Referral Title: Monterey County Spay and Neuter Ord						
Referral Purpose: The purpose of this referral is to enact a Spay and Neuter Ordinance for cats and dogs to						
address pet overpopulation, euthanasia rates, and overcrowded shelters with minimal staffing.						
Brief Referral Description: Monterey County's communities face a persistent challenge with pet overpopulation, resulting in overcrowded animal shelters, increased euthanasia rates, and avoidable public health and safety concerns. Without a proactive policy, stray and unwanted animals continue to multiply, placing a financial and emotional burden on residents, animal control services, and nonprofit rescue and spay/neuter organizations, like SNIP.						
A county spay and neuter ordinance would require most dogs and cats in unincorporated areas to be surgically sterilized, with reasonable exemptions for licensed breeders, working animals, and those with medical conditions. This approach directly addresses the root cause of overpopulation by preventing unwanted litters before they occur. Such an ordinance would: • Reduce shelter intake and euthanasia rates, freeing resources for adoption, rehabilitation, and humane care. • Lower taxpayer costs associated with animal control, sheltering, and enforcement. • Improve public safety by decreasing roaming animals, dog bites, abandoned pets & vehicle-animal collisions. • Enhance animal welfare by reducing suffering, neglect, and the spread of disease among stray populations.						
By adopting a spay and neuter ordinance, Monterey County can demonstrate compassionate, fiscally responsible leadership and protect both its residents and animals. The leadership of the County of Monterey can also inspire the remaining 11 cities to also adopt similar policies. In Monterey County, only one city out of 12 have adopted mandatory spay/neuter ordinances: • City of Seaside: In November 2024, the city passed an ordinance that requires cats over 5 months and
