Scope of Workshop

 Receive a report regarding the FORA Draft Transition Plan and transition planning process

 Conduct an informational workshop as recommended by the Board of Supervisors Fort Ord Committee;

Goal of Workshop - Direction

- Fort Ord Committee recommends:
 - Return on September 25, 2018 for consideration of the Board of Supervisors Fort Ord Committee's preliminary recommendations on the Draft Transition Plan and transition planning process
 - Request that the Fort Ord Reuse Authority Board of Directors delay its first vote on the Draft Transition Plan currently anticipated on September 28, 2018
- Provide direction to staff

Background

FORA Act authorized the creation of FORA

• Original Dissolution June 30, 2014; Extended to June 30, 2020

• Base Reuse Plan (BRP) infrastructure and other tasks remaining beyond June 30, 2020 (~\$194.5 million)

Statutory Extension and Dissolution Options Being Discussed

• Transition Plan to LAFCO by December 30, 2018

Transition Options – Key Topics

- Financial Assets
- Environmental Services
- Habitat
- Transportation

- Revenue Sources
 - Community Facilities District (CFD) Special Tax
 - Property Tax
 - Land Sales
 - US Army Funding

- Community Facilities District (CFD) Special Tax
 - About 2/3 of all FORA revenues
 - Ceases to exist when FORA dissolves


• Primarily funds CIP

- Property Tax
 - Redistributed when FORA dissolves
 - FORA 35%: Successor Agencies 35%: County 25%
 - Post-FORA: Successor Agencies 54%: County 38%
 - Primarily used for CIP
 - Accelerated building removal proposal being considered

- Land Sales (FORA 50%)
 - FORA's share would possibly go to the jurisdiction upon FORA dissolution


- Primarily funds building removal and some CIP
- No land sales projected in County

- US Army funding for Environmental Services Cooperative Agreement (ESCA)
 - Funds munitions clean up, monitoring and reporting until 2028
 - Funds go to successor entity
 - If County, anticipated additional administrative, overhead, and legal costs



Transition Options – Env. Services

- ESCA Successor Implementation
 - Munitions clearing complete; regulatory processing still pending
 - Agreement requires single entity successor either County,
 Seaside, Marina or JPA



Transition Options - Habitat

- Habitat Management Plan (HMP) Adopted 1997
- Proposed Base-wide Habitat Conservation Plan (HCP)
 - To obtain Incidental Take Permits (ITPs) for BRP development
 - Comprehensive base-wide approach
- FORA set aside of ~\$21 million anticipated by June 30, 2020

Transition Options - Transportation

- BRP requires adoption of CIP to govern roadway improvements
- Post-FORA proposals include
 - TAMC proposed regional roadways
 - Proposed CIP roads to underlying jurisdiction
 - Current County Lead Davis & Reservation Road project
- County policies to support fair-share funding

Direction

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
