Mission

We enrich the lives of children, prenatal through age five, and their families by strengthening connections and advancing quality within a whole system of care and support.

Vision

All children reach their unique potential in a family and community that values, respects, and invests in early childhood.





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Due to declining fund balance and declining tax revenues, F5MC will need to **cut \$2.5 million** in expenditures per year starting in 2023—that equates to a 40% cut in services.

F5MC Funded Services Cut





A decline of \$2.5 million from Prop 10 dollars means 2 out of 5 people already accessing services, could lose access to early childhood programming. F5MC would go from providing services to over 25,000 community members to 15,000.






Although early childhood is a critical time to lay the foundation for lifelong skills, behaviors and health outcomes, only 21% of public spending on children is spent on children 5 and under.

First 5 Monterey County and partners stepped up to ensure that essentials for children—including diapers, wipes, and formula—were available to families that most needed them.



Early Childhood Collaboratives



First 5 Monterey County funds early childhood collaboratives that provide a variety of services by partnering with community organizations across the county.



Early Childhood Collaboratives

The Collaboratives are a way to help young children by offering services that support the whole family.

Collaboratives services offered:

- Child developmental screening
- Parent-child playgroups
- Parenting classes
- Mental health counseling
- Home visiting





For my family it has helped us immensely, ... [we] now use different tools—if I didn't have this program, my son would perhaps be in a gang. I feel this has saved my kids and me. I want to cry just thinking about it. I have 4 kids: 18, 8, 6, 3 and I have taken these classes for years and never miss a class, I work in agriculture and even if it is during a break or after a long day. It is my fuel."



Census Work: Focusing on 0-5

First 5 Monterey County was the leader in the design and implementation of Census 2020 strategies for the 0–5 population.







Census Work: Focusing on 0-5

It is estimated that more than 8,000 people within Monterey County were reached through First 5 funded direct outreach for the Census.

- Children ages 0-5 are the most undercounted age range in the Census.
- Counting children ensures better community planning for school size, health facilities, and provides better information on child well-being.
- Through partnerships, F5MC helped design videos, a fotonovela, and outreach materials for print, radio, and social media.



Central Coast Early Childhood Advocacy Network



Advocates across Monterey, Santa Cruz, and San Benito Counties came together to share ideas, learn about advocacy strategies, and listen to each other's stories through a variety of events over the year. This included the first annual Parent Power Summit.

First 5 continues to expand one of our most celebrated trainings—the Infant-Family and Early Childhood Mental Health (IFECMH) series.



Mental Health Training

This mental health series provides specialized training for professionals working with young children and their families and serves diverse professionals from many disciplines across Monterey County including: mental health, health care, early care and education, and the justice system.

I worked with a family who had two children diagnosed with autism. Through my [mental health] training, I developed a positive relationship with the family... and [1] collaborated with them to provide a supportive and inclusive environment for all the children in my classroom. I was able to collaborate with community agencies and learn how to individualize activities so that its supports children with autism. The IFECMH trainings keep me grounded and make me feel supported and energized."
