which support independence, and which protect the quality of life of older persons and persons with functional impairments; and to promote citizen involvement in the planning and delivery of services.

Every local AAA determines the priorities in their area and affordable housing has been identified as a high priority in our County. In September 2017, the AAA and the HOME (Housing Options Meaningful to Elders) Collaborative jointly hosted its first Housing and Homelessness Summit focusing on the needs of older adults and persons with disabilities. One of the solutions proposed at the Summit was to implement a shared housing program. In September 2018, the AAA and community partners held a Community Response to Eldercare Symposium. Again, implementation of a shared housing program was one of the most promising Symposium recommendations to increase affordable housing options.

For the past two years, members of the AAA and the HOME Collaborative have been researching shared housing models. In the past year, the Covia Home Match program emerged to be the best match for Monterey County. Covia has demonstrated great success with this model in the city of San Francisco, Alameda, Marin and Contra Costa Counties and can bring this expertise to Monterey County. In addition, they are also a well-established non-profit in Monterey County, operating Canterbury Woods, a planned life retirement community, in Pacific Grove since the 1960s.

The Home Match program offers affordable housing without waiting years to build new housing stock. It would allow homeowners, most often single older females to afford to stay in their homes, while providing affordable housing to home seekers. An additional benefit is the prevention of social isolation of these older adults. This is a common-sense solution to adding additional affordable housing in our County.

The Housing Options Meaningful to Elders (HOME) Collaborative was created in September 2016. Its mission is to educate, advocate and collaborate on housing issues affecting older adult and disability communities. The HOME Collaborative Steering Committee involves individuals from the for-profit sector, as well as local government and County based agencies such as the Area Agency on Aging and the Aging and Adult Services Branch of Monterey County's Department of Social Services. The larger HOME Collaborative consists of interested members of the community, as well as those involved in local housing efforts, social services and other supportive agencies.

In 2017, the HOME Collaborative hosted its first Housing and Homelessness Summit. As a result of the Summit, several workgroups were generated to begin efforts to develop programs and perform advocacy around issues impacting housing stability in our community.

For the past two years, the HOME Collaborative Policy Workgroup has been researching shared housing models and has had presentations from five different programs. In the past year, the Covia Home Match program appears to be the best match for Monterey County. Covia has demonstrated great success with this model in the city of San Francisco, Alameda, Marin and Contra Costa Counties. The HOME Collaborative sees this as an excellent opportunity for homeowners to remain in their own home while providing affordable housing for others so that they, too, can thrive within the community of their own choosing.

The HOME Collaborative fully supports the continued development and implementation of Covia Home Match and is excited to see such a valuable option for our community members.
