RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Supervisors:

Approve and authorize the Director of Health or Assistant Director of Health to execute a Mental Health Services Agreement with Chamberlain's Youth Services for the provision of Short Term Residential Therapeutic Program services in the amount of \$612,348 for Fiscal Year (FY) 2021-22, \$612,348 for FY 2022-23, and \$612,348 for FY 2023-24, for a total Agreement amount not to exceed \$1,837,044 for the term July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2024; and
- b. Approve and authorize the Director of Health or Assistant Director of Health to approve up to three (3) future amendments that do not exceed ten percent (10%) (\$183,704.40) of the original Agreement amount and do not significantly alter the scope of services.

SUMMARY/DISCUSSION:

This new Mental Health Services Agreement with Chamberlain's Youth Services replaces Agreement A-13533 which will expire on June 30, 2021. Chamberlain's is a Short-Term Residential Therapeutic Program providing residential and specialty mental health services including specialized and intensive care, support, and 24-hour supervision on a short-term basis for children and youth with complex and severe needs. The goal of the

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program is to provide therapeutic interventions to treat and ameliorate the behavioral health symptoms and improve function so that children and adolescents may move to a less restrictive and intensive treatment setting. Chamberlain's has been providing services to Monterey County youth who require the highest level of care to prevent their placement into an inpatient hospital or out-of-state residential or juvenile justice facility.

This Agreement contains the County's standard 30-day "no cause" provision (Section IV, B) and an additional defunding provision (Section IV, D), which provides the County the ability to amend or terminate the Agreement in the event of a reduction and/or termination of funding.

This work supports the following Monterey County Health Department 2018-2022 Strategic Plan Initiative: 3. Ensure access to culturally and linguistically appropriate, customer-friendly, quality health services. It also supports one of the ten essential public health services, specifically: 7. Link people to needed personal health services and assure the provisions of health care when otherwise unavailable.

OTHER AGENCY INVOLVEMENT:

County Counsel-Risk Management and Auditor-Controller have reviewed and approved this Agreement as to legal form and fiscal provisions, respectively.

FINANCING:

This Agreement is funded by Federal Financial Participation (FFP 16%), 2011 Realignment- Early Periodic Screening and Diagnostic Testing (EPSDT 6%), and Special Education Local Plan Area (SELPA 78%). The funds for this Agreement for FY 2021-22 are included in the Health Department's Behavioral Health (HEA012, Unit 8410) Fiscal Year (FY) 2021-22 Requested Budget. The funds for this Agreement for FY 2022-23 and FY 2023-24 will be included in the respective Health Department's Behavioral Health (HEA012, Unit 8410) FY 2022-23 and FY 2023-24 Requested Budgets.
