OVERVIEW

From March 9th, 2023, to March 20th, 2023, the County of Monterey experienced a series of intense atmospheric rivers, resulting in hazardous conditions and severe flooding in the Community of Pajaro.

The aftermath of these storms revealed significant damage to critical infrastructure, encompassing homes, businesses, roads, levees, and wastewater piping.



Disaster Impacts

IMPACTS TO ECONOMY

- Approximately \$600+million in damages to the agricultural industry.
- Approximately \$30,436,110 in damages to businesses and commercial structures

IMPACTS TO HEALTH AND SOCIAL SERVICES

- Increased demand for social services, homeless services, emergency housing vouchers, unemployment benefits, etc.
- Impacts to health risks due to mold and an increased presence of mosquitos.

·IMPACTS TO HOUSING

- •- Nearly every home in Pajaro was impacted, even those without high water marks.
- •- An estimated \$93,947,336 was caused in housing damages.

IMPACTS TO INFRASTRUCTURE

- Damage to roads, public water systems, sewage main, and the levee.
- Disruption of services like clean drinking water, and sewage.

IMPACTS TO NATURAL AND CULTURAL RESOURCES

- Damage to the middle school, Ag. Commissioner's Office, and the historic water tower.
- Flooding causes erosion of the land taking nutrients from the soil.




PREPAREDNESS ONGOING

EOC Recovery Efforts


- The County of Monterey Emergency Operations Center was activated at the highest level, Level 1, during the entire duration of the rain event.
- The EOC is currently still activated for ingoing response and recovery efforts.
- The Proclamation of a Local Emergency persists.
- The County of Monterey has made significant efforts to provide for the immediate needs of the community (human health, safety, and economic stability).
- These fundamental services play a vital role in stabilizing the community, allowing all other aspects of society to function effectively.



Community Support and Successes

The following short-term and intermediate recovery efforts have successfully taken place in the Pajaro Community:

- Emergency Response and Language Equity
- Activation of the Equity Officer in the EOC
- Comfort and Hygiene Hubs
- Local Assistance Centers (LAC)
- Disaster Recovery Centers (DRC)
- Community Resource Center (CRC)
- Emergency Congregate & Non-Congregate Sheltering (NCS)

Successes Cont.

During the height of operations from March 28th through May 18th, the LAC, CRC, and the NCS served a total of 1856 individuals & households broken down in the following manner:

- LAC 1141 Households/Residents served
- CRC 455 Households served
- NCS 80 Families/260 Individuals served

The FEMA DRC has registered to date, a total of 2581 individuals for Individual Assistance with 957 approvals for a total of \$5,052,970.63



The Voice of the Residents

- The County organized two community meetings on 3/21/2023 & 5/3/2023 consisting of information dissemination and listening sessions with the residents of Pajaro.
- Residents expressed their desire for meaningful government involvement and direct participation in the Long-Term Recovery endeavors.
- Many residents highlighted the need for deeper meaningful investment in their community to withstand future disasters.

PAJARO LONG-TERM RECOVERY PLAN DEVELOPMENT

Project Scope

PROJECT OVERVIEW

The Pajaro Long-term Recovery Plan Development project aims to create a comprehensive recovery plan for the community of Pajaro, while engaging stakeholders in the planning process. This project utilizes the spectrum of community engagement to ownership tool by involving community members, stakeholders, and underrepresented groups in decision-making and ensuring their voices are heard. The estimated duration for completing the project is nine to twelve months, with specific timelines determined in consultation with project stakeholders.

PROJECT GOAL

Develop a comprehensive Long-term Recovery Plan for the Community of Pajaro that addresses short, mid-, and long-term needs, community identified priorities and engages stakeholders in the planning process to build a constructive relationship with the Pajaro Community. Additionally, the plan aims to restore the flood-affected areas to their pre-incident conditions or even enhance them. It will encompass strategies for recovery, preparedness, and potentially incorporate infrastructure development to minimize the impact of future disasters.





Scope of Work

Goals:

- To develop a Long-Term Recovery Plan for the Community of Pajaro that addresses short-, mid-, and long-term needs, and community identified priorities.
- That engages stakeholders in the planning process to build a constructive relationship with the Pajaro Community.
- To restore flood-affected areas to pre-incident conditions or even enhance them.

Objectives:

- Perform a community assessment: June July 2023
- Identify and build the project team: July August 2023
- Create a planning committee: July December 2023
- Perform resident engagement: August 2023 April 2024
- Draft a recovery plan: January May 2024
- Approval and Implementation of the recovery Plan: May June 2024





- The County of Monterey Department of Emergency Management and the Health Department have dedicated staff for the long-term recovery planning effort.
- A Disaster Recovery Manager and Community Liaison have been appointed.
- These roles play a critical role in helping the community recover from a disaster by assessing needs, coordinating efforts, and serving as a spokesperson for recovery activities.

DISASTER RECOVERY MANAGER

 Oversees the coordination and execution of the recovery process.

COMMUNITY LIAISON

 Support planning efforts serving as the point of contact for the community.
